**Jackrabbits First Victim**

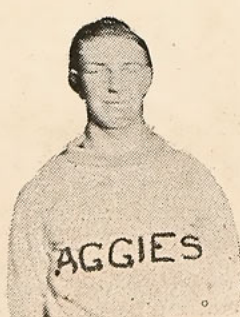

"Big Ben" made his big start as juggler of the sphere in the South Dakota games here and is rapidly rounding into a pretty likely looking forward.



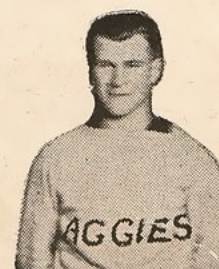
FRED WILLSON, GUARD

BASEBALL SCHEDULE BEING PUT IN SHAPE; MANY CONFERENCE GAMES IN PROSPECT FOR YEAR

Arrangements for the conference baseball schedule are being made and games will undoubtedly be played with the S. D. U. Morningside, Creighton, Des Moines U and Nebraska Wesleyan clubs. S. D. U. has offered to play a series of four games with our club, two games at each school and efforts are being made to arrange a trip that will include the conference teams to the south and also St. Thomas, St. Olaf and Carleton.

## Washington U here June 4

In an announcement made today, Athletic Director Stanley E. Borleske make known the fact that on June 4th the Washington U nine will meet the Aggies on Dacotah field. Last year the Washington U club won the Pacific Coast championship. In 1921 they toured Japan and won 26 out of 31 games, the best record ever made by an American college team in the Orient. This year they will tour thru the continent and play a schedule of 12 games with eastern schools, which includes their game here on June 4th. They will play games with several school in the "Big Ten" and such schools as Harvard and Yale. This game, which will be the feature of the coming baseball season, and which the A. C. is so fortunate to have on its schedule, has been arranged and made possible only thru the personal efforts of Athletic Director Borleske, and it marks the coming of a big day for N. D. A. C. in athletics, to be thus honored by a visit from one of the fastest college ball-clubs in America.

## TIGERS WIN BY FAST PASSING

Des Moines Iowa, Jan. 31—The Des Moines university basket tossers lived up to expectation of Tiger fans and defeated the powerful North Dakota Aggies in a thrilling game by the score 34 to 23, last night by which they remain at the top of the North Central conference ladder.

It was a sensational game. Hardly 10 seconds had elapsed before Hansman, star Tiger guard, sank a perfect basket from the center of the court.

The Aggies came back with a rush and in less than a minute Flem, who layed a stellar game for the north-erners at guard, duplicated Hansman's feat.

## Bisons Lead

The Aggies then forged into the lead for the only time of the game when Flem tossed a free throw. They held this lead for but a short time, for the local quintet struck too hot a pace for them the rest of the game.

The Des Moines victory was well earned, for the locals had the edge in teamwork, slight as it was. The Knox Rust-Evans passing combination repeatedly penetrated the Aggie defense and the close in shots in first half came often.

The Aggies in turn peretrated the Des Moines defense and got a number of short shots, but they failed to hit the hoop. Much of this was due to the guarding of Knapp and Hansman, however who hurried the visitors in every shot.

With the score standing 3 to 2 in the Aggies favor Knox put the Tigers in the lead with two free throws Rust added two points with a short shot and Knox counted two more before Flem tossed two goals from the foul line.

From this point the locals always held a lead, but sometimes it was only by a one or two point margin, the half ending 16 to 13. Des Moines increased its lead at the start of the second half and maintained a fairly safe advantage throughout.

## ALPHA ZETA, NOT SIGMA THETA LEADS IN FALL TERM GRADES

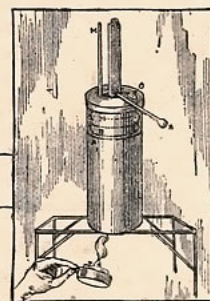

## They Weighed Air—and Charles II Laughed

SAMUEL PEPYS says in his diary that Charles II, for all his interest in the Royal Society, laughed uproariously at its members "for spending their time only in weighing of air and doing nothing else since they sat."

This helps to explain why Charles has come down to us as the "merry monarch."

The Royal Society was engaged in important research. It was trying to substitute facts for the meaningless phrase "nature abhors a vacuum," which had long served to explain why water rushes into a syringe—the commonest form of pump—when the piston is pulled out.

Denis Papin had as much to do as anyone with these laughable activities of the Royal Society. Papin turned up in London one day with a cylinder in which a piston could slide. He boiled water in the cylinder. The steam generated pushed the piston out. When the flame was removed, the steam

condensed. A vacuum was formed and the weight of the outer air forced the unresisting piston in.

Out of these researches eventually came the steam engine.

London talked of the scandalous life that King Charles led, and paid scant attention to such physicists as Papin, whose work did so much to change the whole character of industry.

The study of air and air pumps has been continued in spite of Charles's laughter. In the General Electric Company's Research Laboratories, for instance, pumps have been developed which will exhaust all but the last ten-billionth of an atmosphere in a vessel.

This achievement marks the beginning of a new kind of chemistry—a chemistry that concerns itself with the effect of forces on matter in the absence of air, a chemistry that has already enriched the world with invaluable improvements in illumination, radio communication, and roentgenology.

**Morningside Comes Easy**

The Bisons chalked up their second conference win on Monday night when they defeated Morningside college by a 39 to 17 score. Showing the effects of their long trip and the two hard games with the Jackrabbits, the Bisons were slow in getting started and he first half ended 12 to 9, a lead of three points for the Bisons. In the second half they started to limber up and when their scoring machine slipped into gear, the southerners were soon left trailing in the rear. When the Bisons got the range they dropped them in from all spots on the floor and so rapidly that the contest looked more like a nexhibition match than a game.
