North Dakota Farm Prices

He North Dakota Farm Price Index on June 15, 1945, was up 3 points over that of the previous month and at 188 was the highest of World War No. 2 and the highest since October 15, 1920. The index for grains was up 5 points for the month and at 179 was also the highest of World War No. 2 and the highest since October 15, 1920. The meat animal index was up 3 points but dairy products were down 1 point. The poultry and eggs index was up 4 points and the miscellaneous index was up 1 point. The North Dakota purchasing power—that is, the ratio of North Dakota prices received to prices received—was 109 which is two points higher than the previous month.

All grain prices received by farmers June 15, 1944, were higher than the previous month. The all wheat price was up 3 cents, making it \$1.51 per bushel which is the highest price received by farmers for wheat since February 15, 1925. Durum prices were up 3 cents and spring wheat prices were up 3 cents. The price of corn advanced 9 cents for the month, oats was up 2 cents and barley up 3 cents. Rye shows the greatest gain for the month, advancing 16 cents per bushel and at \$1.29 was the highest farm price for rye since October 15, 1920. The price of flaxseed was up 1 cent. There has been little change in flaxseed prices for the past two years because of the ceiling.

Beef cattle prices being paid to farmers were 20 cents higher than the previous month which is a continuation of the upswing of prices which has been under way the past eight months during which time beef prices have advanced \$3.40 per hundred weight. The price of veal calves was up 10 cents over that of the previous month, continuing an upswing which has been under way the past seven months during which time the price has advanced \$2.30 per hundred. Sheep prices were up 40 cents over that of the previous month but there was no change in lamb prices or hog prices. The price of wholesale milk was down 5 cents but there was no change in the price of retail milk, butter or butterfat.

The farm price of chickens was up slightly more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ cents over that of the previous month but there was no change in turkey prices. Egg prices were up a strong one-half cent. The price of loose hay increased 10 cents per ton, sweet clover seed was up 20 cents per ton, but there was no change in wool prices or in alfalfa seed prices. The farm prices of horses were down \$3.00 per head from that of the previous month which made it \$37.00 which is the lowest price which has been reported by the

federal agricultural statistician in the 36 years of their records. The price of milk cows was up \$2.00 per head which is a continuation of the upswing of the past seven months. There was no change for the month in the farm price of potatoes but at \$1.60 per bushel potatoes were at the highest peak of World War No. 2 and the highest since October 15, 1936.
