It Is Later Than We Think

ESSAY: "How Drugs Could Affect Me"

"It all started with cigarettes!" was the plaintive
cry that came down from the man lying on his back
in the hospital bed. For several days he had been
suffering intense pain which no amount of

in the hospital bed. For several days he had been suffering intense pain which no amount of medication could entirely help. For five straight days a needle had been in his arm through which an expensive drug was being injected.

This is the agony of one who has lung cancer and has been smoking since age sixteen. It took just one

puff, and he was hooked for life.

The effects of drugs on my system could be as devastating. Once the drugs get inside of me, they affect my blood, brain, heart, liver, and lungs. The drugs make me do funny things. I will feel like I'm floating in space. A story from the April 1979 "Readers Digest" tells of a college student who took P.C.P. It made him run up and down the halls with a fire extinguisher in his hand. His mind was being destroyed by the drug like mine could be under like circumstances. It took a year of his life to get his mind and body cleared up and back to normal. If I took the same drug he did, I would be irrational and in a daze. My insides would be mixed up and maybe even destroyed.

Here is another example of messing up of a young person's life and the family's too. This particular girl had a high "B" average in school and spent money fast. She even took money from her parents. Her parents found out and after some debate, they sent her to a special hospital to get help. She came back and was pretty good for a while, but then it started all over again. The parents sent her back to the special hospital again. It seems that one of her friends was selling the drugs to her. This is also what could happen to me if I got hooked.

Another kind of drug is cigarettes which is bad enough, but even worse is the kind which people drink, and that is much too easy to get. Suppose we heard about a friend: "Defendant guilty...10 years in the penitentiary." What if it were about ourselves? I'm glad it can't be said about me. Drug users -- any kind -- kill and cripple others, not meaning to, but not knowing what is happening.

What do you think of when you hear about drugs? Is it PCP, angel dust, LSD, marijuana, heroin --? Maybe you don't think of just smoking or drinking, although they are almost the largest problems in drug abuse. Most people don't realize that those drugs kill more people each year than many of the other drugs do. Say "No, thank you!" when you're offered drugs any time. I will.
