# North Dakota Farm Prices 

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THE North Dakota Farm Price Index for October 15, 1944, was 5 points higher than it was a month earlier. The index for grains was also 5 points higher than a month earlier, for meat animals 1 point higher, for dairy products no change, for poultry and eggs 11 points higher, and the miscellaneous group of commodities was 2 points higher. A comparison of the October 15, 1944 indexes with the indexes of a year earlier shows that the allcommodity index was 7 points higher, grain index 6 points higher, meat animal index 16 points higher, dairy products index no change, poultry and eggs index no change, and the index of miscellaneous commodities 9 points higher.

The price of most of the grains on October 15, 1944, was a few cents higher than a month earlier. The greatest gain in price was in the price of rye with an increase of 15 cents; corn was down 1 cent, barley down 3 cents, and flaxseed registered no change. A comparison of the October 15th prices with the prices of a year earlier shows that durum wheat was 10 cents higher, other spring wheat 9 cents higher, corn 6 cents higher, rye 5 cents higher, and flaxseed 11 cents higher. During the past year the price of oats had declined 17 cents and the price of barley 8 cents.
For the month, beef cattle prices declined 10 cents a hundred, the price of veal calves was unchanged, sheep prices were up 30 cents per hundred, lamb prices up 20 cents per hundred, and hog prices up 30 cents per hundred. A comparison of the October 15th farm prices with those that prevailed a year
ago shows that beef cattle prices were $\$ 1.60$ higher, veal calf prices 30 cents higher, sheep prices down 50 cents and hog prices down 20 cents.
There has been little change in the prices of dairy products for the month or for the year ending October 15, 1944. The only change in this group of farm commodities was a fraction of a cent increase in the retail price of milk. Poultry and egg prices were all slightly higher for the month with turkeys up 3 cents per pound and chickens and eggs each up a fraction of a cent. Turkey prices were 7 cents higher than they were a year ago. Chicken prices were about the same as a year ago and egg prices were almost 7 cents lower.

The purchasing power of North Dakota prices-that is, the ratio of North Dakota prices received to the prices paid-stood at 102 on October 15, 1944.
