GIRL WINS IN STOCK WAHPETON WINS HIGH SCHOOL TOURNAMENT

Fargo A Close Second

The past week our college has been the host to the basket ball teams of the high schools of this district. Coach Borleske has been in charge of the program and some very interesting and closely contested games have been played Casselton and Fargo Play First Game

Friday morning at nine o'clock the drawings took place, which re-sulted-in the pairing of Fargo and Casselton, Enderlin and Tower City, Lisbon and Finley, Milnor and Wahpeton, Hope and Page.

Fargo and Casselton started the ball rolling in one of the most interesting games of the t urnament, the final outcome being in doubt unifi the very last minute of play. Within five minutes of the end of the contest the score was 20 to 19 in favor of Casselton. A free throw by Berdahl tied the score. Each team made one field goal and another free throw by Berdahl won the game for Fargo.

Enderlin defeated Tower City in an eventy fought contest requiring an extra five minute period of play. The score at the end of the regular forty minute period was tied at 13. In the extra period of play the Tower City quint went to pieces and failed to score while Enderlin cnalked up seven points.

In the afternoon Hope won from Page in a one-sided game to the tune of 39 to 8. Page was hopelessly outclassed in every phase of the game.

Lisbon defeated Finley 29 to 21 and won the right to play Hope on Saturday.

Friday evening Milnor and Wahpeton staged a rather uninteresting contest which resulted in a score of 42 to 12 in favor of Wahpeton. Milnor played a consistent game the first half but failed to make a good showing in the second period.

Saturday morning Wahpeton won the right to meet Fargo by winning from Lisbon, while Fargo defeated Hope in a gruelling contest. The Fargo-Hope battle was thought to be the real deciding factor of the tournament and was watched by a large crowd.

In the evening Fargo and Wahpeton met to decide the district championship.

Up to the start of the game Fargo was conceded as the winner but was defeated by a team that exhib-ited superior basketbail. Wahpeton earned her victory by hard, straight basketball and not by any luck as has been said.
