ESSAY: HOW DRUGS CAN AFFECT ME

"Mom, there aren't any drugs in the small towns around here, so don't worry. Anyhow, I can take care of myself." This is a common statement from teenagers everywhere. The only trouble is, it's all false. Towns from New York and Chicago down to Hunter and Arthur all have drug pushers. Someone usually tries it, and then a chain reaction starts and the area starts with numerous problems.

Most parents worry about their children, while some others don't. My mom always worries when I go out, so one day I told her, "Mom, you never have to worry about me drinking, smoking or popping pills. I would rather go to a party and remember the good time I had, than to come home drunk or high on some kind of dope and forget everything." This is what really happens. "A joint or marijuana cigarette will usually wear off after a good nights sleep. Dom, which is called STP by users, takes two to three days to wear off." So you see, I could be on a trip after the party and forget things for a couple of days. I would rather go to a party, stay sober and have a good time, and remember it, than to have a few drinks, smoke a few joints, take a little coke, and wake up the next morning with a hangover and wonder how the party was. When I think about it, just a little can do a lot.

In the past 35 years, the number of drug users and alcoholics has risen greatly. "In 1945 there were 2.8 million alcoholics in the United States, and by 1974 they were up to 9.3 million alcoholics. The recent statistics show that there are 11.2 million alcoholics in the United States." According to Signal Press, alcoholics have risen 8.4 million since 1945. This means one out of every ten Americans are alcoholics. "Today, alcoholics and drug users are up 20 percent from 1974." It's really hard for me to believe one of my friends, out of every ten, could either pop pills or drink. When I put it that way, it really hits me. I wonder, "How can I help them? Do they want my help? Should I ask for assistance in helping them?" There would be many unanswered questions I would have to go through to help my friend. So you see, besides being tough on the drug abuser or alcoholic, it's not a piece of cake for his friends either.

"Drugs are the number four killer in the United States today, and pill popping is one of the most dangerous of the American pastimes." If I would take too many pills at one time, I could die instantly. I have never realized these sudden effects. Could you imagine losing one of your close friends because she took one too many pills or she just had to have a couple more drinks? I can't. To me it would seem like a bad dream, but for some people, it's not a dream, it's a reality.

In conclusion, drugs can affect people everywhere and in any way. Drugs don't only affect the abuser, but also the people around him. If drugs keep spreading like they have been, who knows what this world will be coming to. My opinion is, is

that people will keep using drugs and spreading them to other people, but if someone would stop and look at what is happening, maybe more people would stop and start helping others.

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Education must be the foundation for freedom from alcoholic oppression, but education without action is futile. Let us therefore learn the truth, speak the truth and act the truth.

Have you considered the impact of Radio and Television as compared to the schools? Children listen to the radio and watch television more hours; thus the medias control them more than do the schools.

The State Highway Safety Coordinator reports that drinking has been the Number One factor in fatal traffic accidents in Hawaii for the past three years, and speed is the Number Two factor.
