It is comforting to know that we are not asked to go alone, but God goes with us. In His strength we shall be victorious. As we enter the new year let us caim this promise in our fight against the forces of evil.

How time does fly! It hardly seems possible, as this is being written, that two months have gone by since we met for our state convention. It was a most delightful experience to meet each and every one of you who came from all parts of the state. The Jamestown ladies, as well as those from Marion, had planned so well for everything and we all felt such a warm welcome. Thank you so much for your grand hospitality!

It is now time to be working in earnest to achieve our goals for the coming year. One of these is that of CENTURY BUILDER UNION. It seems to me that EACH UNION can meet all of the needed requirements. As far as membership is concerned, all you need is ONE more WCTU member and ONE more Honorary member than you had last year in order to be net gain. If one member has passed away since last year's report you must win TWO new members in order to be ONE net gain. The National and State Funds are not difficult to meet. Under "Subscriptions" you can choose ONE out of four plans, whichever is best suited to your group. For example, if you have 10 subscriptions, you qualify under No. 1, no matter how many or how few members you have. If, for example, you have nine members, and your Union Signal subscriptions equal three, you will still qualify under No. 2 because this would be equal to one-third of your membership. Under "Participation" you will note the requirements to be met in order to qualify. If you have further questions about anything please write me and I will be most happy to help you. The score sheets will be mailed to each union and you should have them by the time this paper reaches you. Please begin to work toward these goals NOW. One copy is to be sent to me and the other retained for your files. Send me the report in June. This will give you time to reach all the goals. The deadline is JUNE 30, 1973. Let us have 100 percent CENTURY BUILDER UNIONS in North Dakota in 1973. WE CAN DO IT!

If your union has not as yet received a copy of the Annual State Report it should reach you soon. It is suggested that you include it in your union program plans. Dear Friends:

There is a little spotted colt, six months old, that I like to watch; the way she does exactly the same things that her mother does, to get food, is something to see. If human parents and children could and would understand the rules for living good, safe lives, what a wonderful world we might have!

Let us not forget that our leaders in the work for Temperance are busy people, that they need our cooperation and our prayers. If the plans and suggestions they give in The White Ribbon Bulletin meet your approval, send a card or letter to the one who is responsible for the good headwork, and tell her so, and keep on praying as one of the songs that used to be sung, suggests. PRESIDENT'S RECOMMENDATIONS

PRIORITIES FOR VICTORY is the general theme for the next two years in the WCTU Program. We will recommend a few priorities which, if carefully followed will help to move us "ON TO THE CENTURY MARK."

SPIRITUAL PRIORITIES: I would emphasize again our trysting hour, 12 Noon, the noontide prayer, inaugurated and continued, for the work and workers. Many of the new members may not know of this designated time when we meet at the Mercy Seat, and make our petitions known to our God. Especially I would ask prayer now for the Centenary Plans in all details, and for the Committee in their promotion and projection of the plans. Ask God to deepen the spiritual life of each individual member, young and old, and make it a rededication of life to the total abstinence cause. Ask the Lord to give us wisdom for the task, vision for the planning, courage for the work, grace for endurance, and VICTORY at last.

MEMBERSHIP PRIORITIES: We could not exist without the local member in the local union. These form our membership priority. The foundation of the work is the dedicated and consecrated woman, individual and collective. I like the idea of securing members under 35 years of age to be CONVENTION TOPS. Let us be CENTENNIAL TOPS and continue this effort for the next two years, getting the largest number of local members under age 35. Who'll be first? Which state will be the CLEVELAND INDIAN CHIEF when we go into 1974?

FAMILY PRIORITIES: If there is any area in our society which needs strengthening today, it is the family and family life. The WCTU is organized for the protection of the home. Family life is an art; let us cultivate it. The community needs the extension and enlargement of the influence of the family. Try to stop the break-up of families, and work for the restoration of families and family life where such difficulty exists due to alcohol and attendant evils. Christian marriage will never end. Let us uphold Christian standards of chastity before marriage and fidelity within the marriage contract. Establish a systematic plan for Bible reading and prayer within the family, in other words, the family altar. Step by step witness to them of the love of God in Christ, and help them to declare themselves for total abstinence. Focus on the family NOW.

YOUTH PRIORITIES: The direct attack of the liquor interests is leveled at young people and children. The WCTU cannot hold itself guiltless of what liquor may do to these unless there has been every possible effort made to forewarn them as well as protect them. Every local union, if no other thing is done, should mother an LTL and or a YTC. In addition all possible help should be given to leaders of youth and children in

Sunday School, Vacation Bible school and public school, kindergarten through 10th grade, with information on alcohol, other narcotics and tobacco. A strong and continued educational program working through the teachers is recommended. "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free."

CITIZENSHIP PRIORITIES: This is a crucial year for our nation, and our right of citizenship should be exercised in getting out the vote, and in preparing ourselves to assist new voters in their right of franchise.

CENTENNIAL PRIORITIES: Here is a message to us from Frances E. Willard. It surely applies now as we move ON TO THE CENTURY MARK, 1974. "Let me reiterate the statement I have so often and earnestly made, that we must begin to collect temperance books, documents and souvenirs now while they are to be had. It has pleased me greatly that some good friends have brought to me this very summer invaluable documents which, as I told them, I shall carefully preserve and hand over to our keeper of archives. "We and hand over to our keeper of archives." We need these things NOW. See what you have or can locate and endeavor to make them available to us. God bless you.

The prospect of legalizing "Pot" frightens many law officers. A National Commission on Drug Abuse report calling for liberalized marijuana laws drew fire from law enforcement officials who say legalized use of the drug would at best change nothing and at worst could debilitate society.

Reactions to the report released March 22nd by a 13 member panel ranged from calculated skeptism to emotional rejection. Those who supported the report said people would go on smoking mar-

ijuana anyway.

Vice President, Spiro T. Agnew called the report frightening. "I think it is wrong of us to in anyway encourage the use of marijuana." Agnew said in New Orleans. He said it is wrong to permit private use of the drug when public use is not condoned. He furthur stated that it is frightening because no nation in world history has ever legitimated the use of marijuana. "Use of marijuana and hashish in Oriental countries has really debilitated those societies," said Agnew.

A New York Daily News editorial attempting to summarize the report and the controversy it has wrought concluded: The moral of all this would seem, then, to be: Experiment with pot if you must, but be careful and conservative. And if you just leave the stuff alone, you will lose nothing and may well save yourself and your family a lot of grief.

Alochol is the most abused drug in the United States. So told the Health, Education and Welfare Department to the Congress in the government's first annual report on alcohol and health.

There are now 9 million alcoholics or problem drinkers in America— almost 10 per cent of the work force— and alcoholism is an epidemic among American Indians, according to the report submitted under a new law drafted by Sen. Harold E. Hughes, D—Iowa, a reformed alcoholic.

It said the problem causes 28,000 traffic deaths a year and drains the economy of 15 billion dollars annually.

While we are horrified by the abuse of such drugs as hallucinogens, narcotics and stimulants by our youth, we pay little heed to the most abused drug of them all—Alcohol.

Earl F. Zeigler, former editor with the Presbyterian Board of Christian Education, in his "Open Letter to Church Members Who Drink" makes the following points: If moderation were a cure for the alcohol problem, there would not be nine million alcoholics; the majority of drinking church members are unaware of the nature of alcohol.

He expressed the desire that church members read up on alcohol because those engaged in the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages are definitely gunning for the church members. They know who drinks and who does not. They are willing to spend millions for ads to capture these non-drinkers. They know that the drinking church member will not interfere too much with their business. He will write few letters to legislators whom they are anxious to control.

"Remember when a fellow had to go out of his way to get some liquor? That was during prohibition. Today your young folks have to go out of their way to avoid it."
