ing ahead with plans for the Student Union on the basis that building will start next spring, according to Bob Runice, chairman of the building committee. "Whether construction actually will get underway then, Runice explained, "depends on the supply of steel."

The architects, William F. Kurke and Sons, are now working on minor corrections suggested by the board. The goal for final approval of drawings is next January. The board would like to call for bids in February and start building in April.

The building will cost \$500,000 and the furnishings\$100,000. The board hopes to raise \$300,000 before building begins and float a bond issue to cover the remaining cost. So far, about \$225,000 has come in from student fees and donations from alumni and business-

The Union will be built on the west end of Dacotah Field facing 13th street. It will be of brick cement and steel construction and modern in design. A modular plan, similiar to the library, will be used.

The building will consist of three floors, the first being three feet below the ground surface. On this lower floor bowling alleys, a barber shop, a book store, and a lunch room will be located. Several lounges, a game room,

committe rooms, and offices for the Student Union manager will be on the first floor. On the second floor there will be offices for the Spectrum, Bison, Student Commission. Alumni bureau and placement bureau. A large room with a stage and a projection booth will double as an auditorium and a ballroom. A serving kitchen will adjoin the ballroom so that it may be used for



Law School Tests Given In November

The Law School Admission Test required of applicants for admission to a number of leading American law schools, will be given at more than 100 centers throughout the United Statess on the mornings of November 17, 1951, February 23, April 26, and August 9, 1952. During 1950-51 over 6700 applicants took this test, and their scores were sent to ninety law schools.

A candidate must make separate application for admission to each law school of his choice and should inquire of each school whether it wishes him to take the Law School Addmission Test. Since many law schools select their freshman classes in the spring preceding their entrance, candidates for admission to next year's classes are advised to take either the November or the February test, if possible.

The Law School Admission Test, prepared and administered by Educational Testing Service features objective questions measuring verbal aptitudes and reasoning ability rather than acquired information. According to ETS it cannot be "crammed" for. Sample questions and information regarding registration for and adminstration of the test are given in a Bulletin of Information.

Bulletins and applications for the test should be obtained four to six weeks in advance of the desired date from Educational Testing Service, P. O. Box 592, Princeton, N. J. Completed applications must be received at least ten days before the desired testing date in order to allow ETS time to complete the necessary testing arrangements for each candidate.

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
