Germans from Russia Heritage Collection North Dakota State University Libraries, Fargo



As I prepare this November column, I am reminded of my first experience with writing this column back in November 1996 with 168 columns having been written since then. I appreciate the positive comments and interest from readers.

We can be thankful that our ancestors immigrated to these Dakota prairies from their former German villages in South Russia (today the Volga Region of Russia, southern Ukraine and Moldova). When I visited with tour members in May 2010, these villages near Odessa, Ukraine, it is apparent the difficult life the villagers experience each day for survival.

The Germans from Russia community has lost a colleague and a dear friend, Margaret (Aman) Freeman, Redondo Beach, Calif.
