The GRHC, NDSU Libraries has been collaborating with Prairie Public to produce a radio program, *A Holiday* Special: German-Russian Childhood *Memories*. This program features stories from more than twenty Dakota Memories Oral History Project (DMOHP) narrators. These narrators grew up on the Northern Plains, from South Dakota to North Dakota to Saskatchewan. They each have vivid memories of winter holiday traditions - memories of the "Belznickel," "Krist Kindel," Santa Claus, wax-candle lights, midnight mass, and much more. Childhood historian Jessica Clark (also DMOHP Coordinator) has added scholarly commentary, placing these stories in a larger historical framework.

The radio program airs on Prairie Public Radio December 10th and 25th at 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm (CST).

The fall edition of North Dakota Horizons features an article titled, *Journey to the Homeland: Discovering a family's history* by Sadie Anderson, Information Specialist for NDSU University Relations. Seven members of the Mertz/Opp family joined our Journey to the Homeland Tour in May 2008. They traveled to Odessa, Ukraine to



visit their ancestral Glueckstal District villages near Odessa and in Moldova. Family members also visited Alsace, France where the Opp ancestors lived before immigrating to South Russia in 1806. The Opp family immigrated to Eureka, SD in 1890, and the Mertz family immigrated in 1906 near Bowdle, SD. Later they farmed near Tappen, ND attending the Glueckstal Lutheran Church in Kidder County, which celebrated its 100th Centennial in June. The 15th Journey to the Homeland Tour to Odessa, Ukraine and Stuttgart, Germany is May 20-30, 2009. Space is still available!
