allion inspection (garrison and field) tent pitching, guard mounting, parade, reviews, court-martial, field engineering, musketry, camp sanitation, military policies, and signalling are just a few of the many things being drilled into every officer in the cadet corp these days in view of the coming May inspection and the need for competent instruction for the cadet battalion this spring.

Like last fall, weather permitting, afternoon drilling will resume soon and this added practical drill instruc-

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tion is supposed to put the finishing touches on what already stands as a pretty well drilled corp of cadets. The spring instruction is nothing else but nteresting and will be more in the nature of sport than class work.
