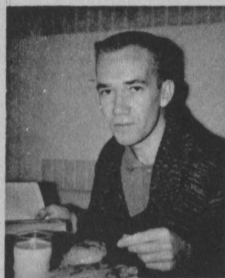

Salvador Dali Attempts Surrealism in Italian Film "Un Chien Andalou"

"Life is a bore" is a comment often heard but members of the Fargo-Moorhead Film Society disagreed after viewing "Gold of Naples" Sept. 29.

"Gold of Naples" was the first of a series of six films to be shown in the Moorhead State College library theatre by the film society. Starring Sophia Loren, Vittorio de Sica and Sylvana Mangano, the film included four short vignettes of life in Naples. Both photography and acting reflected the highly emotional reactions of the Italian to what Americans would consider everyday situations.

Ants crawling from a hole in a man's hand, a human eye being slashed by a razor blade, a human hand in a street, all trademarks of the unique Salvador

dor Dali, confronted film society viewers in "Un Chien Andalou," one of Luis Bunuel's earliest films, Bunuel and Dali attempt pure surrealism, which means a work of art produced from the subconscious.

Some say the short movie confronted the speaker with himself; his own distresses, unavowed desires, and moral fumbings. This, of course, was for the spectator himself to decide.

"This Strange Passion," the feature film, was the story of a girl who married a pathologically jealous man who eventually tried to kill her. It gave a probing analysis of the inward obsessions of a paranoid coupled with his distorted outlook on reality.

Bunuel also gave the viewer a chance to criticize society in its blindness. "This Strange Passion" allowed the viewer to see the ironic twists of "class" society.

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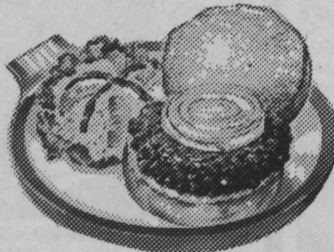
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Students to Discuss Problems

Tutoring Service Offered

Do you need extra help with your schooling? You should become familiar with the tutoring

service being offered at NDSC, says Laverne W. Nelson, assistant director of counseling and testing. The tutoring service was set up by the student counseling committee to help students. Tutors in mathematics, physics, English and chemistry have already been arranged.

Nelson says that the part the counseling and testing department plays is that of serving the program.

If a student wishes to obtain tutoring he should inquire at the counseling and testing department. He can find out there what tutors are available and how to contact them. Then the student can call on the tutor to decide where and when the tutoring service can be held.

The cost of tutoring, as set by the committee, will be \$2.50 per session for one individual and \$5.00 for each additional student. It was not decided by the committee how long each session should last. However, it was proposed that not more than four students be taken by one tutor at one time.

Nelson states that if there is any student who wishes tutoring in fields other than those previously listed, the counseling and testing department will try to make it available.

Last year a similar program was offered and did help several students. Nelson cautions that students should not feel that the tutoring service is a substitute for studying.

Nelson says that students should familiarize themselves with the help sessions offered by many departments before seeking tutoring. Help sessions may be all a student needs and they cost the student nothing.

It is the best thing that has ever happened to baseball and we salute the Pirate manager, "cigar smoking" Danny Murtaugh.

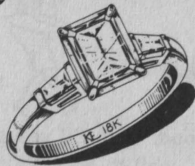
All I can say is that I hope the Yankees are in the World Series next year and that the Chicago Cubs beat them in four straight games.

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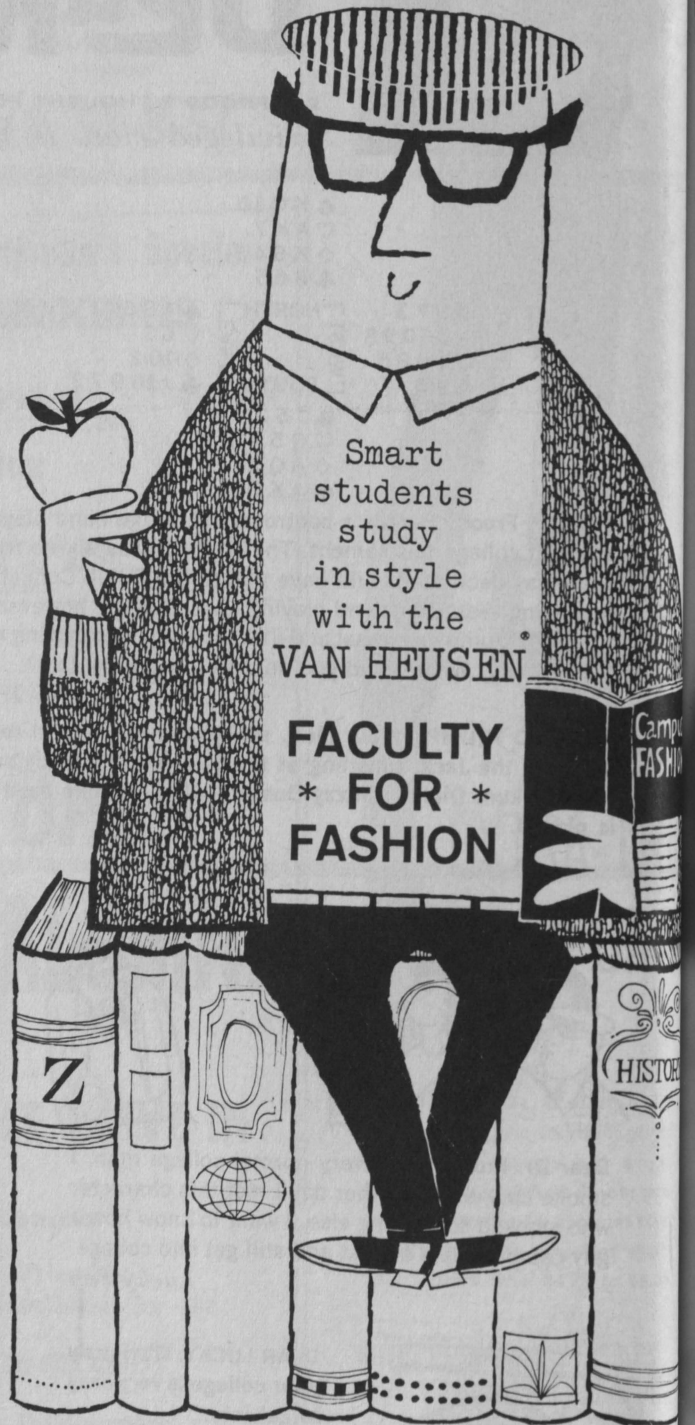
