## Salvador Dali Attempts Surrealism in Italian Film "Un Chien Andalou"

"Life is a bore" is a comment often heard but members of the Fargo-Moorhead Film Society disagreed after viewing "Gold of Naples" Sept. 29.
"Gold of Naples" was the first of a series of six films to be shown in the Moorhead State College library theatre by the film society. Starring Sophia Loren, Vittorio de Sica and Sylvana Mangano, the film included four short vignettes of life in Naples. Both photography and acting reflected the highly emotional reactions of the Italian to what Americans would consider everyday situations.

Nelson says that the part the counseling and testing department plays is that of serving the program.

If a student wishes to obtain tutoring he should inquire at the counseling and testing department. He can find out there what tutors are available and how to contact them. Then the student can call on the tutor to decide where and when the tutoring service can be held. The cost of tutoring, as set by the committee, will be $\$ 2.50$ per session for one indivdiual and $\$ .50$ for each additional student. It was not decided by the committee how long each session should last However, it was proposed that not more than four students be taken by one tutor at one time.
Nelson states that if there is any student who wishes tutoring in fields other than those previously listed, the counseling and testing department will try to make it available.

Last year a similar program was offered and did help several students. Nelson cautions that students should not feel that the tutoring service is a substitute for studying.
Nelson says that students should familiarize themselves with the help sessions offered by many departments before seeking tutoring partments sessions may be all a student needs and they cost the studen nothing.
