350 Grads Finish; Beckwith, Sudro To Get Doctorates

The sixty-first annual Commencement Exercises of the North Dakota State College will start Monday, June 6, at 10:00 a.m., at the Field House.

This year approximately 350 degrees will be awarded by NDSC. This total, including two Honorary Doctor of Science degrees, represents the graduating senior class and several Graduate degrees.

Newell P. Beckwith, who graduated from NDSC in 1936 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry, is one of the recipients of the Honorary Doctor of Science degree. Mr. Beckwith, who graduated from Central High School in Fargo prior to his entering NDSC, continued to attend NDSC on a teaching fellowship working toward a Master of Science degree in Paint Technology.

While attending college, Mr. Beckwith was a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Alpha Phi Omega, Scabbard and Blade, and Alpha Sigma Tau.

After leaving NDSC, Mr. Beckwith served as a paint chemist with the Chrysler Corporation from 1937 to 1940. In 1940 Mr. Beckwith went to the Rinsched-Mason Paint Company, working for the concern as a pain formulator and foreman.

In 1941 Mr. Beckwith was called to active duty with the Army. Entering service at that time as a First Lieutenant, he was released from active duty in 1946 with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

Returning to Rinsched-Mason Paint Company after his discharge, Mr. Beckwith continued to advance until, in 1954, he was given the duties of Vice-president and General Manager of the Rinsched-Mason Paint Company of Canada. This was in addition to his duties as Vice-president and technical director of the United States branch of the company.

Dean William F. Sudro, who retires as Dean of the School of Pharmacy on July 1, will be honored with an honorary Doctor of Science degree during the NDSC commencement program. Dean Sudro, who for 48 years has been on the NDSC faculty, received his Master of Science Degree in Pharmacy from the University of Wisconsin in 1907.

Dean Sudro, who supervised the analysis of nearly every type of beverage on the market in this country, was one of the pioneers who worked under the direction of Dr. Ladd, internationally famous author of the Food and Drug Act. Standards for gasoline and motor fuels in North Dakota and many other states were developed by Dean Sudro.

Dr. Fred Hultz, President of NDSC, will confer the degrees to the graduates. Commencement Marshalls at the event will be Dr. Christian Jensen, H. Dean Stallings, and Dr. Clifton E. Miller.

In charge of seating will be Captain Bruce Berk, Assistant Professor of Military Science and Tactics. Assisting him will be members of Senior Staff and Blue Key.

Hearings Adjourn; Area Awaits Word On Group Decision

Hearings for the four suspended NDSC professors drew to a close at 5 p.m. Tuesday of this week. The hearings held in the lower reading room of the library ended following testimony of 27 rebuttal witnesses called by E. T. Conmy, Dr. Hultz's lawyer.

The hearings had been recessed from 6 p.m. Friday to 2 p.m. Tuesday after Dr. Posin indicated he had more direct evidence to present.

Philip R. Bangs, attorney for Haver, Treumann and Kristjanson, rested his case at the close of last Friday's session.

Posin was slated to take the stand at the opening of Tuesday's session, but Bangs rested his case at the beginning of the session. J. F. Conmy, Posin's lawyer was unable to attend Tuesday's session.

At the close of Tuesday's activity Bangs moved that the charges against the four be dismissed and that the advisory committee recommend dismissal of the charges against the four.

Dean Frank Mirgain, committee chairman said the motions would be considered later.

Bangs also asked that he and Conmy be given copies of the findings of the advisory committee when prepared.

Midway in last week's testimony Dr. Reece L. Bryant, chairman of Poultry Husbandry, testified that he did not consider Treumann's, Posin's and Kristjanson's actions at college council meetings as heaving.

Lloyd Forness, poultry extension agent took the stand next and testified that he and other officers of the state poultry improvement board had been called to Fargo by Dr. Hultz to discuss removing Dr. Bryant from the department.

At the meeting Forness stated that Dr. Hultz explained that due to tenure he could not remove a faculty member except on proof of incompetency and that if the poultry industry would give support he would go ahead with the removal. Forness further stated no action was taken.

At the Tuesday meeting of the Fargo City commission it was voted that the 10 veterans housing units on 13th Street in the North Court area are to be removed.

Action was taken last week to that effect, and it was moved to reconsider the action following a visit by NDSC officials to the Commission meeting. The motion to reconsider failed by a 3-2 vote.

Reasons for the action included statements by Fargo commissioners that the units are fire traps, and don't give people across the street a good view. Mrs. Zube stated "my husband went \$5000 in debt to finance his schooling and there was no war."

Dean Severson and Miss Edythe Toring attended the session and presented the veterans case, but to no avail.

Independents Hold Special Meeting On Reorganization

Following the advertising over the Student Senate P.A. system, and on posters around campus and in dorms, students flocked to the second planning meeting of the Independent Student Association, held yesterday in the small lounge of the Union.

At this noon meeting the plans were laid for the reorganization of the group on the campus of Old State next fall. Committees were appointed to investigate working independent groups at other schools and to contact present students and freshmen concerning the workings of the group. By fall, the group plans to have a program comparable to rushing for freshmen and transfer students.

The purpose of the Independent Student Association is to promote unity and cooperation among the independent students on campus and to enable them to present candidates for the Student Senate, for Homecoming Queen, and to enter into competition with the Greek organizations in Bison Brevities and Spring Sing. In addition the new group plans projects for charity and exchange social events with the Greeks. The object of the group is not to nourish antagonism between the Greeks and Independents, but rather to promote better relations and cooperation between them.

SC Student Senate Closes Out Year

Action taken at Tuesday's Student Senate commission meeting will establish the National Student Association on campus.

An NSA commission post was established through an amendment to the student government by-laws. Judy Sherwood proposed the positions on the commission will be subject to appointment by the student government president and the commissioner of NSA. Sherwood also introduced a list of duties for each position.

President Merlin Ludwig read a letter on the National NSA Convention to be held at the University of Minnesota from August 18 to September 2. Students interested in attending all or part of this convention are urged to contact Ludwig or Judy Sherwood.

Bands for the Homecoming Dance were discussed. It was moved that a maximum of \$1000 be allowed for securing a band. The possibility of having a name band was considered a poor financial risk.

Joan Nelson was appointed Commissioner of Music and Public Programs.

Ludwig reported on the progress of the College Council in regard to having representatives of the Student Government on the Council. The committee, headed by Glenn Hill, is investigating the possibility and is checking to see if such a policy is followed on other college campuses.

Clint Sparks, committee chairman, reported on the possibility of purchasing recognition keys for student government members. It was moved and passed that the committee buy the keys and distribute them to Senate members.

New hours for Women's Residence and Ceres Hall will be initiated next fall, according to Elaine Geisler, committee chairman. Hours will be 10 p.m. on weekdays for freshmen women, 11 p.m. for sophomores, juniors and seniors, and 2 a.m. on special occasions.

President Ludwig also made appointments for Homecoming activities. Merrill Johnson and Don Schwartz are parade marshalls, Bob Gion and Duane Swensen head the Queen committee, Lee Johnson is in charge of publicity and advertising, and Hal Miller is chairman of the Theme committee.

Rhodes Scholar Applications Ready Contact Dr. Hertel

Elections to Rhodes Scholarships will be held in all states in December, 1955. Scholars elect will enter Oxford in October, 1956. To be eligible a candidate must be a male citizen of the United States, must be between the ages of nineteen and twenty-five, and at the time of application must have at least junior standing at some recognized degree granting college or university in the United States.

A candidate who receives official endorsement of his college may apply either in the state in which he resides or in the state in which he may have received at least two years of his college education.

Applications must be in the hands of the secretary of the state committee (Professor F. Y. St. Clair, University of North Dakota, Box M, University Station, Grand Forks) not later than November 1, 1955. Application forms and other information can be obtained from Dean Seth Russell and Dr. Leo Hertel in Minard Hall.

next and testified that the copy of his article on graduated land tax introduced as exhibit 37 was not as he had written it.

Kristjanson further stated he did not believe it was insubordination on his part to publish the article.

Dr. Frank Cassel, president of the NDSC chapter of AAUP stated he was shocked and chagrined at the statement read by Dr. Hultz at the October meeting of the college council. He also stated that the national AAUP has agreed to investigate the SC situation but action is pending awaiting the outcome of the hearings.

In last Friday's session the defense called ten witnesses who testified as to the demeanor of Posni, Kristjanson and Treumann at the April meeting and the statement ready by Dr. Hultz at the October meeting. They asserted that Dr. Hultz referred to Psion, Treumann, Kristjanson and Dr. R. Schickele as troublemakers.

Haver nad Treumann also testified in Friday's sessions.

Bangs attempted to submit as evidence two letters signed by several SC faculty members, but both were refused by the committee.

In Tuesdays testimony the remodeling fo Old Main was discussed. Dr. Hultz stated that educational funds may have been used but if so it was with the consent of the board of Higher Education since all expenditures over \$300.00 must be approved.

In closing the hearings E. T. Conny called 23 rebuttal witnesses to the stand to answer three general questions, namely "Was your academic freedom ever violated", "Do you know of any violations of tenure," "Were you ever intimidated by President Hultz?" In essence each answer was no.

The advisory committee adjourned into general session Wednesday in an effort to submit a recommendation to the Board of Higher Education. As of Spectrum press time no further releases were available.
