Student Government Info
The president of the student body at NDSC serves as the presiding officer at all student sen ate meetings. He votes only in case of a tie, but has authority to bring business before the student senate for debate and action.

In effect the student body president serves as the representative of the student govern ment in dealings with the school administration, and in other such matters.
Also, the student body presiden has the authority to appoint student commissioners; with the ap proval of the student senate.
Student commissioners are often ate; but at times the appointees b

The student commissioners are boards of the student government. These boards include campus hese music and public programs airs, music and public programs, publications.
Commissioners serve as chairmen of these boards which are composed of students and faculty members. They are directly re-
sponsible for the activities of sponsible for the act
In addition the student commissioners act as a special board which meets twice-monthly with the student body president to disuss matters which may affect all f the student commissions.
Student senators make up the actual legislative branch of the student government. The senators are directly responsible to the students of the college for their actions, and hence, are 4sually anxious to fulfill the desires of the student body.
Members of the senate also serve as members of the various commissions and in many cases, also as commissioners.
The student senate is composed of eighteen members, not counting the student body president, Each year it consists of six members elected for two year terms, erms, and six carry-over mem: bers.

Veterans may make application with the PMST for Advanced Military. A serviceman with 12 months or more service may be given constructive credit for the
basic course. In order to apply basic course. In order to apply for advanced training, veteran must not have reached the age of 27 years.
Some benefits which will accrue to a student pursuing this course leading to a commission are sub sistence at the rate of ninety cents per day, uniform allowance of $\$ 100$, pay for attendance at Summer Camp between his Jun ior and Senior year, and a commis sion in the U. S. Army Reserve upon successful completion of the program.
