The civil engineering depart ment has recently installed new concrete equipment. One of the machines is a counter current batch mixer for miring concrete in the highways materials lab. This machine looks and operates like an oversized mix-master and has facilities for visual inspection of the concrete during the mixing operation.

A Southwarix $300,000 \mathrm{lb}$. hydraulic concrete testing machine has also been installed. This machine is used for testing the strength of concrete and can crush the largest concrete blocks with the greatest of ease.
