Search for missing money continues, thefts increase

Money, money, who's got the money?

It's a new variation of an old children's game as Fargo police and campus security try to locate slightly over \$19,000 that was stolen from the trunk of a campus security vehicle on March 1.

According to Fargo Police, the money was discovered missing when

SU security officer Chuck Hatlen stopped to deliver it to the Varsity Mart.

The money had been picked up at the Norwest Bank of Fargo. Hatlen made two brief stops at the Northland Credit Union near the University Station Post Office and Old Main, before arriving at the Union. Taken in the theft were \$12,000 in \$10 bills, \$7,000 in \$5 bills and \$25 in pennies.

"It's a difficult situation. There are no fingerprints or (signs) of forced entry," said Tim Lee, chief of campus security.

Lee said none of his staff has taken the money and that all of the officers have taken lie detector tests.

Anyone with information concerning the theft is asked to contact the Fargo Police or campus security.

Thefts from cars parked in student parking lots, offices and dorm rooms are continuing at a more consistent pace than in the previous two years, Lee said.

Another SU apartment to be built soon

(NB)—The State Board of Higher Education has approved an additional 16-unit apartment house to be added to the University Village on the north side of the campus at SU, according to SU President L.D. Loftward.

The building, estimated to cost \$500,000, will house 64 students. It will be built in the area of two

similar units at the northeastern end of campus just east of University Drive.

Plans call for the 16-unit building, which will be nearly identical with the other two completed in the past two years, to be ready for occupancy by late December.

Each of the 16 units in the new building will house four single

students in an apartment-type of arrangement. Students will have the convenience of their own furnished living and dining space, kitchen, bath and two bedrooms. The bedrooms will include bunk beds and built-in study space. Each apartment also has storage room for off-season storage. Each unit is about 670 square feet in size.

Students are rediscovering religion at universities

Nationwide, a religious rebirth on college campuses is occurring. Here at SU, the same phenomenon can be seen, only to a more moderate degree, according to Dr. John Helgeland, professor of religion.

He explains that trends are more observable in the East and West. "With us, it's not a question of feast or famine with religious studies."

However, he added that the interest in religion has been growing at SU in the last seven years.

One reason he cites for this increase is that students are less fearful of religious courses.

In the past, many believed college classes were calculated attempts to ruin one's faith. The fear of being taught something contradictory to one's religious upbringing was staggering.

Another reason students steered away from college religion courses in the past was the resemblance to the Sunday school experience, which was not too challenging or informative in many cases, he added.

However, the university system is dispelling these fears by offering reliable religious information today, he explains.

The religion instructors in the F-M area are active professionally on the regional and national levels, which builds credibility. He added that all of these instructors have published materials and are building names for themselves nationally.

"There is a kind of dependability at NDSU that they (students) may not get from other groups," he commented.

Helgeland adds, however, there are a lot of quack religious groups on campus. "Some cults are predators on our students."

Helgeland said teaching religion on state campuses is not really a problem. "We don't try to make Lutherans Catholics or Catholics Lutherans," he stressed. "We do try to make Lutherans better Lutherans and Catholics better Catholics, but we don't play the denominational game," he added.

A major in religious studies is not offered at SU, but a minor is. Concordia is the only college in the F-M area that offers a major in religion. MSU does not have any offerings in religion anymore.

Enrollment in such courses builds throughout the year, according to Helgeland. A pattern can be seen from fall to spring, with enrollment climbing from substantial to great

numbers when the snow melts. Then again in the fall these figures drop, but are still higher than those of the previous fall quarter.

As an example, the number of students enrolled in the New Testament class increased from 23 to 75.

Over the past seven years Helgeland has been at SU, he said the number of courses offered has not increased drastically, but the content and subject material has.

The textbooks taught from are used nationwide, because he feels students taking religion classes "deserve a taste of the very finest from contemporary scholars."


He adds, "These classes may not help them (students) get jobs, but will help them understand life."

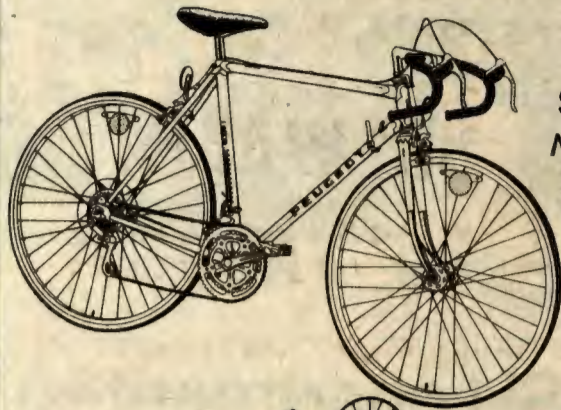
The growth in those interested in religion may seem unusual on college campuses, especially since 18-

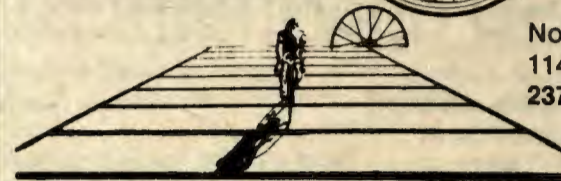

Spoken prayer would be discriminatory

"...in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. Amen."

This will not be heard in American classrooms in the near future. Tuesday, the Senate rejected a constitutional amendment to permit organiz-

States or by any state to participate in prayer. Neither the United States nor any state shall compose the words of any prayer to be said in public school."

Perfect attendance for the vote was the first time in five months that all 100 senators were present and voting. It sure must have been an important issue to them. Why isn't there perfect attendance when they vote on military spending?

The vote followed two weeks of intense lobbying and debate by the President, who was in favor of the amendment.

North Dakota Sens. Mark Andrews (R) and Quentin Burdick (D),

along with Minnesota Republicans Dave Durenberger and Rudy Boschwitz, voted against the proposal. Good for them. We at least have people who listen to what the states' residents have to say.

Andrews echoed my sentiments when he said that the government "has no business dictating what people should pray."

Even if someone could have come up with a non-denominational prayer, students would have been subjected to it or to some kind of discrimination.

If students chose not to recite the prayer, they would have either been

forced to listen to the prayer or leave the room — I'm sure teachers wouldn't have passed earplugs.

Either way, they would have singled out as different.

What about the non-Christians and atheists? Where would leave them? All the other children are worshipping God, who is existent in the same sense for others. Might the others not wonder if there isn't something wrong with their beliefs? How would freedom of religion would that

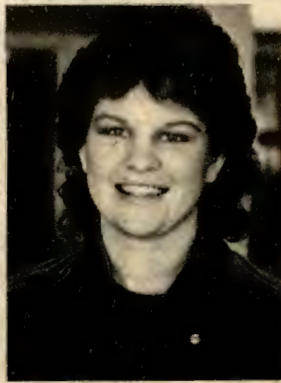

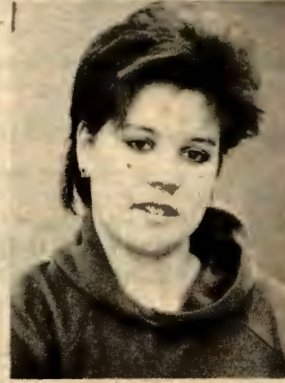

Chuck Mangione Quartet to play April 6

(NB)—An Evening with Chuck Mangione and the Chuck Mangione Quartet will be presented at 8 p.m. April 6, in the Old Field House.

While teaching at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, N.Y., Mangione wrote "Hill Where the Lord Hides," which led to his first recording contract with a major label, Mercury Records, and first Grammy nomination.

His early years with Mercury culminated in the fantasy-like title tune of one of his most popular albums, "The Land of Make Believe," another Grammy nominee in 1973.

When Mangione signed with A&M Records in 1975, the year yielded two successful releases still familiar today, "Chase the Clouds Away," heard by millions as background music during the telecast of the 1976 Olympic Games, and "Bellavia," which finally won him his first Grammy award.

In 1977, "Feels So Good" reached the top 40 charts, and in 1978, "Children of Sanchez," the double-LP soundtrack, won the Hollywood Foreign Press Association's Golden Globe Award and earned him his second Grammy the following year. "Give It All You Got" was the theme

music of the Winter Olympics from Lake Placid in 1980 and won an Emmy award.

The musicians playing with Mangione are Chris Vadala on saxophones and flutes, Peter Harris on guitars, bassist Gordon Johnson and drummer Everett Silver.

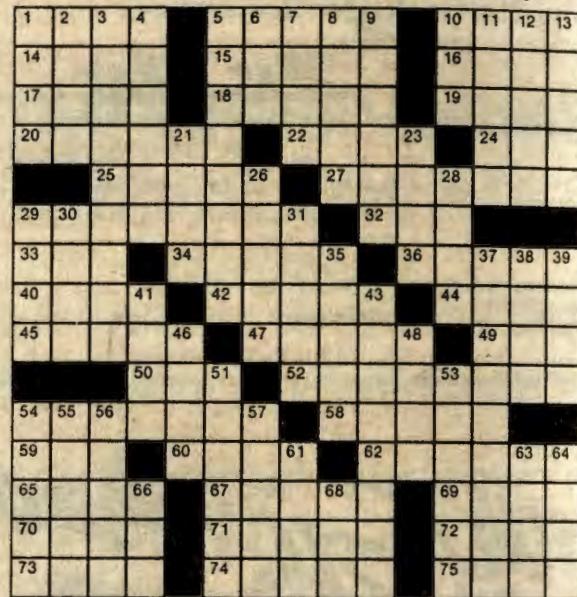

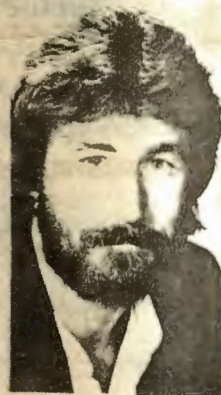

True story 'Star 80' is depressing film

The last few years of Dorothy Stratten's life were exciting, but tragically cut short. "Star 80" depicts her life from the time she meets Paul Snyder until the last fatal hours, where she is murdered by Snyder, who then commits suicide.

Ritenour on target, with new jazz album, music reviewer says

The new album from guitarist Lee Ritenour, "On the Line" is right on target in the middle of today's contemporary/fusion jazz.

Ritenour's "On the Line" is an instrumental album comparable to a couple of his last albums in which he added vocals.

The sound of "On the Line" is excellent, combining the spontaneity of a live recording with the work of a studio album, which means there is no overdubbing and mixing of tracks on this album.

The album starts off with the haunting "Rit Variations" featuring suave to jagged guitar riffs from Ritenour.

"Starbright" sounds like a mid-summer night skyline should look with Ernie Watts on a romantic tenor sax solo.

"Pedestrian" is a bouncy, hop-a-long track which makes you feel as though you were skipping down the street. This song revolves around the use of synthesizers, with Dave Grusin and Greg Mathieson on keyboards, Nathan East on synthesizer bass and Ernie Watts on synth sax.

Side two takes off with a funky bass line from Nathan East on a Dave Grusin song titled "California Roll."

Grusin's fun-loving style of performing as well as arranging and producing can be heard in the movies "Tootsie" and "Heaven Can Wait."

"Heavenly Bodies" provides a slow driving bottom for Ritenour's melodic guitar lines with the extra spots filled in by Watts on saxophone.

The title track is fast paced with percussion work from Harvey Mason and Steve Forman and the synthesizer work of the Grusin Brothers. Ritenour tops off the song with a guitar solo.

Throughout the movie the underlying fatality of their relationship is evident. Snyder was the dominant

force in Stratten's life — he found her. The film is a depressing look at the lives of these two individuals; Paul Snyder, brilliantly played by Eric Roberts; and the innocent blonde, Dorothy Stratten, played by Mariel Hemingway.

Snyder first sees Stratten working at a Dairy Queen in Vancouver, Canada. She was beautiful and amazingly naive. On their first date Snyder tells her she's going to be a star.

Through some wheeling and dealing, which Snyder seems to be very good at, he gets Playboy magazine to look at photos of Stratten. She becomes a centerfold and later Playmate of the Year.

In the meantime, she marries

Snyder much to the dismay of Hugh Hefner, played by Cliff Robertson, who says Snyder has the personality of a pimp.

When Stratten begins to get bit movie parts, Snyder gets left behind. The relationship sours and he becomes distraught and buys a shotgun.

The last time Stratten goes to see Snyder to discuss divorce, she offers him half of all the money she has. It's difficult to tell if his outrage is because of his all-consuming love for Stratten or his missed chance at the golden ring.

Although the writers could only guess at what went on during those final hours, the blood bath that discoverers of the bodies must have found was graphically depicted.

What was so disturbing about this film was that it was based on a situation that actually occurred.

The film is playing at the South Cinema. Shows start at 7:30 and 9:30 p.m.

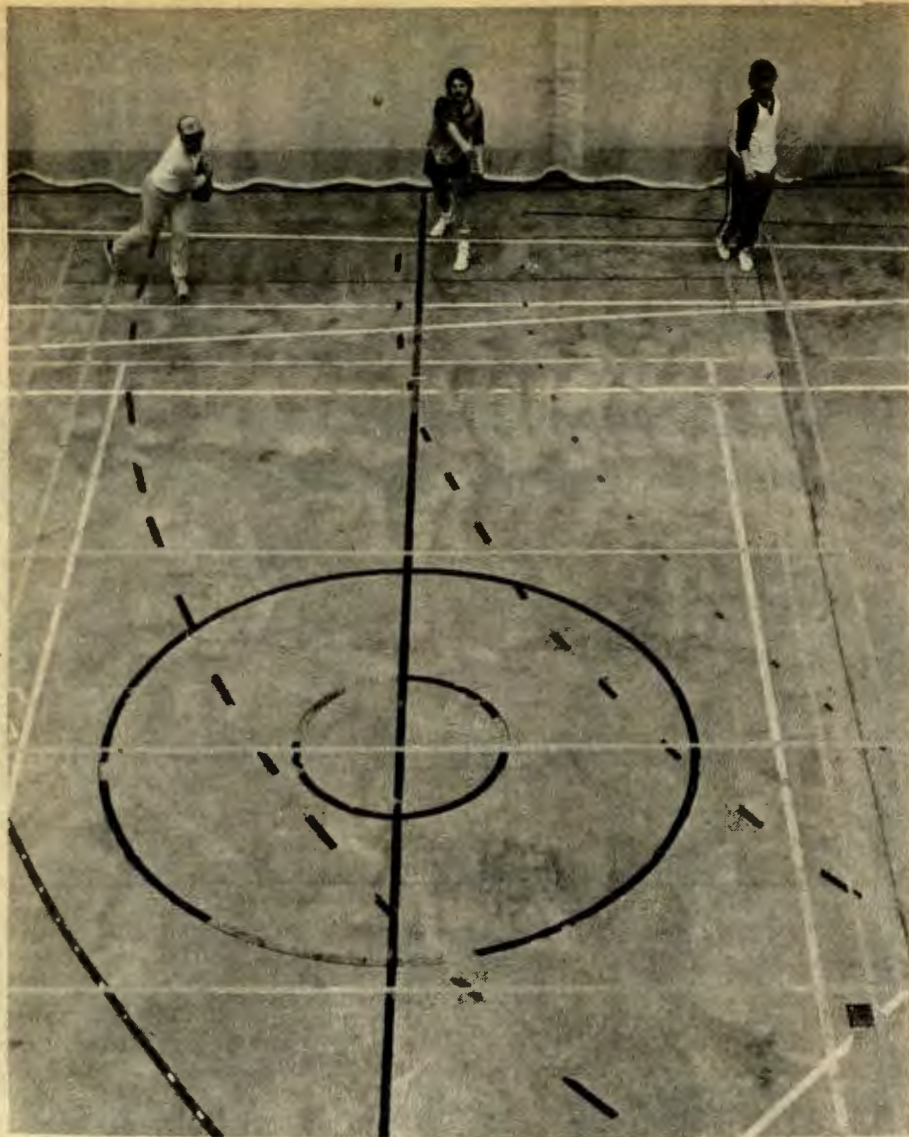

Unity through movement shown in dance

Mahkahta is an Indian word which means "the area of space through which our bodies move."

Mahkahta Dance Theatre used and transcended that space in its performance at the Fargo Theatre Friday night as the dancers gave the illusion of being part of the elements of sky, earth and water ... separate entities, yet a continuous whole.

The dances, most of which were choreographed by Kathy Foss Bakkum, were remarkable for making the audience sense the concept of unity through movement.

Bakkum, a graphic arts instructor in the SU communications department, describes choreography as "designing moving shapes."

Although she spends five hours a day in exercise and dance, Bakkum, who took part in several dances, said the reason she performs is because she wants to choreograph.

Her imaginative choreography was only part of what the audience experienced Friday night. Lighting, sound effects, and the theater itself were the other components of a worthwhile evening.

Charles Thysell, a member of the production crew, said technical director Bill Paladino worked against "impossible odds," with outdated equipment to create an illusion of cleanliness, among other things, in the theater which is undergoing renovation.

Thysell pointed to some dirty gray hangings which, through the magic of lighting, looked clean from where the audience sat.

Thysell, who happens to be Bakkum's husband, added his own bit to the evening with a film titled "The

Dance Studio."

In this black-and-white parody, Mahkahta dancers escaped their earthbound status, disappearing into thin air to be replaced by other dancers and hovering like hummingbirds over the studio floor.

Lance Johnson, theater organ player, accompanied the film with sound effects.

Johnson and the organ were stars in their own right in an interlude

during which the organ, with Johnson seated at it, rose from the orchestra pit filling the theater with the strains of "I Could Have Danced All Night."

The evening ended with a hymn of praise as the F-M Chamber Chorale sang and Mahkahta danced to "Rejoice in the Lamb."

Bakkum says Mahkahta, which includes about 20 dances in its repertoire, plans to dance in Minneapolis

within the next few weeks and in Casselton after that.

Dave Knudtson, Fargo Theatre manager, said theater restoration should be completed by late April then a silent movie night is planned.

The night will include two short stage comedies, organ playing by Lance Johnson and Lloyd Collins and music by a 19-piece stage band.
