The 72nd Annual Convention of the Grand Forks District WCTU was held May 12 at the Swarstad Chapel in Northwood. The session was led by Bertina Evanson on the theme, "Let us your servants see your mighty deeds; let our descendants see your glorious might." Psalm 90:16.

Mrs. Steinhueler, Grand Forks newest member, led devotions, which she took from Psalm 90. She said alcohol causes 80 percent of crime, traffic deaths, divorces, and even poor school grades. Each can or glass of alcoholic beverage kills 1000 brain cells. Alcohol is our number one drug, being

more readily accessible to our youth.

After our business session we heard from our morning speaker, Avis Osland. She used Psalm 90:16 and cited many cases of wasted lives that had been changed by turning to God. She said that 91 percent of high school seniors drink, 46 percent of seventh graders drink, 600,000 teenage girls gave birth, and ¼ of all teenagers commit suicide. She urged us and our teenagers to listen to Mel Johnson's "Tips for Teens" on radio.

Mendora Bilden spoke on behalf of LTL youth at

YTC Camp in June.

Mary La Marre and Isabelle Henry conducted the Memorial Hour. Northwood had lost one

member, Myrtle Uglem.

Anna Kordahl used Ephesians 6:10 - "Be strong in the Lord" for her afternoon devotions. Our afternoon speaker was Phyllis Roehl. She mentioned "The Park" as a good film for both high school and grades 4, 5, and 6. She said North Dakota is called the Las Vegas of the North because of its gambling and over 70 percent of accidents in Traill County alone are a result of alcohol. 
Connie Mutchler and Alice Sandeen conducted the White Ribbon Service for six children, followed

The 83rd Annual Bismarck District Convention was held Friday, May 21, 1982, at the Steele United Methodist Church with President Warrenne Drown presiding. Twenty-two members and friends attended.

Rev. Henry Bahrenburg, Jr. of the host church gave the morning devotions using John 15:1-11 and 2 Chronicles 7:14, stressing the need for prayer with a purpose.

"Search Me" was sung by Mrs. Henry Bahrenburg, "Come to the King" was sung by her daughter, Anna, and "When We See Christ" was

sung by Rev. and Mrs. Drown.

Elizabeth Lind sang "After" as a part of the Memorial Service honoring Lillian Berwuist, Mrs. J. A. Engen, and Laura Little. Thelma Klingensmith, Edna Jensen, and Emma Blattner presented the service.

The Steele Union reported 9 members and 3 extension members. They provided YTC inserts for church bulletins, gave out literature at the Kidder County Fair, had a float in the Centennial parade, put a WCTU write-up in the Centennial Book. They provided gifts for the State Hospital at Jamestown and helped with the film, "Focus on the Family". The Steele community is trying to start a Youth Center and Coffee House.

Bismarck Union reported 23 members and 8 honorary members. Bismarck Union gave out 1600 pieces of literature, circulated "Barbie and Butch" filmstrips in four area schools. Five members attended the Governor's Conference on Drinking Drivers May 13 and 14. An item in the February Union Signal about Frances Willard's efforts to stop doctors' prescribing alcohol as medicine interested State Director of Drug Abuse and Alcoholism in receiving a subscription to The Union Signal from the local Union. R.A.I.D. (Removing Alcohol-Impaired Drivers from the road) is a special project of the State Highway Patrol to reduce the recent 75 percent of alcohol-related traffic fatalities in North Dakota.

Rev. Drown gave the afternoon devotions based on Philippians 1:12-28, "in nothing terrified by the adversary" -- that could be said about the early Christians and WCTU members; such a revival is needed.

Olga Huhncke conducted the White Ribbon

Recruit Service for Steven DeKrey.

Thelma Klingensmith talked on gambling in North Dakota - the present law, its effect, and plans. Although North Dakota had a law against gambling since early statehood, bingo, raffles, and carnival games in churches and schools were generally not prosecuted. A constitutional amendment was passed in 1875 to make these legal for charitable purposes with a vote of 93,000 yes to 38,000 no. Gradually the legislature has added other games of chance - tip jars, pull tabs, and later 21 and blackjack and extended the places from

clubs to bars and other locations. The media recently reported excursions from Canada and Minnesota to participate in gambling in North Dakota. Some churches, mayors, police officers, and others are speaking out against the dangers of gambling - the increase of crimes committed, also the increase in welfare cases. What is called charitable gambling is undermining proper Christian attitudes on giving and loving one's neighbor. Gambling breeds greed. A constitutional amendment with words "games of chance" taken out and leaving only bingo and raffles would have to secure signatures of 28,000 legal North Dakota voters by August 1st to be on the November ballot. That will require a lot of work.

Rev. Drown reported on the seminar "Win the Fight Against Pornography" held in Mandan in May. Six WCTU members attended and heard Senator Hal Christianson, Bruce Taylor of Citizens Decency Through Law, and Police Chiefs Moline (Mandan) and Madeiros (Bismarck) speak of the dangerous effect of pornography and how to combat it. The first amendment does not contain

the right to destroy morals.

Edna Jenson installed the following Bismarck District officers: President - Warrenne Drown; Vice President - Olga Huhncke; Secretary - Verna Ellsworth; and Treasurer - Marion Brusven.

Mrs. Winnie DeKrey was honored for her many

years as district treasurer.

timetable.

Keene, a young man from Malaysia, spoke to us and encouraged the campers in the faith. We enjoyed his questions related to alcohol, since this is not a topic that comes under scrutiny in his country. He is a student at UND. He became acquainted with the camp at Cooperstown through Campus Crusade and Inter-Varsity Fellowship.

On Thursday forenoon, we had the unique pleasure to listen to a Deputy-Sheriff from Griggs County. Mr. Hendrickson comes from Minnesota

and has been on the Law Enforcement Staff at Griggs County for two years. He encouraged the young people to enjoy nature and provide themselves with their own homespun entertainment. He alluded to peer pressure and said it contributes to the drinking patterns of young people, but he also said that if young people stand their ground to those who challenge a good time without drinking that it could be done too, and that anyone who will stand his ground will be respected for just that. There were also laws that he explained and the penalties that go with them when the laws are broken. We used this man, along with Ruby, another Camp Helper, who is a MK. She has lived in Brazil, so she told us about the people, their problems, and their land. She will be attending St. Paul Bible College and then some medical school because she wants to go back to Brazil and help them with their physical problems as well as giving them the message that Jesus loves them and died for them.

Yes, we had a good time during these days. And the blessings that were ours were just great. We pray that these days together will count for eternity. We pray, too, that what was taught by precept and by example will abide and become part of each young life that attended the 1982 camp. Thanks, WCTU ladies, for this fine opportunity.

WIN THE FIGHT AGAINST PORNOGRAPHY

About 100 people attended the seminar "Win the Fight Against Pornography" at Seven Seas Motel in Mandan on May 15, 1982. The meeting was sponsored by the Mandan Citizens Awareness Committee. Don and Thelma Klingensmith and Verna Ellsworth of the Bismarck WCTU are on the 11-member committee organized in January 1981, at a community meeting to fight pornography and adult entertainment centers.

Senator Hal Christianson of Minot spoke of the effects of pornography and reported that the Minot Adult Bookstore had been closed. Bruce Taylor, lawyer for Citizens for Decency Through Law, Phoenix, Arizona, explained how, as a young Cleveland police prosecutor, he learned porno stores are connected to organized crime and how to successfully close them. He has won Supreme Court decisions in obscenity cases and has advised local officers in many parts of the United States on successful procedures. THE FIRST AMENDMENT DOES NOT CONTAIN THE RIGHT TO DESTROY MORALS. Police Chiefs Moline

(Mandan) and Madeiros (Bismarck) shared the work of the police in regard to obscenity. Citizens need to voice their opposition to obscenity on TV, movies, billboards, ads, and stores. Much favorable comment was heard on the educational value of the seminar and on the fine local Christian police chiefs.
