This evening Rahjah President Gordy Badger will ignite the pile of wood which the freshmen have gathered on old Dacotah field. A regulated snakedance will form at the bonfire and wind its way uptown.

Float lineup will begin at 8:30 tomorrow morning. Parade Marshall Ken Ward emphasized the importance of units being in their proper places on time. Assistant parade marshalls will be stationed strategically along the assembly route to facilitate formation. No units will be accepted in a position other than assigned to them and units not in place by the specified

Over 45 units will take part in the parade. Featured will be Queen Marilyn Hunter and her royal court, ROTC and AFROTC drill teams and marchin units, Governor Brunsdale, members of the Fargo city commission and the Board of Higher Education.

Seven bands will participate: The Gold Star Band, the North Dakota University band, and high school bands from Enderlin, Breckenridge, West Fargo, Barnesville, and Fargo.

Herd Definite Favorites In Homecoming **Battle Tomorrow With University Sioux**

Feature of the 1951 Homecoming celebration at NDAC will be the annual grid battle between the North Dakota State Bison and The North Dakota University Sioux.

The game will be played on Dacotah Field Saturday afternoon at 2. A capacity crowd is expected to see one of the most hair raising events of the season.

Bitter rivals since the first meeting, the Bison-Sloux clash is always hard fought all the way. Score does not always tell the story, espically in this series. Regardless of season records and past scores, the game very easily turns into an upset.

The Bison last beat the Sioux in 1949 to the tune of 19-7. Last year the Sioux won 33-0. The Sioux finished the 1950 season with a record of three wins, one loss and two ties to finish second in conference standings.

So far this year, the Nodaks have won one and lost two in league play. Last week the Sioux lost to Beloit 27-7, in a non-conference tussle. Iowa TC and SDS have tri-Parade umphed over the Grand Forks

Coach Frank Zazula (Akron U. '40), starting his second campaign as head mentor at the University, Open Houses at faces one of the toughest rebuilding jobs of any coach in the nation. Zazula lost close to sixty players via graduation, service calls, and transfers from last years varsity and frosh squads.

The mighty Jackrabbits had all they could do to stop the rejuvenated Bison with a 7 to 7 tie. From the very beginning the Herd was in command and not until the final quarter was almost over did the bunnies tie the score.

On the second play after the kickoff, State's pride and joy, Benny Noland scampered 50 yards to score for the Bison. Noland slashed off right tackle, cut to the left and then upfield toward the distant goaline behind beautiful blocking to register six points. Frankie Espisito added the extra point from placement.
