Work To Begin On New Buildings

Work will start this summer on the first two of nine projected new buildings on the NDSC campus.

The 36th legislature appropriated money for two major buildings for the campus and gave permis-

sion for the college to arrange to build seven others.

Construction starts this summer on the new \$660,000 Pharmacy building which has been sought for several years. The 65x180 feet

building will be erected just north of the Sheppard-Union parking lot facing west on college street.

The second major building, Agricultural Science, for which the legislature authorized \$750,000, will be located across the street from the new Pharmacy building.

The seven other major building projects will use non-appropriated funds. They include a \$550,000 addition to Memorial Union; a \$200,000 college chapel—YMCA; two new \$700,000 men's dormitories, a \$500,000 women's dormitory; \$300,000 in married student housing, and a reserve armory for the U. S. Department of Defense for use by Fargo army reserve units.

Additional plant improvements results from legislative action this year. Improvements include two research greenhouses, campus water lines extension, Agricultural Engineering building completion and street surfacing.

Marine Officers To Present Program To NDSC Students

Marine Captain Arnold E. Bench announced this week that the Marine Corps officer selection team will visit this campus on Thursday and Friday, May 7 and 8.

Captain Bench stated that the

selection team would present two programs for college students leading to commissions as Marine ground officers and two programs which offer a Marine commission and assignment to flight training.

The platoon leaders class and the platoon leaders class aviation are summer training programs. They are open to freshmen and sophomores. They assure a college man that he will complete his college education prior to meeting his military obligation. Participation in two six-week summer training programs without interference in academic pursuits during the school year will lead to a second lieutenant's commission upon graduation.

The officer candidate course programs for seniors and recent graduates require ten weeks of indoctrination to commissioning.

The officer selection team will be located in the Student Memorial Union Building during their stay on the campus. They will accept applications for any of the above mentioned programs from qualified students. Students are invited to discuss their military obligations under the Armed Forces Act of 1955 with members of the selection team without any obligation.

Mary Louise Gludt Receives Award At Dietetic Meeting

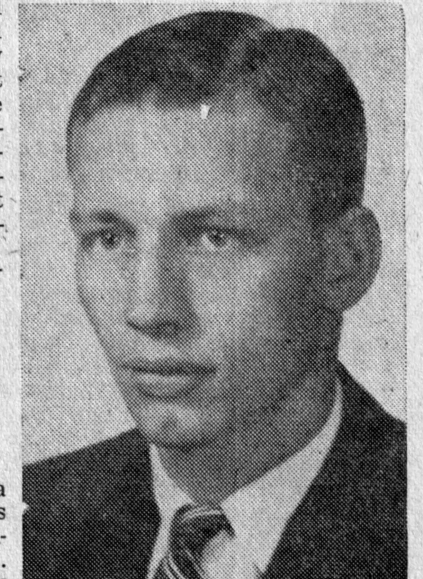

Dahm Places First In Chem Symposium

Donald Dahm, a senior majoring in chemistry at NDSC, presented the first place research paper at an Undergraduate Chemistry Symposium, April 18.



The symposium, held at St. Thomas College in St. Paul, Minn., was sponsored by the Minnesota Section of the American Chemical Society.

Dahm's winning paper was entitled "A Study of the Keto-Enol Tautomerism of the Beta-Keto-Aldehyde, Butanone-3-A1-1." It was written for a seminar course at NDSC.

Thomas Farley and Duane Tangen, senior chemistry majors at NDSC, presented a joint paper at the symposium. Dr. Franz Rathman, associate professor of organic chemistry at NDSC also attended.

2 SC Chemistry Students Receive Assistantships

Two chemistry students at North Dakota State College have received graduate assistantship appointments for the fall of 1959.

Duane Paulson will have a graduate teaching assistantship at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Hans Wong has a graduate assistantship at the University of Minnesota.

Paulson will complete work on his Master of Science degree at NDSC this summer. He received a B.S. from NDSC in 1958. He is a member of the Chemistry Club and American Chemical Society and received four Forman, Ford and Company scholarships as an undergraduate at SC. The award is given annually to the top scholastic ranking member of each class in the School of Chemistry.

Wong will graduate with a B.S. degree in chemistry this spring and will enroll in the Minnesota graduate school in the fall. He is a member of the Chemistry Club at NDSC and this year received the club's award for outstanding work in chemistry.

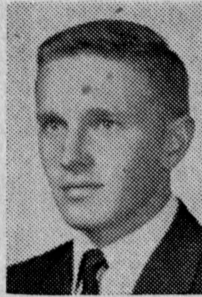

Bill Lantz, Commissioner of Campus Affairs, presented a tentative schedule for Freshman Orientation containing numerous proposed improvements over last year's program. The senate appropriated a maximum of \$700 for the completion of this event.

Ron Ginsbach, Commissioner of NSA, explained the purposes of this organization and also commented on an organizational meeting to be held for the North Dakota region of NSA. Finances for food and transportation for approximately five people were approved.

The following bills were presented and approved: Five pages in Bison Annual—\$85.00; Dean of Students for stencils, paper, etc.—\$21.70; Expenses to NSA regional assembly at St. Thomas College—\$58.00; Freshman orientation for paper, stencils, etc.—\$11.00; and place cards for senate banquet—\$1.28.

It was pointed out that the Student Body president receives \$50 per quarter from senate. It was decided to give Cy Peutz \$25 for his extra service due to the last election but to still give Estenson \$50 for this quarter.

Meeting was started one-half

hour late due to the tardiness of 12 persons. The following persons were absent but excused: Bucky Haas, Jim O'Keefe, Jerry Stockman, and Larry Van Sickle.

The next meeting will be held May 12 at seven o'clock in the library.

Guest speaker was Pastor Arne Kvaalen, pastor at the Campus Lutheran Center, who spoke on the subject "Relation of Art and Architecture."

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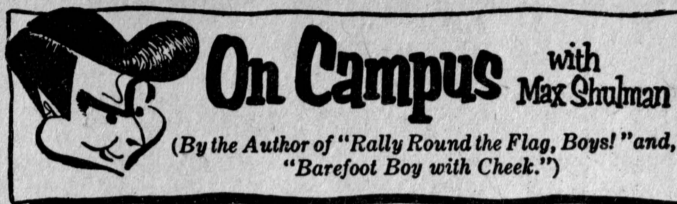
