

CAROUSEL OPENS AFTER TWO MONTHS WORK

When the 55-member cast of *Carousel*, the eighth annual Blue Key All-University Production, streams on stage in the opening carnival pantomime tonight, the dividends will be paid to more than 200 students for nearly 60 days of hard labor.

Performances of the Rodgers & Hammerstein musical are scheduled at 8:15 p.m. tonight, Friday and Saturday at the Fieldhouse. Tickets are available at Daveau's Music Store and the NDSU Memorial Union.

Sponsored by Blue Key, national honorary service fraternity, proceeds from the annual production are used for campus-wide scholarships and an annual Doctor of Service Award banquet honoring the outstanding NDSU faculty member. More than 4,600 persons attended the three-day run of *Oklahoma* last spring.

The 36-member Blue Key group nurtures, directs, and promotes the play from its late February beginning through the closing performance.

"A tradition of quality is being built into Blue Key productions through the contagious enthusiasm projected by the Blue Key members," explained Marilyn Nass, assistant professor of women's physical education. Miss Nass has served as main director and choreographer of the Blue Key productions since they were started in 1960.

"*Carousel* is more of a musical comedy-tragedy and involves more acting than previous productions," continued Miss Nass. "But we feel we have a strong cast with no weak parts, and we're confident it'll be our best show."

Miss Nass went on to explain that spending an average of four hours a day, six days a week since early March hasn't dampened any of the original enthusiasm displayed by the cast and production crew.

"*Carousel* is a lot more difficult to pull off than we originally thought," said Stephen Ludwick, student director of *Carousel*. "The play calls for intense acting, instantaneous mood changes, and a huge combination of fun and sadness in a lump."

"A better chorus, and better acting than I've ever seen in our productions will help us to pull this thing off," predicted Ludwick. But he was quick to point out the importance of others, behind the scene production people and the all-student band.

Leo (Johnson) Ludwick, an instructor in art, began working with a ten-man crew three weeks ago at painting canvas backdrops measuring 15 by 35 feet, one a wharf scene and the other a park.

"I drew them in with pencil and my assistants painted with latex and regular house brushes to get the proper effect." Mrs. Ludwick also led the ten-man crew that talked the Fargo City Park Board into lending *Carousel* a merry-go-round and a slide for sets.

"Now we're working at getting them in and out in ten seconds," said Mrs. Ludwick. "Getting a carousel that would work and yet was small enough to move quickly was a problem, and the park board was gracious enough to provide us with the answer."

A 28-member student orchestra, under the direction of Pat Hallock, 25, a sophomore in Music, will play 31 different numbers in the course of the 2½ hour show. Hallock leads a group of largely NDSU Gold Star Band students and several string players from North and South High School. He was named as the orchestra leader by Kappa Kappa Psi, honorary band fraternity at NDSU.

The play, recently called his favorite by Richard Rodgers, one of its creators, takes place in a New England coastal town in the year 1873. It's the story of a hometown girl who falls in love with a carnival barker. After his death in an attempted burglary, the barker is given a chance 15 years later to do one good deed in a period of 24 hours.

Fears censorship

Committee cancels films under pressure

Underground films for the rest of the year were temporarily cancelled last week pending an investigation. Acting President Laurel Loftsgard recommended the films not be shown until after the Student Film Committee had justified its selection of the underground movies.

John E. Carlson, Jr., president of the Memorial Union Corporation, brought the films to the attention of Loftsgard. Carlson was upset by the film titles (*Hold Me While I'm Naked*, *Confessions of a Black Mother Scuba* and others). "I'm not a prude," said Carlson, "and some of these films may very well be excellent, but I think you need further consideration. I don't think I would bring my minister to see some of them."

After receiving word from Loftsgard to look into the situation, David Young, Dean of Students, called Ray Kril, Director of Student Activities, and informed him of Loftsgard's wishes. "The President has stated it is his opinion the films should not be presented until after further investigation," said Young.

Board appoints

Carvell named editor elect

Kevin Carvell, *Spectrum* columnist, was named editor of the newspaper for the 1968-69 academic year at last week's Board of Publications meeting.

Carvell, who writes the weekly column "Between You and Me," was serving as managing editor at the time of his appointment. He now assumes the title of Editor-elect for the remainder of the year and will serve under the present editor.

He is associate editor of the *Apex*, weekly supplement to the *Valley Times*. The *Apex* is distributed free of charge on the Fargo-Moorhead campuses. Gary Rudolf was named as *Spectrum* business manager for the 1968-69 academic year at the

Kril and Steve Quine, student head of the Film Committee, called a meeting of the committee which then decided to cancel the remainder of the year's program as a protest, rather than fight the administration and be forced to submit to possible censorship.

A notice to that effect in the *Tri-College Calendar* created a campus furor and a group of students and faculty members met with Young Friday afternoon to discuss the issue.

Young admitted the administration had probably gotten into the situation the wrong way, but announced he thought the Film Committee should still reinvestigate its methods of film selection. Kril, advisor to the group, and Quine attempted to defend the group.

"We don't pick any of these films blindly," said Quine. "We read about the directors and their philosophies, go over the plots in the film catalogue and finally select those we think would be suitable."

"We were probably a little hasty in cancelling the films,"

said Dean Schoeder, one of the committee members.

The Film Committee met again Sunday night and decided to attempt a defense of its film selection before the administration and reverse its cancellation of the underground movies.

Confessions of a Black Mother Scuba and *Smeerguntz*, however, were still not presented yesterday

as previously scheduled. At the Friday meeting Young had advised the students not to show any of the films until they had gained approval of Dr. Loftsgard.

Young, who was to relay the Film Committee's defense to Loftsgard, was out of town until Wednesday and thus unable to do so.

Erhardt named to top spot

Ron Erhardt added another notch to his record last week when he was appointed Director of Athletics and Physical Education.

Erhardt, only 36 years old, has moved up the ladder rapidly since his arrival on the NDSU scene five years ago. Hired originally as defensive coach, he quickly became an assistant professor of physical education, assistant athletic director, head of the recruiting program and varsity football coach.

Erhardt as both a coach and an athlete seems almost infallible. His too-good-to-be-true record begins at Mandan High School where he was an all-star in both football and basketball. Moving on to Jamestown College, he was a three year letterman in football, basketball and baseball.

During his past years with the Thundering Herd, they've rolled up a 41-9 record with only four losses in the last four seasons. As head varsity coach, his personal record is 17-3. Local fans who do not attend out of town games have not seen the Bison lose at Dakotah Field in four years.

This year's team was first nationally in rushing, fourth in offense, and seventh in scoring among small colleges. It also finished an astonishing first in all seven North Central Conference team statistical departments.

Five of Erhardt's players on the nationally ranked teams of 1966 and 1967 earned Little All-American honors.

Erhardt himself was awarded the Coach of the Year Award in North Dakota and Football Coach of the Year by District Six of the American Football Coaches Association. In 1962, he earned runner up honors as North Dakota's Coach of the Year.

Erhardt's appointment is the last in a massive revamping of the athletic structure at NDSU. Dr. Richard Koppenhaver, the former Director of Athletics, was the first to go, accepting a similar position at Mankato State College.

The following week, Bud Belk, successful freshman basketball coach for two seasons, replaced Doug Cowman as head basketball coach and Ev Kjelbertson became defensive line coach.

Whitey Bodine of Minot was appointed freshman football coach and varsity baseball coach to replace Kjelbertson. Jerry Harter is acting as interim baseball coach.

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Senate urges maintenance of all NDSU parking lots

Buildings and Grounds department was urged by Student Senate Sunday night to maintain all parking lots in a usable condition. "In the last three weeks only ten cars at the most have been able to park in the Reed-Johnson lot," said Senator Jim Jacobs, who introduced the resolution. "Those that do park there sink up to their axles in mud. The High Rise lot is better, but still rough you don't dare drive in it."

"I think we should bring this to the attention of the administration," said Jacobs, "we're paying our parking fees and tuition and this is our right."

Senator Butch Molm introduced a motion urging Buildings and Grounds to immediately allocate funds for benches along the sidewalks.

The recommendations directed at Buildings and Grounds came after a long fight over the seating of Martin Sanderson, chairman of the Judicial Board. Sanderson, holding a proxy from absent Senator Ilene Redlin, had his credentials questioned by Senator Alan Wicks.

"The proxy vote isn't recognized on the state or national level," said Wicks, "and could be very dangerous here."

Sanderson announced that the

proxy had the approval of South High Rise, the dorm Miss Redlin represents, and that Miss Redlin had told him how she'd like him to vote.

After the first vote ended in a tie, Wicks raised an argument over Sanderson's qualification to vote on his own seating and Jacobs called for a roll call vote. Several Senators changed their vote and Sanderson was unseated. Later in the evening, a by-law was passed voiding any future proxy voting.

In other Senate action:

- ★ Commissioner Gary Krump urged committees to investigate discrimination towards students by landlords.
- ★ According to Senator Molm, an academic appeals board for students is being investigated.
- ★ It was announced that chaperons are no longer necessary for student sponsored events.
- ★ A recommendation by Senator Jim Johnson to put Senate approval on the upcoming state wide referendum to reduce the voting age in North Dakota to 19 was sent to committee for further study.
- ★ A resolution by Molm allocating 50 dollars for a defense fund for five Negro students being tried for murder in Texas was sent to committee for study.





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Abrahamson receives J. L. Coulter award

North Dakota Wheat Commission administrator Paul E. H. Abrahamson, 61, will be honored by the NDSU Agricultural Economics Club May 2 at the Fargo Civic Memorial Auditorium as the second John Lee Coulter Achievement Award winner in North Dakota Agribusiness.

Tickets for the banquet are \$3.50 each and may be purchased from the Department of Agricultural Economics. There are more than 130 students in the Agricultural Economics Club.

Appropriately enough it was Coulter, president at NDSU from 1921-29, who inspired Abrahamson to pursue a career in agricultural education in a 1924

speech to Abrahamson's high school graduating class. Abrahamson was graduated from NDSU in Vocational Agriculture in 1929.

I. E. Solberg, managing director of the North Dakota Motor Carriers Association, will speak at the banquet. Solberg is the retired chairman of the Department of Economics at Bismarck Junior College, and has served as chairman of the North Dakota Highway Users Conference since 1948 and as a member of the National Highway Users Board of Governors since 1958.

"Agriculture: Big Business" will be discussed by the onetime Bismarck radio and television personality at the banquet.

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
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BETWEEN YOU AND ME

Come on Chuck, tell me again. Who's turning student government into a farce?

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
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

BISON RELAYS SATURDAY

At 11:00 a.m. Saturday, May 4, starter Arnie Bakke will begin the twentieth annual Bison Relays at Dakota Stadium. Entries have been received from 31 high schools and eight colleges so far with several last-minute entries expected.

Fargo North will be participating and hoping to repeat as Class A High School champions. They won the title in 1966. The relays were not held last year due to inclement weather. Wyndmere will also be present to defend their Class B High School title.

550 persons are registered so far for the all-day track and field meet with 100 to 200 last-minute entries expected.

Track coach Roger Grooters has not yet received confirmation that St. Cloud State will be entered in the Relays. St. Cloud is the 1966 defending college champion. Huskie coach, Bob Tracy, will contact the athletic department Friday as to whether or not St. Cloud will participate. He states that injuries incurred this season will determine acceptance or rejection of the invitation.

Bakke, a colorful, veteran starter will be on hand to get the relays under way. He was the official starter for the Pan-American games in Winnipeg last summer and has served as the starter for North Central Conference meets and State High School meets in the past.

There should be several interesting contests throughout the day featuring several top-notch athletes in both the high school and college categories.

The high school half-mile should be interesting to observe, several participating half-milers have broken the tape in two minutes. Brian MacLaren, a 1967 graduate of NDSU, will be on hand to run in the 440 and 880. The 880 record is expected to fall Saturday, as MacLaren consistently runs the event up to six seconds below the standing Relay record of 156.5. MacLaren is presently doing graduate work at Southern Illinois.

The one-mile and three-mile runs should provide more exciting viewing, providing that St. Cloud State's Van Nelson is on hand. Giving him a "run for his money" will be Arjan Gelling of UND. Nelson presently holds the record in the three-mile event.

Qualification rounds begin at 11:00 Saturday morning and are expected to be finished by 4:00 in the afternoon. The finals will begin at 7:00 that evening in the running events and about 5:30 in the field events. Honorary referees for the Bison Relays are Sam Westgate and Eugene Fitzgerald, sportswriter for the Forum.

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

Neiman jumped on a hanging curve of Bob Kutzan with two out in the 10th and lofted a high drive in Killebrew fashion 320 feet over the fence in the corner of eighth field at Jack Williams Stadium. The homer was the fifth of the season for Neiman and gave him (the fourth Augie pitcher) credit for the victory.

The Bison gave Orell Schmitz three-run leads twice during the game but the right-hander couldn't keep them. Schmitz had control trouble during most of the game. He often would throw three or four straight pitches extremely high.

Augustana pitchers gave Bison pitching trouble all day. Starter

Jerry Elmquist doubled home two runs in Augustana's three-run sixth inning that wiped out a 4-1 Bison lead.

After a triple by Rocco Troiano, which gave the Bison a 7-4 lead in the bottom of the sixth, the Vikings came back to knot the score once again in the seventh.

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
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tered America's course. In Wisconsin, ten thousand of us came to work. A new politics of participation was born. An unchangeable mind was changed.
