#### Pen Points

Dear White Ribboners:

The World's WCTU Convention? A tremendous undertaking for those who planned it and carried out those plans. What was it like? First I'll tell you a little about its size. There were 1500 delegates and visitors, including LTLers and 500 YTCers. Women from 40 different countries of the world and from 27 states of the United States. There were women from 16 different Spanish speaking countries of South and Central America and Islands of the West Indies, besides countries of Europe, Asia, Africa, Japan, England, Philippine Islands, Ceylon and Australia, 40 different countries in all. Can you imagine these different women all working together?

What were they like and how did they dress? Those from eastern and southeastern countries were mostly small of stature and dark complexioned, while those of western and northern countries were larger in stature and of fairer complexion. The women from India always dressed in their "saris," but the others dressed mostly in modest dresse that we are used to. For special occasions those from different countries wore the dress used in their own countries - all very colorful and lovely.

Most of those speaking from the platform used the English language, but some were hard to understand, while a few had to have an interpreter. Remember it was hard for each of us from different countries and languages to make ourselves understood, but in spite of language barriers there was a common bond which all could understand, our love and dependence upon our Lord Jesus Christ. This was brought out in most of the talks. Another bond which united us was our fight against a common enemy; alcoholic beverages and all other narcotics, as well as our desires to protect the homes of our different countries. As each one told of their work and need, we found that we had much in common. The lady from Beirut Lebanon said it is hard to live a good life with so many temptations. The lady from Ghana (she wore a big blue handkerchief about her head) told that wine is produced from the palm trees there and there are lots of them. She said that even little children drink it. Jamaca reported that against great odds the WCTU there still carries on. Beer, rum and gambling still run open. They joined hands with the churches to make these things illegal but so far they've been unsuccessful. In Australia the children are being tempted with a soft drink in which a small amount of alcohol has been added The WCTU there defeated having open bars on Sunday. I haven't room to tell you about all of these countries, but each one has the same enemy to defeat that we have. They each asked for the prayers of the others that they might be able to carry on to victory, even as we need their prayers.

This is not a report but I've tried to give you a glimpse of the members of our World's WCTU of truly concerned, Spirit filled workers the world over. We are one body consisting of many members.
