The W. A. A. again wishes to applaud these young men—this, they believe, is a true evidence of school spirit.

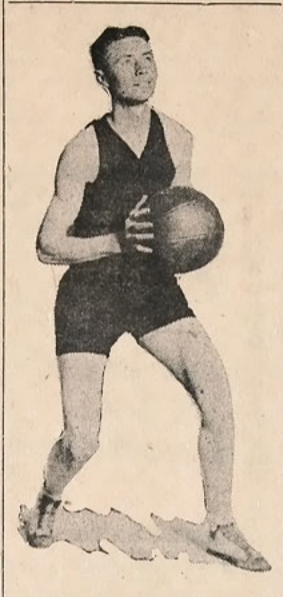
