The October 15th prices of the feed grains were all higher than a month earlier. Barley was up 8 cents while oats and rye were each up 7 cents. Wheat had increased 6 cents. Potatoes were 5 cents lower and flaxseed was 7 cents lower. The prices of all of these field crops were considerably higher on October 15th 1943 than they were October 15th 1942. As a matter of fact, the prices of the three feed grains, barley, oats and rye, have more than doubled. During the year (October 15, 1943 compared to October 15, 1942) the North Dakota farm price of flaxseed increased 55 cents. Other increases in crop prices for the year were barley 53 cents, rye 47 cents, potatoes 45 cents, oats 35 cents, and wheat 33 cents.

The October 15th farm price of sheep was 50 cents higher than a month earlier. The beef cattle price was 50 cents lower, lamb price 20 cents lower, but

hogs showed no change in price for the month. The price of wool was up 1 cent as was the price of butterfat. Eggs were up a fraction over 1 cent but chickens were down almost 1¹/₂ cents. A comparison of the October 15th 1943 livestock and livestock products prices with those of October 15th 1942 reveals that for the one year period, the following changes has taken place; sheep up 60 cents, cattle up 50 cents, lambs up 20 cents and hogs 10 cents lower. For the year wool has increased 6 cents, butterfat 3 cents, eggs slightly more than 6 cents, and chickens almost 4 cents.

The North Dakota farm price index for October was 166 which is 4 points higher than a month earlier or 35 points higher than that of October 15th 1942. The purchasing power of North Dakota farm products on October 15th of this year was 100.
