## North Dakota Farm Prices

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THE ALL-COMMODITY INDEX OF NORTH DAKOTA FARM PRICES AS REPORTED FOR AUGUST 15, 1945 WAS DOWN 3 POINTS FROM THAT OF THE PREVIOUS MONTH according to the mid-month report prepared by the Federal Agricultural Statistician of the United States Department of Agriculture at Fargo. THE JULY 15, 1945 ALL-COMMODITY INDEX, AS WELL AS THE REVISED INDEX FOR JUNE 15, 1945, WAS 189 WHICH IS THE HIGHEST THE INDEX HAS BEEN SINCE OCTOBER 15, 1920. The August 15, 1945 all-commodity index of North Dakota farm prices at 186 was 18 points higher than it was at the same time a year ago.

The index for grains for August 15, 1945 was 176 which is 3 points lower than the previous month but 15 points over that of a year ago. For the month spring wheat was down 3 cents, oats down 8 cents and rye down 1 cent. There was no change in the reported farm price for durum, corn, barley, or flaxseed. In spite of the 1 cent decline rye was still 35 cents higher than a year ago.

The farm price index for meat animals was, on August 15, 1945, lower by 8 points from that of the previous month but at 223 was still 36 points higher than the index for the same date a year earlier. The August 15, 1945 report indicates that beef cattle prices have declined 70 cents during the month, that the veal calf farm price was only down 10 cents while sheep and lamb prices were each down 40 cents. This was the first change reported in lamb prices for the past five months. There was no change in hog prices for the month, in fact no change has been reported for the past five months.

The August 15, 1945 farm price index for dairy products at 191 was the same as the previous month and only 2 points above that of a year ago. The only change registered for dairy products for the month was a one-tenth of 1 cent advance in the price of retail milk. There has been no change reported for butter and butterfat prices for the past five months.

The index for poultry and eggs was up 8 points for the month and 29 points higher than was the index on August 15, 1944 a year earlier. All the poultry and egg prices were higher on August 15, 1945 than a month earlier with chickens up almost a half cent, turkeys up 4 cents and eggs up practically 5 cents.

The index for the miscellaneous group of farm commodities was higher by 15 points over that of the previous month and 39

points higher than a year ago largely because of stronger potato prices. Loose hay was on August 15, 1945, 20 cents per ton lower than the previous month. Horses were down 3.00 per head which places the farm price at 36.00 the lowest price ever reported for horses. There was no change in the price of milk cows, wool or alfalfa seed. The farm price of potatoes was 1.80 which is the highest it has been during World War Two. Sweet clover seed was up 40 cents per bushel.
