The Labor party during its short reign proved to the English eople that men drawn from the rank responsible posts of the empire." The Labor party fell from power not through lack of administrative ability, but because of its policy re garding the recognition of Russia. Rr. Bester, is the man who is respon-l laub.)
sible for the growth and development
of this party, and its past successes. Although past middle age he will in all probability handle the reins of the Labor party for many years to come. If the Labor party returns to pow-
