#### Pye Attends Geological Meetings In Boston

Dr. Willard D. Pye, chairman of the geology and geography department, recently returned from a series of geological meetings in Boston, Mass. One of the main topics under discussion was the employment of geologists and the future of geological training.

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# Modern Wall Mural


Mrs. Verba Weaver is NDAC's tecture department. Mrs. Weaver is currently completing an abstract mural on the wall of her housing unit apartment.
