Registration and pre-session meetings for the 89th Annual Convention of the North Dakota Woman's Christian Temperance Union began at 1 p.m. October 12 at the Assumption Abbey in Richardton. About 16 early arrivers enjoyed fellowship over a noon luncheon in the cafeteria at the Abbey.

Following an inspirational Prayer and Praise Service led by Emma Blattner with the assistance of Anna Auk and Earl Dodge, the 89th State Convention was called to order by President Mrs. LeRoy Bartle. All officers were present with the exception of Mrs. George Fannik. Mrs. Robert McCleary served as recording secretary pro tem. Along with the business session we received the greetings from Mrs. James Hatfield, guest speaker and National Recording Secretary from Kansas. In Washington, there were 9,819 abortions last year compared with 9,746 resident births.

It was a treat to see some of you folks (Members-at-Large) at our state convention in October. Wasn't the Assumption Abbey a great place to meet? The workers took care of all our needs - and were so gracious about it.

To me one of the greatest thrills of the convention was the in-put by the Youth Temperance Council of Dickinson. We also appreciated the Intervarsity Christian Fellowship coming to entertain us. Their music was somewhat different from what we grew up on. Nevertheless, it was good to see young people serving the Lord in different ways. Did you know that the Dickinson YTC went to the National Convention where they "did our state up proud"? Read the report complete with pictures in The Union Signal.

We know it isn't easy for Christian young people to take a stand for the right these days when the popular thing too often is to use alcohol and other drugs. I have heard young people beg the oldsters to hold them up in prayer. If there ever was a time when we need to undergird them with our prayers, it is now! Let us help them to realize that they are not alone. Christ's words to us are: "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Matthew 28:20. And in First John 4:4 we read "Greater is He that is in you, then he that is in the world." Another precious promise is found in First Corinthians 10:13; "There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able, but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it." Truly He is "a Friend that sticketh closer than a brother", Proverbs 18:24.

I am sure many of you are aware of our work in the Education Department. We are happy for the booth we have at the North Dakota Education Association Convention. Many teachers become acquainted with our work and request literature and other materials. We have some of the finest filmstrips and films to lend to schools and other organizations. As you know there are many other departments in our WCTU. Each one is designed not only to rid our nation of the curse of alcohol and other drugs, but also to promote a high quality of living. They include Christian Outreach, Citizenship, Home Protection, Projection Methods, Public Relations, Social Service, and Legislation.

Space would not permit me to go into detail about work that is being done by each one. But I do want to make special mention of one, the Legislative Department. Thelma Klingensmith, formerly County Superintendent of Schools for twelve years and a paid lobbyist in her own right, has consented to accept leadership in this department for the North Dakota WCTU. She is a very knowledgeable

and capable person. With her guidance we can expect to make our influence count - not only in the work that we do but also by informing other Christian people - urging them to write and speak up as the need arises.

Our theme for this year is "Open Channels". May God grant us the wisdom and the ability to be at our best for Him.

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS OF INTEREST

MICHIGAN raised voting age to 21 by 57 percent to 43 percent. Opposition is trying to have it declared unconstitutional. Pray that this will be denied.

KANSAS SUPREME COURT VOIDS "Liquor by the Drink" election because it violates the Kansas constitution against maintenance of an open saloon. Pray that this will hold.

MONTANA and **IOWA** have raised the drinking age to 19.

TENNESSEE is working to raise the legal drinking age back to 21. They report 18 victories in 19 elections on liquor issues.

FLORIDA defeated the casino gambling issue. **NEW JERSEY** defeated the Jai Alai gambling issue.

In **CHICAGO**, seven precincts in six wards voted dry. One precinct in another ward voted to end its ban on liquor. Opposition registering for appeal cases. The courts are known for repeated continuances on such appeals.

CHELSEA BEER (the "not so soft" drink) - Sale has been opposed because of its appeal to children and youth. The Annheuser-Busch people have withdrawn (supposedly) this product until they can decide how to return it to the market in one of two ways...either without any alcohol which can continue to be sold with soft drinks, or with alcohol and sold in liquor stores apart from soft drinks. Watch for developments in your area. They want something "socially acceptable"!!!!!!

OPEN CHANNELS**excerpts from Mrs. Hatfield's address**

In order to take advantage of the open channels God has given to us, we first must take a full measure of Hebrews 4:16 - Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

Are we not in a time of great need when 625 million gallons of alcoholic beverages are consumed every hour? When 70 percent of our teenagers drink to varying degrees? When teenage problem drinkers have doubled in the last five years? "Parents need to be more alert." We must reach the children in the fifth and sixth grades - "Jr. High is too late."

The four main causes of drinking among young people are parental influence and example; peer pressure; the need to rebel against authority; and emotional disturbance associated with anxiety, insecurity, extreme self-consciousness, and lack of self-confidence and self-image. They "start early to drink for the psychological effect. Experts note that they try to skip ahead into an adult role, to gain a feeling of comfort or acceptance by his or her peers." What will the end be? They are the future leaders of the world.

"Americans smoked about 620 Billion dollars last year...about 25 percent of the total cost of all illnesses, according to a survey published in the New England Journal of medicine. Each alcoholic costs the country's economy \$5,000 a year and each person who smokes costs \$459, according to Brian Leiss, Health Economist of the School of Public Health, University of Los Angeles and Dr. Stuart Schweitzer."

"In matters of principle we should be inflexible; in minor matters where no vital principle is involved, we must be willing to make concessions that do not require compromise."
