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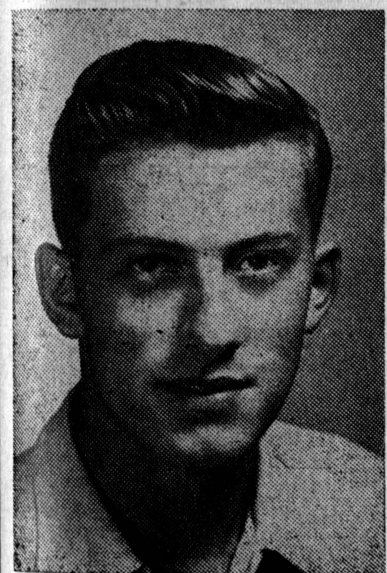
Anderson Elected To Student Presidency

Anderson is a starting forward on the Bison basketball team, a member of the Vets Club, and of the Letterman's Club.

Altogether in the election 1082 votes were cast for president. 19 ballots were void, and 4 had no presidential vote listed for a grand total of 1105 votes. This total was

Jo Ann will serve as Mistress of Awards at the Livestock Show which begins at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow night. Tryota, Guidon, YWCA, Westminster and previous a member of the band and choir are among Miss Gray's activities here at NDAC.

The State Cutting Horse Contest will be the feature speciality act of the 1954 Little International. The final round of this contest is to be held at the livestock arena at NDAC on March 13th as a part of the Little International Livestock Show, an annual event sponsored by the NDAC Saddle and Sirloin Club.

Among the sixteen entrants are men from North Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota. Most of the entrants are outstanding riders and are riding some of the best cutting horses in the country. Jerry Borne will be riding his horse, Little Joe, which he rode to the finals of the contest at the National Western Livestock Exposition in Denver.

Some of the other riders who will be competing for more than \$600 in prize money are Pete Knapp, Willard and Howard Schnell, Bob Brown, Art Tischer, and many equally capable riders. The points that the contestants secure in this contest will be added to their total score throughout the year.

Since the cutting horse demonstration at last year's Little International received satisfactory comments from the audience it is hoped that this year's Champion-

The cutting horse is the stockman's most valuable asset. Many of their skills are executed without aid or direction from the rider. It has been said that the ability to take one individual from a herd of cattle without any help at all is probably the most difficult of the many "tricks" taught to any of our domestic animals.

Other features of the Little International are the Harmonaires Quartet and the Woychick Sisters with the accompaniment of Lloyd Collins at the organ, providing musical entertainment during the show.

Display booths constructed by organizations on the campus in competition for a trophy will be found in the classroom to the left of the pavilion entrance. The Agronomy Show will be on display in the room to the north of the main lobby.

The Hall of Fame Banquet which is Friday night will honor Timm Williams as the outstanding man in Agriculture in North Dakota in 1954. Gilbert Elkin, Jr., recently returned from Scotland, will be the main speaker. Following the banquet Williams picture will be established in the Hall of Fame in the main lobby of the livestock pavilion. Banquet will be held in the NDAC Student Union Dining Room.

The Showmanship Contest, which is the selection of the Grand Champion Showman of the Little International, and the State Cutting Horse Contest will be heard over the air Saturday night. One half-hour of the Show will be carried on KFGO Fargo. Jerry Daschel will handle the broadcasting of the Cutting Horse Contest. Daschel is well acquainted with the training and handling required to produce a good cutting horse.

Graduate School To Officially Open; Smith Named Dean

A Graduate School at the North Dakota Agricultural College will be officially opened on July first this year, according to Dr. Fred S. Hultz, NDAC President. Although the college has awarded 285 Master of Science degrees in its 64 years of operation, NDAC has never had an independent graduate faculty nor a graduate school Dean.

Dr. Glenn S. Smith, Principal Plant Breeder at NDAS has been named Dean of the new Graduate School. A representative from each of the schools of Agriculture, Applied Arts and Sciences, Chemistry, Engineering, Home Economics, Pharmacy and the Experiment Station will make up a Graduate Council who will advise Dean Smith in the administration of the graduate school.

The Graduate School will draw its faculty from the other schools on the campus without employing additional staff. In addition to the Master of Science and Master of Education degrees currently offer-

er, some Doctoral degree programs will be added.

Dean Smith was born in Bottineau County and attended grade and high school at Dickinson where his father, Ralph Smith, was employed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Dickinson Experiment Station. Dr. Smith received his Bachelor of Science degree at NDAC in Agronomy in 1929 and went on to get his Master of Science degree at Kansas State College in 1931 and his Ph.D. at the U. of Minnesota in 1947.

In 1947 Smith became the Associate Dean of the School of Agriculture and Associate Director of the Experiment Station at NDAC. In 1951 he was named Principal Plant Breeder and Chief of the Division of Plant Industry at NDAC, positions he will continue to hold in addition to his new duties.

Among the scholastic honors held by Dean Smith are memberships in Phi Kappa Phi and Alpha

Zeta, National scholastic honorary fraternities; membership in Gamma Sigma Delta, National agricultural research honor society and a membership in Sigma XI, Scientific research honor society.

Dr. Smith has been responsible for the development of four new strains of durum wheat, all of which have been grown extensively in North Dakota and two of which are still popular growing strains in the state. The Stewart and Carleton durums were developed in 1943, the Venum durum in 1946 and the Nugget durum in 1948. Dr. Smith is presently engaged in rust-resistance research.

Dr. and Mrs. Smith have three children—Nancy (Mrs. Robert Ouradnik, a 1953 graduate in Home Economics at NDAC; Ronald, a freshman in Applied Arts & Sciences at NDAC; and Robert, a sophomore at Fargo High.

A complete Graduate School catalog will be prepared and ready for distribution before school opens at NDAC in September.

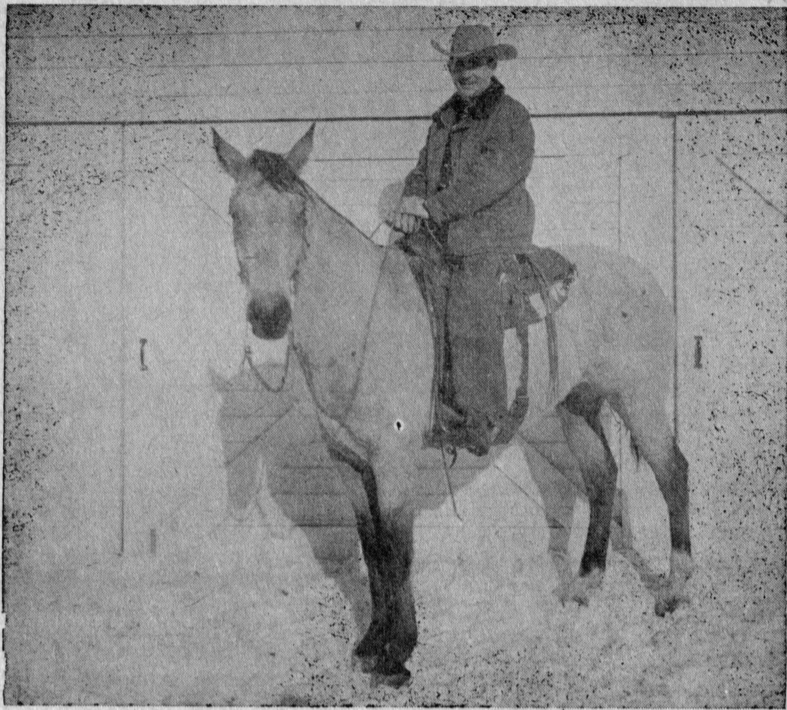
Regional LSA Meet To Plan Conference

Blue Key Presents Showing Of Slides Of NDAC Buildings In College Library

The premier showing of a group of colored slides portraying many buildings on our campus was held recently at the college library. Those invited to attend included presidents of all campus organizations, Senior Staff members, Blue Key members, and various members of the faculty.

The slides, which were taken by Merle Nott, are the results of much work and planning done by Blue Key, national honorary fraternity.

Cereal Technology To Test Mexican Wheat

The cereal technology department of the NDAC experiment station recently received a \$5,000 a year grant to test rust resistant varieties of wheat for milling and baking qualities. Work is already under way on this project and over 200 samples of early generations are being tested.

The project was undertaken to fill the urgent need for wheat varieties that are resistant to race 15B stem rust. The Mexican government has given full cooperation to plant breeders and by growing the varieties in that country two crops may be raised in one year.

This will speed the release of rust resistant wheat by doubling the amount of seed available for propagation. The wheat that is grown is sent to the NDAC laboratory for quality checks.

The grant is to run for three years, and at the end of that time the project will be re-evaluated to determine whether it should be expanded or dropped.

Structures Class To Have Building Project

Agriculture students in the farm structures class are getting practical experience in the construction of farm buildings. They are building a garage to be used on the NDAC farmstead.

George Pratt, instructor of the class, has his students draw up the plans for the building, then go to the laboratory and build from them.

This procedure combines the theory of building along with very practical experience.

Textile Printing Shown By Art Department

A display featuring textile screen printing will be on exhibit in the upstairs lobby of the library from March 16 through March 30. The display is the work of the Art 216 class.

The Art 412 class, a displays class, will set up the exhibit.

The basic purpose of the slides is to promote a greater interest in college among high school students. This is to be accomplished by having different NDAC students take the slides into their individual communities and showing them to groups of prospective college students.

The slides include scenic pictures of the older buildings on our campus as well as pictures of the more newly built, modern buildings. Pictures of Ceres hall, Minard hall and Old Main make some very stately slides, while the library and the new Student Union add a modern touch.

Also included in the slides are shots of students actually in the process of performing laboratory experiments, and colorful views of the interior of the Student Union.

After the slides were shown, Nick Westman, president of Blue Key, asked for any comments or suggestions. It was suggested that parents as well as students should be shown these slides. Westman clarified the fact that the purpose of the slides is not to recruit students for NDAC, but to create within the high school students an interest for college in general.

He also stated that any department within the school is welcome to use the slides and add slides of their individual department for the purpose of student recruitment.

Miss Irene Crouch, home management specialist with the Extension Service, is the state president.

The agates being exhibited came from Montana, where they are found in commercial quantities; Wyoming, California, Texas, North Dakota and Brazil. India and Wyoming were the sources of jade specimens shown. Petrified wood collected in the southwestern states is also on exhibition.

NDAC Geology department, Dr. John D. LeMar of the Fargo clinic and John Kirk, senior in geology, contributed the gem specimens to the display. Featured with the gems are several books on gem collecting and cutting.

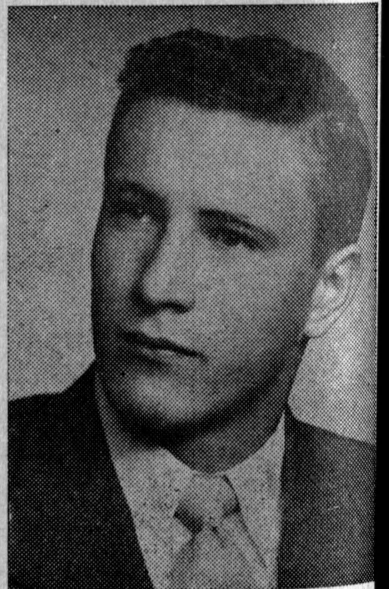

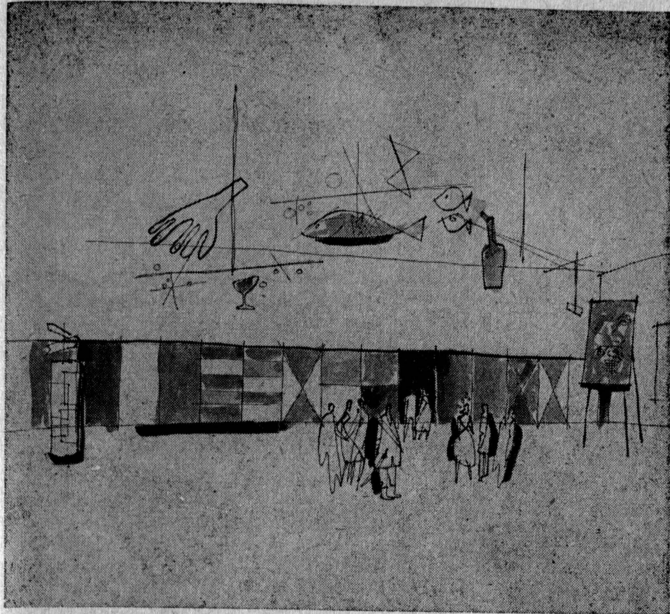

Duane Clodfelter, assistant coach for the past season at SDU, has been elevated to the head basketball coaching post in an announcement Tuesday, March 9.

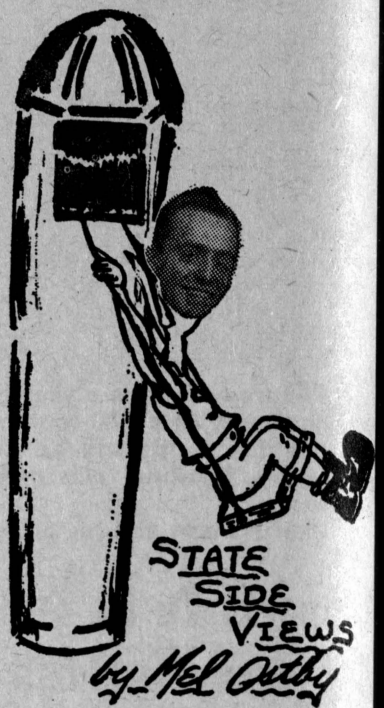
Clodfelter succeeds Carl B (Rube) Hoy who announced his retirement from active coaching three weeks ago after 23 seasons as Coyote Mentor.

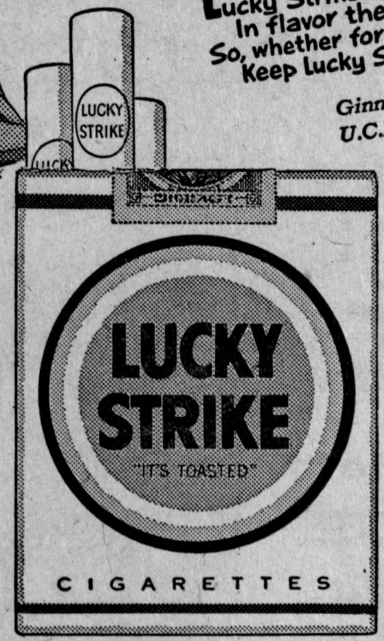

New Positions Opened By Ordnance Corps

Excellent opportunities for advanced specialized and technical training in the field of ammunition inspection was made possible recently by the arrangements made by the Ordnance Corps of the Department of the Army with the U. S. Civil Service Commission.

This new program set up by the Ordnance Corps is one to recruit college graduates for Ammunition Inspector (Surveillance) positions at the trainee level, GS-5 at \$3410 per year.

According to the training program established, qualified persons will be given 12 weeks pre-school training at Black Hills Ordnance Depot, promoted to GS-6 positions at \$3795 a year and sent to Savanna Ordnance Depot, Savanna, Illinois for a 6 month course of technical instruction. Upon successful completion of this course trainees will be promoted to the GS-7 grade level at \$4205 a year either immediately or not to exceed 6 months after the course is completed.

To qualify applicants must be graduates with a degree either in the fields of science or engineering, specifically, chemistry, chemical engineering, physics, mechanical engineering, electrical engineering, and allied fields, or have completed work equivalent to a major in the scientific or engineering field specified, for example a degree in education with a major in chemistry.

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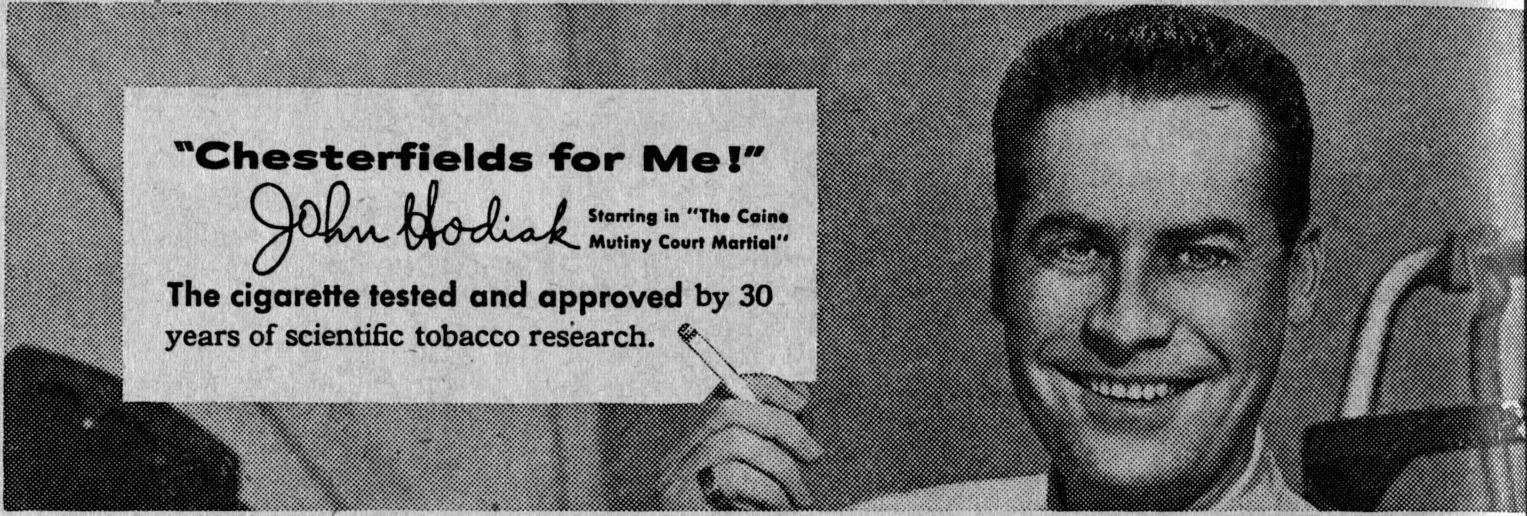
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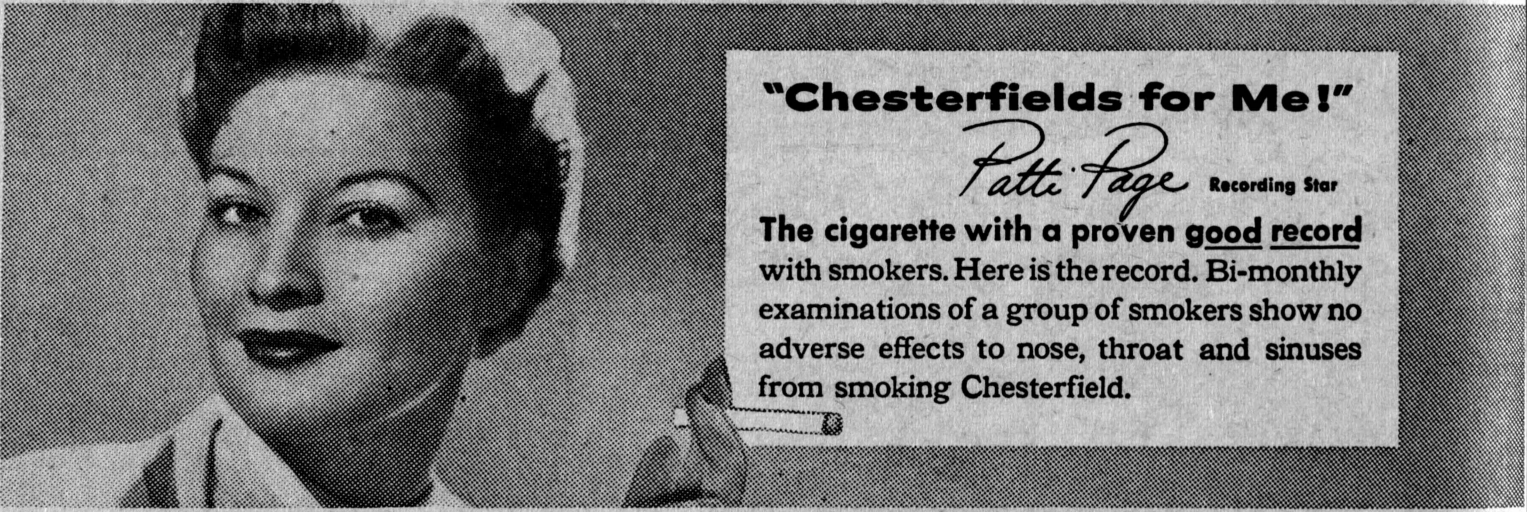
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
