Finally, we feel that democratic procedures would demand that the board at least invite one student representative to be present to supply nformation when this important matter was discussed

The Board has defeated our proposal for a name-change but
has not and will not defeat the proposers.
They have acknowledged our right to bring this issue before the legislature and the voters of the state of North Dakota. This is
what we most assuredly will at tempt to do. Each and every reader of this paper should feel it his duty to inform others who are not in contact with our problem, of to erase the affrontery of the Board to the Legislature and the voters of North Dakota by over riding their decision.
This affrontery took a very 'no so subtle' approach. And yet it escaped notice by many of the citizens. In claiming that they would

ing the name to NDSU, they, in essence, attempt to dictate their whims to the Legislature. The
