Erickson played piano and violins during the registration, coffee hour and private devotions just prior to the opening of the 68th District Convention of the Northwest District WCTU. Meeting at the Presbyterian Church of Crosby the meeting was chaired by Mrs. Milton Thorson, District President.

Rev. Charles Chaffin, in his opening message, scripture and prayer, brought out clearly how it costs something to live clean and pure lives before our Lord, but that the dividends it pays far out-weigh the cost. He read a poem, "The Postage Stamp", the though following that the stamp stuck to the letter and saw it safely through. No one can do better than that, so let's keep on sticking and be

true.

Mrs. Gerald Haugland gave us several numbers in song accompanied by her accordian. One number was "Jesus Is Lord of All," which He must be. Greetings, response, and flag salutes were followed by several selections on the piano and violins again by Mrs. Schell, Mrs. Helland and Rev. Erickson.

Our convention speaker was Rev. Perry McKeef, the state director of Child Evangelism. Using I Corinthians 3:1-15, he contrasted how the carnal person and the spiritual person build upon the cornerstone of Christ. Each chooses the durability of his work by what he does and how he uses his materials. He stated that the world would be in a far worse condition today if it were not for the work of the WCTU. After giving a brief history of the destructive force of the use of alcohol in our nation, he gave the results of a seven year study of the success rate of Teen Challenge: 87 percent never returned to drugs or liquor; 73 percent went on to further education; 78 percent stayed on the job. The use of drugs to treat drug abuse has resulted in less than 1 percent staying off the drug, alcohol included. Why such a drastic variance? It must be concluded that Teen Challenge is so effective because of the "Jesus Factor". NOTHING is too hard for God!

Mrs. Alvin Westlie, Mrs. Frank Schell, and Rev. Vernon Erickson sang a duet as the program continued into the White Ribbon Recruit Service. John Hass was presented by his mother, Mrs. Fred Hass, before the assembly which vowed also to support the child and his family in prayer, example, and love. Grandmother Adeline Schell played "Precious Gems" as background music

throughout the ceremony.

Following the duet, "Every Prayer Will Find Its" Answer", by Mrs. Schell and Mrs. Westlie, Mrs. Katherine Hanmer of the Crosby Union was given special recognition for more than 50 years of service to the WCTU. She recalls that she was also a White Ribbon Recruit as a child, and gave an interesting review of the past. After she recited the poem, "God Is No Stranger", Mrs. Thorson pinned a corsage on her.

Coffee was served prior to the remaining business session. We extend our grateful thanks to the Church and our many visitors in helping to

make this convention a good one.

HEARD AT NATIONAL

Miss Helen M. Allen, consultant to the Bureau of Narcotic Education declared the U.S. is "on the firing line" of one of the greatest struggles for survival that our nation has experienced." She was referring to a bill in Congress to permit the making of home brew.

American citizens are consuming 261,000,000 (m) gallons more alcoholic beverages in 1977 than in 1976, adding up to consumption by the drinking public of 15 million gallons of liquor, wine, and beer every 24 hours, 365 days a year, or 625,000 gallons every hour, Mrs. James Hatfield, recording secretary declared. "Beer consumption in the one-year period increased by 262 million gallons from 4.6 billion gallons consumed in 1972, to more than 4,862 billion in 1977.

Mrs. Robert Fortner, director of the Department of Home Protection said "Our moral standards must be determined by the Word, not the world," and said there is no greater "heritage to be left children than a concern for the future of all people and the comman band of people working for people."

Mrs. Herman Stanley, National WCTU president, declared "The moral depravity of programs or television is creating a swelling tide of crime immoral behavior and a breakdown of family life. The responsibility for this trend must be borne by the viewing public as well as the networks."... She also took issue with television by declaring "Some (stations) have switched from crime to illicit sex programs and depicting homosexual living as normal, thus minimizing the importance of marital relationships.

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PRESIDENT'S RECOMMENDATIONS YTC

An organization's effectiveness is determined by the involvment of its members and the clarity of its purpose and goals. Therefore I would liek to make the following recommendations for the Youth Temperance Council for the coming year:

1. That we carry out this year's theme "Season For YTC" through a wide variety of seasonal activities and through our emphasis on the Seasons of Purpose, Service, Promotion, Advance, Fellow-

ship, and Sharing.

2. That we recognize the urgency in gaining more members for the Youth Temperance Council and that we all strive to increase our membership. The base rate of growth outlined by the National Executive Director would be to have at least 10 members in every state which previously had none, 25 more members in each state organized, and 3 more new members in every council.

3. That each state and local council review the basics of parliamentary procedure so that business may be conducted properly and efficiently at

meetings.

4. That we support our National YTC Officers, Directors and Executive Director with our prayers and encouragement, that we respond to communication from them promptly, and that we actively participate in any projects or activities they may wish to originate.

5. That we seek to maintain "Open Channels" between the YTC and WCTU as together we work to alleviate oppression of the individual, family, and nation caused by the use of alcohol, other narcotics,

and tobacco.

That we express our gratitude to Joseph A. Califano, Jr., Secretary of Health, Education, and

Welfare, for his campaign against smoking.

7. That, as we take advantage of growing public sentiment against smoking to encourage abstinence from tobacco, we work to create such a trend against the use of alcoholic beverages.

8. That we seek God's guidance daily that we may show His love and concern in all that we do.

Women of all ages and walks of life now constitute one third of this country's estimated 9 million alcoholics, report the Health Insurance Institute.

Women, according to a recent government survey comprise the largest increase in the drinking population in recent years.

Women who drink to excess, experts say, tend to lay the blame on family disagreements. Men are more likely to attribute it to job problems. Women alcoholics are also more likely to lapse into deep depression than men alcoholics and often suffer greater social isolation.

The most effective remedy for the disease, medical experts feel is to stop using alcohol. After the alcohol is halted, the problems that have been responsible for it can be better treated.

Too often the warning signs of trouble go unnoticed by both the woman alcoholic and her family. Some of the clues for detention are: memory lapses, frequent falls, obvious intoxication after only one or two drinks, weight gain despite irregular eating habits, housekeeping neglect, financial problems, and absences from the job.

National Woman's Christian Temperance Union PRESIDENT'S RECOMMENDATIONS 1978--1979

"The progress of an organization is in exact ratio to its vital concerns, noble action, perpetual

vigilance and patient perserverance."

Today we stand looking into the future toward the unfolding of God's plan and purpose for the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. We must be ready to "Prove all things; hold fast that which is good." (1/8 Thess. 5:21). Now is the time to plan the strategy to move into the many Open Channels of service.

The following recommendations are offered as a guide toward the fulfillment of the true import and thrust for greater social and moral reform, and be ready to attack the powerful forces of evil that lurk on every side.

VITAL CONCERN

Prayer and Commitment. Prayer is not a substitute for work. It is the source of power that stimulates the vital concerns of the home, the family and society. "Let us, "Continue in prayer, and watch in the same with thanksgiving" (Col. 4:2) knowing that God has promised that "when we call, He will answer". He waits to give us the power and wisdome we need.

NOBLE ACTION

Abraham Lincoln once said, "We must meet the liquor traffic and its cohorts of evil in one of two ways. "Furnish the recruits to keep up the ever increasing army of drunkards or remove temptation out of the way of the coming generation by putting an end to the traffic.

Involvement. We must be ready to use every "proper means" to halt the vicious circle of the promotion, sales and increase in the consumption of beverage alcohol. An army never wins a battle standing in dress review. It must become involved in open combat, under strategic command and be prepared to strike on order. So must we be prepared in this battle for temperance reform to move on command and follow the strategic pattern for advancement. Be alert! Cast a ballot in each referendum and election. Be ready and willing to carry petitions, to raise a voice in public hearings, to make contact with enforcement agencies, public servants in all levels of government. Make use the pen and telephone. Involvement calls for action.

Education. Temperance education which does not mean total abstinence is powerless. Because the precepts and principles of the family circle are the supreme conductors of character building we must support young parents in their effort to establish spiritual and moral standards for their children. Provide the Loyal Temperance Legion for their training in total abstinence and good citizenship and sponsor Youth Temperance Councils to assist in the development of strong leaders for tomorrow. No union can experience complete fulfillment that does not provide training for the LTL, YTC and

support for parents dedicating their pre-schoolers as White Ribbon Recruits.

Public School and Church Schools. Every local union should make contact with teachers, present the available material to teach the effects of alcohol, and to set forth the value of total abstinence

Community Projects. Offer service to the groups who are combatting the crime and violence in the street, child abuse and other worthwhile efforts being made.

Where nothing has been done, take the lead. Pioneering is serious business for dedicated "White Ribboners". "Be strong and of a good courage, fear not, nor be afraid of them: for the Lord thy God, he it is that doth go with thee; he will not fail thee, nor forsake thee." (Deut. 31:6).

PERPETUAL VIGILANCE

Unions of earnest, diligent and devoted members must be undergirded by a well planned strategy that is sensitive to danger and armed with the power of truth and the certainty of Christian faith and fidelity.

"Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like

men, be strong" (I Cor. 16:13).

The program of the union can not be a hop, skip and jump affair, it is a steady, but constant on the job task. Just as Nehemiah gave every man and his family a sentinel post to stay off the enemy, so must we. Frances Willard saw the importance of putting members at the post where they could serve best and thus came the "do everything policy." Keep the members aware of problems. Set sentinels to report back the advance, or need and take arms to defeat the enemy there. The command is "fight" not sit back and be conquered.

PATIENT PERSERVERANCE

Ambition can be a vital and dynamic power, to alert others, when applied with persistent but patient steadfastness of purpose, a determined spirit, a well planned strategy of action and a constant stick-to-it-iveness" that never gives up.

We can go forward into Open Channels of service

with these four requisites:

CONCERN for all mankind that alerts others to a

"common danger"

VIGILANCE & PERSISTENCE to duty that augments a "common hope"

ACTION, motivated by an unconquered will, that mobilize forces for battle in a "common cause"

"Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him that loved us." (Rom. 8:37).

Be a sentinel on duty for "God and Home and Everyland."
