Our Minot District Women's Christian Temperance Union Convention met on May 3rd at the Bethel Free Lutheran Church here in Minot with our president, Mrs. Everett Johnson, presiding. Mrs. George Fannik substituted for Mrs. Ruth Luchsinger as recording secretary. Mrs. Ruth Loughead was in charge of registration and also served as cashier. Registrants numbered an even fifty.

The morning devotions were given by our host pastor, Rev. Terry Olson. He read portions of Psalm 37 and offered prayer. Mrs. George Fannik, accompanied by Mrs. Art Vix at the piano, favored us with a vocal selection entitled, "I'm Sheltered

Safe in the Arms of God".

In addition to giving the pledges the American, Christian, and Temperance flags, the group joined in the singing of "What a Friend."

Business matters were taken care of during the morning session. Mrs. Everett Johnson and Mrs. George Fannik were re-elected to the positions of

president and vice president, respectively.

The various unions reported on their progress for this past year. All have been instrumental in getting films and filmstrips into the schools. Mr. Greavey, who heads the Rugby Senior Citizens, said the group has established a "NO SMOKING" policy. They may have lost a few but have gained many more non-smokers. Letters have been written to our legislators and to Governor Link congratulating him on his stand for good legislation, particularly in regard to his veto of the parimuetal betting measure. Mrs. Hector from Crosby, reported on their response from Governor Link. Our letters of commendation give him the support and encouragement he needs. WCTU members, along with other concerned citizens, voiced their protest at the hearing pertaining to allowing liquor to be sold at the bowling alleys in the city of Minot. By a vote of 3 to 2 it was decided to table the matter and give it more study. The Max - Benedict Union has gained five new members this year. Their observance of Temperance Day had to be postponed due to inclement weather, but still was a worthwhile project. Elder Laughton talked to three different grade levels. A demonstration using "Smoking Sam" was given and leaflets were passed out. The Max - Benedict Union also bears the distinction of being the only one maintaining a prayer - band.

It has been decided to rotate the responsibility of handling the district conventions in the future. Mrs. Vernon Forthun agreed to be the chairperson in

charge of the 1980 Convention in Minot.

We adjourned for the noon hour. A delicious meal was served by the ladies of the church.

We reconvened at 1:30 p.m. for our afternoon session. The group sang "If Ever I Need Thee."

Mrs. Johnson introduced our guest speaker and singers. Rev. and Mrs. Gene Clott, from the First
