The Germans from Russia Heritage NDSU Libraries, Fargo. Collection (GRHC) at the NDSU Libraries in Fargo reaches out to prairie families and former Dakotans. In various ways, it affirms the heritage of the Germans from Russia is an important part of the northern plains culture.

Prairie Public Broadcasting has announced the premiere airing early in March, 2000, of the new documentary, "Schmeckfest: Food Traditions of the Germans from Russia." Date and time will be announced later.

A Beulah, ND, native, she has lived in many places. but remains connected to her German-Russian ancestry by her creative writing, ethnic cooking skills and as a talented woodworker. GRHC has published the new book. "Memoirs of Father Anthony Kopp." In a book review, Fr. Jonathan Fischer, St. Paul, MN, a native of Strasburg, ND, writes: "Fr. Kopp's description of his family's trip to America and their getting situated in North Dakota was most revealing. He not only mentions sod houses but describes how they cut



the roofs. Fr. Kopp details the effort of having to 'homestead' on this vast prairie, how families had to live isolated and apart from each other instead of in a friendly 'Dorf' or village, as was the case in the old country. His description of the long abandoned harvesting technique of 'heading' reminded me of one of my first farm jobs as a young boy. I too had to drive the 'header box' and worry about its proper positions alongside the header machine.'
