I remember when she was a little girl about 10 years old. I heard her and some of her friends talking. They decided they would try to smoke. I thought, "Oh, no, here I go." But Sue didn't inhale the smoke so it didn't bother me too much. A few more times the next few years she tried smoking but never did it all the time.

Her mouth was beginning to like the taste. She started to smoke all the time. When she was 21, she was inhaling, too. That hurt. One time she tried to quit but she couldn't. She had a cigarette cough and it was starting to bother her and every time she coughed she hurt me, too. Those at night were the worst. I could be sleeping, then she would cough. She was not very well. The next day she went to the doctor. I heard the doctor say she had cancer. Now she was growing up and had a family. She was so sorry she didn't read the little notes about smoking when she was young. Two weeks went by, then three weeks, and she died.

The lung was saying, "Why me, why me? If only I was in somebody's body who doesn't smoke. Now I'm dead just because of her smoking."

That story can tell you how dangerous smoking

can be to you and your body.

Lots of people get cancer from smoking. But a lot of people who don't smoke get it, too. But people who smoke have a better chance of getting it. Death rates were higher from smokers than from nonsmokers. The bad thing now is that kids are starting to smoke younger.

Please take good care of yourself and your

body and don't smoke.

Alcohol and Drugs - Double Curse Over America

Look up, America! It's our bicentennial year. We should be proud, but we can't, because of our two major setbacks, the abuse of alcohol and drugs. We've overlooked the problems for years; now let's do something about them.

Alcohol is a colorless, flammable drug consisting of certain fermented sugars. People drink alcohol for pleasure and getting away from their worries. For the first half hour people say alcohol quickens their wits, but after that they won't tell you about it.

After having too much alcohol, they lose their coordination. They feel happy and carefree towards all people. After being constantly drunk, their senses are dulled and their body's resistances to disease is weakened. This could lead to death.

Alcoholism is just like a disease. Some symptoms are it strikes you suddenly; it's the cause of self-indulgence; it lays one down (hangovers); and

results in faulty organs.

Alcohol starts at the top of the brains. It first kills your judgement and works its way down through your driving, reasoning, sensation, and resulting in death.

Alcohol is the number one drug problem in

America.

Drugs are most commonly injected, smoked, inhaled, taken in pills, or sometimes eaten.

Drugs such as heroin and types of LSD are injected directly into the vein of the arm. This way the drug goes into effect faster.

Drugs such as marijuana are smoked. The marijuana (which is the most popular drug) is rolled into cigarettes - called joints. When the joints become too small for conventional smoking, the users use roach pipes to they can smoke the whole joint.

Drugs such as cocaine are usually inhaled or burned and the cokefiends inhale the smoke. When taken continuously, it ruins the physical and mental health. Cokefiends (people who take cocaine) are twitchy, nervous people who have trouble sleeping. Cokefiends will lie, beg or steal to get the drug.

Drugs such as peyote, pep pills, mood producers and LSD come in pills. They are the most

easily abused and usually result in death.

While under the influence, they may believe their senses also become keener. They can feel two separate emotions at once such as happy and sad.

THE HAND THAT ROCKS THE CRADLE

Doctors and researchers are alarmed at the number of high blood pressure and cardiac defects they are finding in new born infants and young children. They believe that the decreased available oxygen and the increased demand for oxygen may cause permanent damage to the heart. The lack of oxygen has long been known to permanently damage the brain.

Cancer is the leading cause of death for children between the ages of 1 and 15. Dr. B.L. Van

Duuvien, a leading authority on the biochemistry of carcinogens in tobacco and cigarette smoke, says: "In view of the established evidence that polycyclic hydrocarbons (carcinogen-containing chemicals) do reach the placenta and cross to the fetus, the suggestion that a pathogenic relationship might exist between inhaled cigarette smoke inhaled during pregnancy and the incidence of child cancers cannot be denied."

Based on a questionnaire in which 10,000,000 teen-age girls were interviewed, the American Cancer Society came up with these figures: Of the 2,700,000 girls who smoke, 25 per cent also smoke marijuana regularly; 81 per cent also drink, compared to 42 per cent of the non-smokers; smokers are more likely to have a boyfriend than non-smokers - 64 per cent to 38 per cent; smokers are more likely to have had sexual intercourse - 31 per cent to 8 per cent.

Only three per cent of the non-smokers use marijuana. Cancer Society President Benjamin F. Byrd called the smoking trend among teen-age girls "an urgent crisis."
