The first of these is the most mportant; good results must have good foundation. The past yea pent as a student senator ha government, and has in studen government, and has all but elim nated the necessity of becoming ody president.
This saving of time will allow the majority of my time to be spent in doing the work. Time is the es sence, as many senate projects re quire several quarters to be successfully completed. Equally important is experience, which al lows one to differentiate between those projects which are worth while and those which are best left other organizations.
