STATE CONVENTION

Our State WCTU Convention will be held this year on October 4-6th, in the St. Paul's United Methodist church in Jamestown.

The banquet is being planned for Wednesday evening, October 4th with Dr. James E. Brandt of Minot State Teacher's College as our guest speaker. DON'T MISS THIS!

Dr. Earl Mitchell, who has specialized in treating alcoholics in Washington, D.C., for more than 20 years, says that he expects that more than half of his patients who keep drinking will die in accidents. He said, "We get a few who get stoned drunk, pass out with a cigarette in their hand and burn themselves to death. Alcoholics also have a high suicide rate; many of the people who drown accidentally in Washington do so after they have been drinking. Homeless alcoholics have frozen to death in the city's streets in winter. And alcoholics from Skid Row to Georgetown have higher rates of heart and lung disease than non-alcoholics.

There is a dangerous rise in the consumption of alcoholic beverages in Czechoslovakia. The official press agency reported recently that the consumption of food has risen 6.6 per cent in 1971, but the sale of alcohol increased 16 per cent.

Dear White Ribboners:

You will notice from this verse that a wall was built because of a oneness in purpose of a concerned people—"they had a mind to work." Our wall of prevention of the production, sale and use of alcoholic beverages can only be built if the concerned people have "a mind to work." In this issue you will see accounts of some who have.

This is the last issue of our paper to be put out in the 1971-1972 WCTU year. Our new WCTU year begins in September. August is the month to elect officers of local unions for the coming year. The names of these officers should be sent to the Promotion Secretary as soon as possible. At the August meeting all members should be urged to bring their dues of \$3.65, for the coming year, to the September meeting. There are reasons why it is important to collect the dues at the beginning of the year instead of toward the end. First, it gives our organization money to work on, second, it shows to the world our correct member ship at the beginning of the new year. Remember it is necessary for a member to have signed the pledge and to pay our annual dues of \$3.65 in order to be correctly counted; third, it shows up a live union, and besides it is just as easy as waiting until later on. When sending these dues to our state treasurer, be sure to send also the correct names and addresses, with Zip Codes, in alphabetical order. Mrs. Oscar Otterness of the Tower City Union has made her father, Charles E. Blaine, a memorial member. She says he was a firm believer in total abstinence and promoted the cause of temperance at all times. He and Mrs. Blaine joined the Tower City WCTU in May 1947, when it was organized. They remained faithful members until his death in 1950 and her death in 1968.

Mrs. Blaine lived until well past 90 years. She was made a Memorial member by the members of her local union, now Mrs. Otterness wishes to make her father a Memorial member also. The younger members of the family are all represented in the WCTU. A good record for a family!

In New York City today there is a virtual epidemic of babies born addicted to heroin-innocent victims of their mothers' habits. At Harlem Hospital one child in 29 is born addicted. For these babies the first few days of their life are torment as they are withdrawn from the drug. It takes about three days sometimes as many as ten-to get the narcotic out of their systems.

A few of the babies are taken to Hale House, which has the only program in the United States dealing exclusively with neonatal drug-addicted infants.

To place a child in Hale House, an addicted mother must agree to a rehabilitation program for herself.



The Bismarck Union having been alerted to the possibility of having a display at the Safe Driving Clinic to be held April 28, 29 and 30th at Mary College, sprang into action by calling on Mrs. James Lundy, local LTL director, who called her LTL group together to make a poster. The poster's caption is FOR LIFE'S SAKE QUIT DRINKING. Hand drawn on three full sized poster sheets in colored inks, is a large liquor bottle. Within this bottle a head-on, two car collision has taken place, and it's victims are sprawled on the ground and being carried away on a stretcher by officers who have arrived on the scene. It was mounted on a 4 by 8 foot plywood sheet and bordered by beer cans for a frame. It made an impressive picture.

A table became it's easel at this first showing. At the foot of the picture a skeleton in it's coffin, reposed with this message, "Alcohol Put Me Here." Further, literature from Signal Press, Listen, (a narcotics education magazine) and booklets from State Health Department, Alcohol Division, were on display; some were in quantity for taking by interested individuals. From 150 to 200 leaflets and booklets were distributed. It was interesting to note that other exhibits also had material bringing out the fact that alcohol and gasoline do NOT mix.
