Germans from Russia Heritage Collection North Dakota State University Libraries, Fargo

In preparing this October column, I share with you that Acacia Jonas Stuckle, GRHC Special Collections Associate, has accepted a new position with the NDSU Extension Service beginning in October. Acacia's impressive and outstanding work at the GRHC has been well received by the Germans from Russia community and in North Dakota. She has been a wonderful ambassador to promote and inform regarding the GRHC activities and projects at outreach events and presentations. Acacia will be working in the heart of German-Russian country in south-central North Dakota where we look forward to staying in good contact.

Almost 125 years ago, Acacia's great-great-great-great-grandfather moved his family from the steppes of Russia to the prairies of North Dakota (Emmons County). After ten years in Fargo, the prairies have called her back to those very roots.

Acacia has recently accepted positions with the North Dakota State University Extension Service in both Emmons and Kidder Counties. She will serve as the Extension Agent for 4-H Youth Development in Emmons County (Linton, N.D.) and as the Extension Agent for Family and Consumer Science and 4-H Youth Development in Kidder County (Steele, N.D.)

Acacia began working at the GRHC as a student employee in August 2002. She continued to work here throughout her college career and was hired as the Special Collections Associate in February 2007. Acacia has also been an active member of the Tri-County Tourism Alliance to help promote heritage tourism in "German-Russian Country," which includes the counties of Emmons, Logan and McIntosh.

Acacia says, "Before I embark on my next adventure, I'd like to thank everyone I've worked with through my experiences at the NDSU Libraries' Germans from Russia Heritage Collection (GRHC) in the past ten years for their colleagueship and support. Growing up on a German-Russian



farm between Fredonia and Gackle, N.D., Schott helped out where ever she was needed. She learned to bake and cook when she was only eight or nine years old and it became part of her life. She credits her mother to being her home economics teacher. Schott has been pleasing the palates of her family and friends with her fabulous cooking for decades. Her baking is well-known in south central North Dakota.

Inside this cookbook you will find recipes prepared in Alma's beloved German-Russian farm kitchen... a pinch of this, a little of that. Here is a cookbook sharing the recipes which were crafted, created and perfected over many years.
