


Spring Blast

Criminal Or Social Patriot?

Bill Baird — The criminal or social patriot? After a history of arrests during other university lectures, Bill Baird will be at NDSU Monday, May 3, in the Memorial Union Ballroom at 8:00 p.m. His crusade for legalizing abortions has been carried out through financial support from nation-wide lectures on the need for changing birth control laws.

Baird is the only person in the history of the U.S. imprisoned in four states in court test cases fighting for the right of others in birth control.

After a three month prison term for a violation at Boston University in 1970, Baird said, "Nowhere else in the world can a person lose up to ten years of his life for a lecture on birth control with a contraceptive tube in his hand."

Some laws are archaic and have to be tested, Baird declared.



"I'm here to test the law, to help the women of this state to learn of birth control, to cut down the tremendous costs of welfare support in this state," Baird said.


Baird, as founder and director of the Parents Aid Society Clinic, expects to establish an abortion center where all abortions are done in New York regardless of age or marital status. Of the 3,000 teenagers he saw last year, 93% could not go to their parents for help.

Last year over 5,000 babies were born in this country to girls

under 14 years of age, according to the department of health, education, and welfare.

As a result of an arrest of Baird for birth control lectures to the poor in Hempstead, New York, the New York law was changed. He was then appointed as a consultant to the New York State Senate Committee on Health.

As for general birth control information, Baird's opinion is that the community in general is in favor of birth control. "People know what is going on but they are pretending it never happened. The question of morality is between the man, the woman, and their God, and no one else."


Moving on through this maze of flowers, I picked up all sorts of tidbits. Rambling Rose was already crooning her favorite tune,

RECORD SALE



An Interview With George Smith

V.B.: I suppose we should start with asking how you're connected with Spring Blast.

G.S.: Well, I'm the director of the Union, the assistant dean of students, and advisor to SAB.

V.B.: With all that authority why don't you do something about the coffee in the Bison Grill?

G.S.: Why, what's wrong with the coffee?

V.B.: Are you being serious?

G.S.: Perfectly.

V.B.: Forget it. Tell me about the history of Spring Blast.

G.S.: The Student Union used to have an event called "Shari-var." It was only a weekend in length, and was more or less public relations, aimed towards the public. In the spring of 68' the emphasis was changed from the public to the student. The

length was extended to a whole week of free events.

V.B.: How is the new program working?

B.S.: Not bad. A few events might have to be changed a bit, but all-in-all Spring Blast has been successful.

V.B.: What are these events that need changing?

G.S.: Well, a good example is Free University the students don't participate enough. They only use the day as a chance to be out of class.

V.B.: Is this bad?

G.S.: Like I said, Spring Blast is for the student body, so if they don't want a certain event, I guess it's up to them. I think it's unfortunate though, that Free University is in jeopardy. I personally feel it's the high point of Spring Blast.

V.B.: Who actually does the preparation of Spring Blast?

G.S.: Spring Blast is actually a S.A.B. function, but because it is such a large event, a separate organization is set up.

V.B.: Then all the people organizing Spring Blast are students?

G.S.: Not completely, just as the faculty and administrators participate in Spring Blast, they also participate in the preparation, but primarily Spring Blast is a student body function.

V.B.: Are there any new events scheduled this year?

G.S.: Yes, the SU 75 carnival is a new event. I think it is set up real well and should be a lot of fun. I suppose I should add that profit will go to SU 75.

V.B.: Who are most of the events aimed at?

G.S.: Spring Blast isn't aimed at any one group. We have tried to give something to everyone. The events vary from back rubs, to a rock-religious service, to a casino.

V.B.: Spring Blast sounds like a week of fun.

G.S.: It is, but there is more to it than just fun. There are also scheduled events where we have tried to bring in national experts in fields that our people are interested in.

V.B.: Such as?

G.S.: Bill Baird, one of the foremost experts on abortion. Frank Mankiewicz, Robert Kennedy's press secretary, and My Lai debate in Festival Hall.


V.B.: Well Spring Blast sounds like it really will be a Blast.

3. Obtain I.B.M. Class Cards by presenting an approved Trial Schedule with Registrar's stamp affixed, plus your I.B.M. Master Card at the following locations beginning at 8:30a.m. Thursday, February 18.

For all courses in English, Mathematics, Social and Behavioral Sciences, Religion, Cardinal Muench Seminary, class cards will be distributed in the Ballroom of the Memorial Union. For courses in all other Arts and Science departments, class cards will be distributed at the respective Departmental Offices.

For all courses in Agriculture, Engineering, and Pharmacy, class cards will be distributed at the respective Departmental Offices.

For all courses in Chemistry, class cards will be distributed at the Dean's Office. For all courses in Physics, class cards will be distributed at the Physics Office.

For all courses in Home Economics, the class cards will be distributed at the Founders Room of the Home Economics Building.

4. After obtaining all Class Cards, students complete an official registration form, obtain advisor's signature, and present all registration materials to the Registrar's check-out tables in Crest Hall of the Memorial Union. The Registrar's Office will process registration from:

8:30a.m. to 12:00Noon and 1:00p.m. to 4:30p.m. on February 18, 19, 22, 23, 24

Students must clear the Registrar's tables by 4:30p.m., February 24 to avoid a late fee charge. Students are urged to clear as early in the period as possible to take advantage of the lesser time then required because of shorter lines.

5. Fees will be payable March 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 in Town Hall of the Memorial Union. Students will receive a fee payment schedule when they clear with the Registrar's tables.

6. Registration for new students as well as for returning students not in attendance Winter Quarter will take place in Departmental Offices on Tuesday afternoon, March 9 from 1:00-4:00p.m. The Registrar's Office will process these registrations during the same hours in Crest Hall of the Memorial Union.
