## Rhode Island Man Appointed Ag Econ Chairman At SC

Dr. Fred R. Taylor has been appointed chairman of agricultural economics in the college and agricultural economist in the experiment station at North Dakota State College, according to an announcement by Dr. Fred S. Hultz, president.

Dr. Taylor, presently head of a twelve-man department of agricultural economics at the University of Rhode Island, is a native of Minnesota and holds the bachelor's, master's, and doctor's degrees from the University of Minnesota.

After graduation there in 1938 he taught as vocational agricultural teacher at Bertha, Minn., for two years; was for two years county agricultural agent in Todd and Hubbard Counties in Minnesota; spent four years in the South Pacific theater as an officer during World War II; and was an instructor in agricultural economics at the University of Minnesota following the war until 1950 when he went to Rhode Island as an associate professor.

In 1951 Dr. Taylor became head of the agricultural economics department at the University of Rhode Island where he is credited with having developed a strong department in that field during the past four years.

He will report at NDSC on July 1, 1955, succeeding Perry V. Hemphill who has been acting head since July 1.

## Army ROTC Names Roster Honor Student

Cadet Nicholas Roster has been selected as the distinguished military student in the North Dakota State College Army ROTC program, according to Col. Otto B. Cloudt, professor of military science and tactics. Roster is a senior Applied Arts and Science student, with a physical education major.

A distinguished military student is a senior designated by the professor of military science and tactics after careful and thorough consideration of his qualifications. The student must possess outstanding qualities of leadership, high moral character, and definite aptitude for the military service.

He must remain within the upper half of his class according to academic averages, must demonstrate his leadership ability through achievements in campus activities and must have a sufficient standing in military subjects.

As a result of being declared distinguished military student, and with a continuation of a high academic average, he may be declared a distinguished military graduate and be eligible to apply for a regular army position.

Nick is a member of Theta Chi fraternity, Scabbard and Blade, Newman club, board of publications, Interfraternity council and business manager of the Bison.

## Davis Returns For Monday Convo To Discuss Education

One of the few platform men to be invited by J. Edgar Hoover to speak at the FBI Academy in Washington, Howard Pierce Davis will lead off winter term convocations with a talk at Festival Hall Monday at 9:40. Brought back because of student interest in his talk a year ago, he will discuss the impact of current developments abroad on education in America.

Other convos scheduled include one for Religious Emphasis Week, the NDU-SC basketball rally, and an unusual musical group playing instruments used in the late middle ages and Renaissance.

Crisp and vigorous presentation accounts for part of Davis's success, according to F. G. Schoff of the convo committee. "Few men say as much as he in as few words," said Schoff. "I think this fact combined with his sharp and penetrating discussion has kept him at the top in his field."

Davis started his career by an extended first-hand study in Munich in 1931 of Hitler's rise to power. Fascinated and horrified, he made himself an authority on the techniques of totalitarianism.

In recent years he has been on hand to watch the birth of the United Nations, the World Federalists, and other developments of significance.

Extensive and regular trips in Europe and the Middle East have kept him in first-hand touch with the movements of world affairs as he prepared each year for his lecture tours.

Born and raised in New England, David has served as minister in New England churches. Since he turned to lecturing, he has been recalled more than once by major universities, as well as speaking before business and educational groups.

His current tour has been arranged by the U. of Minnesota concert, lecture, and theatre service.

## SC Enrollment Sees Steady Increase

Enrollment figures at the North Dakota State College have been steadily growing for the past several academic years. Present high school enrollments about the state show that the number of college students will grow with each passing year for at least the next ten years.

NDSC president, Dr. Fred S. Hultz, points out that added enrollment means added teaching staff and classroom and laboratory space.

The 1955-57 NDSC budget requests include additional staff members as follows: four assistant professors, thirteen instructors and eight graduate assistants. Seven of these instructors are scheduled for the school of agriculture, five for the school of engineering and thirteen in service courses such as English, mathematics, speech and the sciences.

A pharmacy building to replace the present Francis Hall, one of the oldest buildings on the NDSC campus has been placed on the college budget. The present pharmacy building is impractical and inadequate for the use of the school of pharmacy and the cost of modernizing the building would be more than the value of the aged structure.

A request for authority to construct a self-liquidating men's dormitory without state appropriations has also been made.

grand prize for direction, "The Young and the Damned" is showing to record crowds in New York City.

This will be the first Northwest showing of the film.

In the movie the violence portrayed is not the usual make-believe kind we are accustomed to. The boys in the film live in a world where success is not possible.

To rob there is only a depraved old blind man. To beat up there is only a legless beggar. To kill there are only members of the gang.

Everything and everyone within this world is wild and terrifying and one who wanders into it must grow wild or perish.

In this environment it is possible to be a healthy bricklayer, but not for long. It is possible to enjoy the comforts of a modern training farm, but not for long.

The film is a case study in pain and brutality, recorded as carefully and unemotionally as a research scientist would record the symptoms of a patient's lingering and comfortless disease.

Made in Mexico City, with Spanish dialogue and English subtitles, the film records only the straight facts of life in a jungle.

Coach Chuck Bentson of the Bison will probably stick to his regular line-up of Gene Gamache and John McDermott at forward, Jim Akason and Doug Walstad at guards, and Grut Anderson at center.

## Bison Drop Two Crucial Road Contests To SDSC, Augustana In NCC Blasts

After emerging the North Central Conference Tourney champions, the North Dakota State Bison dropped their first league game last Monday.

Playing at Brookings the Herd fell victim to a red hot South Dakota State team, 82-67. The Bison had previously eked out a 57-56 semifinal victory over the Jackrabbits during the tournament.

The Bunnies shot a terrific 52 per cent from the floor in the second half to grab the victory. Half time score favored the South Dakotans, 30-27.

With the Bison accused of 27 personal fouls and the loss of Grut Anderson and John McDermott, the Rabbits coupled a lot of hustle and super phenomenal shooting to outrun the Herd.

The one consolation the Bison salvaged was the fact that Grut Anderson scored 23 points, high for the contest. Gene Gamache and McDermott tallied 14 and 10 respectively.

Virg Riley led the Jacks with 20 counters followed by Jim Sutton, Dean Antonie, and Curt Huska who all scored double figures.

The inability of the back court scoring punch of Doug Walstad and Jim Akason hurt the Bison tremendously. Walstad suffered a finger injury during Sunday's workout.

After losing 35 consecutive contests, the hapless Augustana Vikings got red hot and dropped the North Dakota State Bison 63-61 in a league contest played at Sioux Falls.

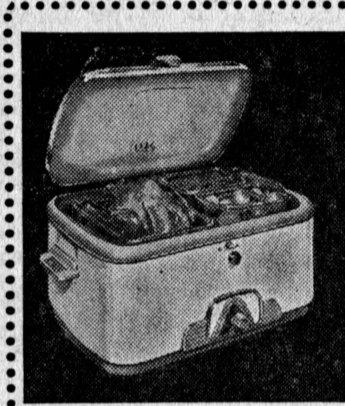
The travel weary Herd picked up their second conference defeat in as many nights and now own a 1-2 league record. The Bison were unimpressive and were beaten again at the free throw line, scoring only 19 out of 35 gift tosses.

Augustana had not won a league game since the 1952 campaign except for a forfeited affair last season against South Dakota University.

Doug Walstad paced the Bison attack with 18 points indicating his hand injury is responding to treatment.

Colonel Cloudt has been PMS&T at NDSC since August 1952, coming here from a year's assignment to the military advisory assistant group in Turkey. He

was graduated from the command and general staff school in 1951.

Colonel Cloudt's promotion to full colonel highlights a military career of 16 years service. He is an ROTC graduate of Texas A & M in 1939 and immediately entered into active service at that time. He is a native of Rock-springs, Texas.

During World War II, Colonel Cloudt saw action with the 94th Infantry Division in Europe. He commanded the 3rd Battalion, 302nd Infantry Regiment in combat. Among the Colonel's decorations are the Silver Star, Bronze Star for Valor and the French Croix De Guerre.

Boeing Airplane Company will interview engineering students on Tuesday and Wednesday, January 18 and 19.

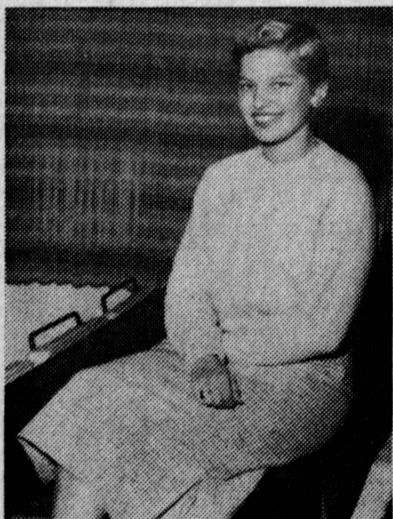
A representative of Babcock and Wilcox company will interview engineering seniors on Thursday, January 20, 1955.
