This resolution was approved by the student senate last Tuesday evening, to make sure that no presidential candidate wins with only a very slim margin.

If no candidate receives forty percent of the vote cast, the top three contenders will be entered in a special election set for Monday, March 14. In this special election the can-

didate who collects the most votes will become the new president of the student body.

Another election rule passed by the senate recently prohibits all campaigning on election day. All electioneering must stop before the polls open at 8 next Wednes-

day mornnig.

Also, no public address systems will be allowed on campus on election day. That is to say, no PA systems that urge voters to back a certain candidate for student office will be permitted to function while the election places are in operation.

Voting methods have also been approved by the student senate.

One vote may be cast for student president, six for two year senator, and seven for one year senator.

The resignation of Renee Baker from her two year Senate post opens another one year term to the voters. The added senator will be elected to serve out the unexpired year of Renee's two

Six candidates will be elected for two year senate terms, and seven one year senators.

Each voter may cast only vote for student president, but the votes for senator may be divided in anyway.

For the two year terms the six votes allowed may be cast altogether, or in any combina-tion totalling six. The seven votes for one year senate may also be cast together, or in any combination totalling seven.

Student Government Info

The president of the student body at NDSC serves as the presiding officer at all student senate meetings. He votes only in case of a tie, but has authority to bring business before the student senate for debate and action.

In effect the student body president serves as the representative of the student government in dealings with the school administration, and in other such matters.

Also, the student body president has the authority to appoint student commissioners; with the ap-

ate: but at times the appointees bers.

The student commissioners are

boards of the student government. These boards include campus affairs, music and public programs, athletics, student union, radio, and publications.

Commissioners serve as chairmen of these boards which are composed of students and faculty members. They are directly responsible for the activities of

cuss matters which may affect all of the student commissions.

Student senators make up the actual legislative branch of the student government. The senators are directly responsible to the students of the college for their actions, and hence, are us-ually anxious to fulfill the desires of the student body.

Members of the senate also serve as members of the various commissions and in many cases, also as commissioners.

The student senate is composed of eighteen members, not counting the student body president. Each year it consists of six members elected for two year terms; Student commissioners are often six members elected for one year porting first to Lackland AFB at being used as ballots. Each ticket appointed from the student senterms, and six carry-over mem-

Training For Vets

Veterans may make application with the PMST for Advanced Military. A serviceman with 12 months or more service may be given constructive credit for the basic course. In order to apply for advanced training, veteran must not have reached the age of 27 years.

Some benefits which will accrue to a student pursuing this course leading to a commission are subsistence at the rate of ninety cents per day, uniform allowance of \$100, pay for attendance at Summer Camp between his Junior and Senior year, and a commission in the U.S. Army Reserve upon successful completion of the program.

All non-service ROTC graduates are required to serve on active duty for a period of two years after commissioning. In the case of veterans with prior military service, it is the intent of the Department of the Army that any individual who may qualify for a draf deferred status due to prior military service, will not be ordered to active

All veterans interested in obtaining additional details of this program are urged to contact the Army PMST.



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
