free. Hardly a day passes without a reference, in some newspaper or periodical, to a curtailment or restriction of freedom suggested by some pressure group, or placed on one group by another.

Colleges and universities have recently become more and more the objects of internal and external attack. When mutual suspicions and antagonisms are fostered in such institutions where common trust and intellectual freedom are essential, those institutions cease to function as free agents in a democracy of free people.

NDAC students should consciously realize and evaluate the measure and meaning of the freedom they possess. When other college publications had to ignore or by-pass the national campaign because of administration policy, the Spectrum was free to discuss national issues in its editorials and student letters.

When other schools were prevented from discussing issues and candidates, we were allowed free discussion and debate, and campus organization like the International Relations club and the college 'Y' were encouraged to invite speakers of divergent opinions and parties to speak to the students, when other schools were kept from making public declarations, we had a mock election and the results were reported on the radio and in the public press.

We have had no orgies of witch-hunting or book-burnings the event, placed Elvin Isgrig in here and, as a consequence, are helping to maintain and promote some of the bastions of freedom: freedom of access to knowledge, freedom of inquiry, and freedom of choice. Only by keeping the first two intact can we maintain the last.

Democracy grows by comparison and only by studying and understanding other systems can we learn to evaluate and appreciate our own. If the price of liberty is eternal vigilance then let us be vigilant against all who would rob us, whatever the guise they effect. We should, however, stop and give thanks for the freedom we here possess.
