We are looking forward to attending the 86th Annual Sauerkraut Day at Wishek, N.D., Wednesday, October 12. There will be a free meal from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Wishek Civic Center including entertainment with the Wishek High School band and choir. The GRHC will have displays at the Wishek Armory with the Craft Fair from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Acacia Jonas Stuckle, GRHC special collections associate, a native of Fredonia, N.D. and I will attend the event. Our first experience at the 85th Annual Sauerkraut Day in 2010 was most successful as a GRHC outreach program. He writes about Katie Pinke and her husband, a Wishek native: “After developing successful careers in the city, they reached the conclusion that life there didn’t offer the opportunities they could find in Wishek. Upon moving to the community, she discovered that Wishek’s residents were extremely proud of their Germans from Russia

heritage, which is reflected in Sauerkraut Days. She works around the country with agricultural groups on marketing projects, but has chosen to live in Wishek for the quality of life. Katie, along with some other community members, believes Sauerkraut Day is an opportunity that needs to be leveraged. While most Wishek residents look at the celebration as a ‘local event,’ Katie sees it as an opportunity to showcase the community’s authentic culture to people from around the country.”

Since June 2010, I have been involved with the Tri-County Tourism Alliance for the counties of Emmons, Logan and McIntosh, located in south central North Dakota, the heart of German-Russian country in the Dakotas. The focus of the group is to promote heritage and cultural tourism. Sauerkraut Day on October 12, is one of the important festive events to celebrate the rich heritage of the Germans from Russia on the Dakota prairies. I am impressed with the committee’s projects working closely with the local community leaders, the State Historical Society of North Dakota, North Dakota Tourism, NDSU’s Center for Community Vitality and the Center for Heritage Renewal and the GRHC at the NDSU Libraries. On Saturday, October 29, “Dakota Air: The Radio Show” will perform at the Hopkins Center for the Arts, Hopkins, Minn., 7-9 p.m., sponsored by the North Star Chapter of

Minnesota. The performance marks the show’s expansion from the North Dakota prairies into the Minneapolis-St. Paul area. Featured guests for the October 29 show include Debra Marquart of Iowa State University and Napoleon, N.D. native, a versatile musical performer and celebrated author of the book, “The Horizontal World: Growing Up in the Middle of Nowhere,” singer-guitarist Sean Benz, 19-year-old student at South Dakota State University, originally from southwestern Minn.; and Bill & Kate Isles, Duluth Minn., nationally known folk musicians.
