Fulbright Award Offers Year's Study

Applications for the Fulbright scholarship award must be in Dr. Censchmer's office by Oct. 31 to be eligible for study abroad during the year 1953-54. The award is given annaully to two graduating seniors from each state.

The Fulbright Scholarship, a government award, offers a year of study in one of these countries, Australia, Austria, Egypt, France, Greece, India, Iran, Italy, Nothera lands, New Zealand, Norway, Philipines, Thailand, Turkey, and the United Kingdom, Added just recently to the list was West Germany.

Requirements for application are citizenship of the U.S., holder of a B.S. degree or its equivelant, good health and a working knowledge of the language used in the country where study is to be taken up. Dr. Genschmer points out the latter requirjement as the weakest link during the past few years.

Being offered this year are state awards. Requirements for the state award are the same as for the national except that the applicant must be a legal resident of the state and be either a graduating senior or be a first year graduate student.

Expenses covered by the scholarship include transportation, expenses of a language refresher, tuition, books, and maintenance. For those students interested, courses in foreign language conversation ware being offered. The classes are headed by Dr. Genschmer.

Students seking additional information are asked to see Prof. Genschmer. His office is located in Minard hall, in the modern language department.

Enrollment 1,731; Frosh Have Biggest Class, Most Women

Enrollment of students is 1,731 at NDAC this term, according to Merlin Miller, Director of Admissions and Records. This figure includes only current students. With new students enrolling in succeeding quarters, final enrollment is expected to reach 2,000.

Of the total number, 352 are women. Men number 1,379. Percentage-wise, this amounts to a ratio of four men to every girl on campus. According to specific school breakdowns, the engineer's have the largest department. Enrollees total one woman and 493 men. There are 347 men and one woman studying agriculture.

In the School of Chemistry there are six women and 61 men. Enrolled in arts and sciences are 90 women and 324 men. Home economic majors total 242 women . . . The pharmacy school has 11 women and 155 men.



Second, they shall be descended by blood from someone (father, nother, grandfather, or grandmother) who served in the Army or Navy of the United States in said war and who is still in said service or whose said service in the Army or Navy was terminated by death or an honorable discharge.

Ordinarily at least six months' service prior to the signing of the Armistice, November 11, 1918, is necessary except where there was active overseas' duty prior to the signing of the Armistice, or where a person died in service.


