Oh! Best beloved state of our glorious land, God bless thee and guide thee, always!


PERSONAL MENTION

Your president recommends:

SPIRITUAL LIFE

We are the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. The emphasis is on "Christian" first of all, for apart from Him we can do nothing. Therefore, we recommend that:

1. A time be set for prayer and meditation with

the Lord each day.

2. Each member read one or more devotional

books found on the WCTU Reading List.

3. Our members be encouraged to remember the prayer at the noontime hour for all WCTU work and workers in our country and around the world.

MEMBERSHIP

Each year it becomes more clear how great is the need for new replacements in the ranks of the WCTU. It follows then that there is need for real growth and added strength. Thus it is extremely important that we make a sacrificial effort to enlarge our membership. Therefore we urge that:

1. A serious concentrated effort be made to

organize local unions.

2. Each of us needs to recruit and enlist one or more new members.

3. A special effort be made to involve new members in all the work of the WCTU.

4. An LTL and YTC be organized in as many local

unions as possible.

5. We pray the Lord will raise up leaders for the vacant positions in the WCTU.

EDUCATION

We rededicate ourselves to the education of our nation's youth to the harmful effects of alcoholic beverages, other narcotic drugs and tobacco. To this end we recommend that:

1. Efforts be made to place our Signal Press literature into the hands of teachers, principals, curriculum directors and administrators wherever

possible.

2. We endeavor to introduce our films and film-

strips into schools both public and private. PUBLICATIONS

We are proud of our two monthly magazines, The Union Signal, for adults and The Young Crusader, for children. You need our two magazines for their excellent content and we need your subscription support. In view of increased costs of paper, printing and postage, the subscription prices are a

real bargain. Therefore we recommend:
1. That all officers and more members become

subscribers.

2. That subscriptions be given as awards, gifts and special occasions (Christmas, birthdays, anniversaries).

3. That subscriptions be sent to public officials,

educators and social workers.

4. That emphasis be placed on the renewal of all current subscriptions.
PUBLIC IMAGE

The tragedies of our society resulting from beverage alcohol are forcing a favorable change in the public's attitude toward the WCTU. Therefore

1. That we make use of every opportunity to keep

the WCTU before the public.

2. That we inform the press of our activities.

3. That you purchase the 30-second spot announcement in color on video tape for TV and ask your TV station to show it as a public service announcement. Take along, also, a copy of the "Fruesta Party Book".

LEGISLATION

it is vital:

It is important to keep on top of legislation and to make our views known to our elected officials. Hence we should:

1. Write to our Senators and Representatives.

2. Pray for our public officials that they will resist the pressures for profit of evil forces.

3. Write to TV stations and sponsors approving good programs and protesting drinking, immorality and violence.

FINANCE

Salaries and other financial obligations become due and must be met week by week and month by month. Therefore, in order that the work of the WCTU not be hampered:

 We urge all treasurers, local, county-district and state, to forward their monies on a regular basis, preferably once a month, or at least each

quarter.

2. We urge you to support the various national projects, as follows: The Lillian Stevens Fund for Legislative work; The Frances E. Willard Fund for Organization work; The \$50,000 Club for Education; The Three P's for Painting, Preserving and Protecting the properties of National Headquarters.

Again this year, I wish to say, that it is vital to our cause to make the public aware of our existence and our objectives. We need to promote the WCTU and bring it to the public eye. The above recommendations are a guide to this end.

RESOLUTIONS

National Woman's Christian Temperance Union Syracuse, New York

August 19-23, 1982

We, the members of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, meeting in annual convention in Syracuse, New York, August 19-23, 1982, are mindful of the goodness of God and are grateful for His leadership and guidance in the work He has called us to do.

Conditions in the nation today call for concern and for more complete dedication to the task which is ours. The increasing use of beverage alcohol and other addictive drugs has reached an alarming degree and calls for an accelerated educational and legislative program to seek to remedy the situation. The challenge is greater than ever, and we commit ourselves to the task with courage and confidence.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: SCHOOL - Because of the conditions that exist in schools today, we urge strict enforcement of laws regarding the sale and use of alcohol and other drugs on school grounds and the sale of the same

within a given proximity of the school.

We commend the effort of some school officials for the narcotic education program being promoted and for their concern for the protection of the youth

under their care.

CHURCH - Realizing that the church exerts a tremendous influence in the lives of people and believing that abstinence from harmful substances is a Christian virtue, we commend those churches that have included material on the harmful effects bf alcohol and other drugs in the church school and youth publications and we urge all denominations to make this information available to all members of the church school, youth groups, and the membership at large.

We believe that a better informed ministry and aity on the harmful effects of alcohol and other drugs upon individuals, the home, church, and society would result in an awakening in the churches as to their responsibility to their membership. We believe that a clarion call to Christian discipleship, which includes abstinence from addiction-producing drugs, needs to be sounded by

the church today.

TEEN-AGE DRINKING - With a growing concern about the increase in teen-age drinking and a realization of the serious drinking problem among young people, we urge that all the states set 21 years as the minimum age at which alcoholic

beverages may be purchased.

We commend those state legislatures that have raised the minimum age to 21 years at which alcoholic beverages may be purchased and rejoice with them at the benefits that have been derived therefrom. We urge other states to follow their public information.

DRUNK-DRIVING - Being aware of the terrible

toll in life and property caused by the drunken driver, we request legislatures in all states to enact stricter laws and require better enforcement that will serve as a deterrent to all persons who drink alcoholic beverages and attempt to drive upon streets and-or highways, thereby endangering the lives of many people.

LOTTERY - With an insatiable desire for money, many states are being asked to permit lotteries. Knowing that this form of gambling is detrimental to most individuals, unprofitable to the state, conducive to bribery and moral corruption in high places in government, we urge the various state legislatures not to permit the operation of a lottery.

LEGISLATION - Throughout the years, as individual members, we have sought to bring about good legislation and to prevent the passage of harmful legislation by our presence at public hearings, personal contacts, and letter writing, and now we express our concern about the following legislation and urge continuing support of the same:

1. The Brown Bill HR2551, which seeks to amend the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act to provide that any label or advertising of all alcoholic beverages contain a statement warning consumers of the possible health hazards associated with the beverage.

2. The bill which seeks to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 to provide that advertising of alcoholic beverages not be a deductible expense.

3. The bill which seeks to set 0.05 percent Blood Alcohol Concentration as the basis for conviction for drunken driving in his House Bill 2488 as that is a more realistic percentage according to medical science and statistics.

PEACE - Being mindful of the peace movement and the great desire for peace among the majority of people, for which the WCTU has stood throughout the years, we call upon national leaders to exert every effort to maintain peace with other countries.

As Christians we pray for a peaceful solution of any international differences. We recognize the United Nations as an instrument for peace and recommend that we cooperate with its program as far as it is consistent with the program of this organization.

CRIME - With the rising tide of criminality in America, which frightens and challenges every thoughtful citizen, we urge stricter enforcement of law, the reestablishment of respect for law and order, and parental discipline in the home which is

the basis for law-abiding citizens.

Statistics reveal that more than one-half of the crimes committed are alcohol-related and that the crime rates parallel increasing liquor sales. We urge careful analysis of the causes of crime and ask that such causes be placed in true perspective as TELEVISION - Deploring the continuing televising of programs of violence, explicit sex, drinking scenes, etc., after continuing and great effort to get the networks to remedy the situation, we call upon members and others to contact CBS, ABC, NBC, mutual and cable television presidents and program directors expressing our displeasure of these types of programs being produced.

We commend the sponsors who have withdrawn support of some of the programs classified as nonacceptable by some of the viewing audience.

RESPONSIBILITY OF DISPENSERS OF

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES - Feeling that the manufacturer, distributor, seller, and server as well as the consumer are equally responsible for the effects of the use of alcoholic beverages and other drugs in deaths, highway accidents, crime, property damage, etc., we ask that the courts hold them equally responsible in the making of the decisions in cases in which drinking is involved.

VENEREAL DISEASES - Since venereal diseases have reached epidemic proportion, according to health authorities, causing blindness, insanity, and death to the individual and untold damage to the unborn, we reaffirm our belief in an equally high standard of purity for men and

women.

We believe that education is essential to the elimination of the venereal diseases and we urge that such studies should include the relation of alcohol and other narcotic drugs to the contraction

and spread of the diseases.

HIGHWAY SAFETY - Since beverage alcohol is recognized as a major cause of highway accidents resulting in injuries and deaths, we urge all states to adopt uniform chemical tests, including blood and breath tests, for alcohol concentration in the blood, with 0.05 percent as the minimum alcohol content above which driving under the influence is

presumed.

FETAL ALCOHOL SYNDROME - Realizing that alcohol readily crosses the placenta and enters into the bloodstream of a developing fetus and that alcohol produces congenital malformation and mental deficiences in a significant proportion of the offspring of drinking women, resulting in heavy expenditures in caring for these individuals by families and by government, we strongly urge women of childbearing age to abstain from the consumption of alcohol.

WORLD HUNGER - Being deeply concerned about the extreme extent of hunger in the world today, we earnestly request that grain be used to feed the hungry rather than to be made into alcoholic beverages and that the proper govern-

ment officials be informed of our request.

DRUGS - Regarding the interest in the family and drugs manifested by the First Lady of the United States, Mrs. Nancy Reagan, and her crusade against drug abuse, especially among young people, and since alcohol is the number one drug, we urge that the use of all alcoholic beverages be

banned in the White House. We believe that actions speak louder than words.

We request that a letter be sent to Mrs. Reagan from this convention expressing our appreciation of her interest in curbing drug abuse and ask that she begin at the White House by not serving alcoholic beverages there or at any official occasion. We request a copy of the resolution accompany the letter.

We request that a letter be sent to President Ronald Reagan commending him for the establishment of the 30-member Presidential Commission on Drunk Driving to assist the various states in their effort to reduce the loss of life and property

caused by the drunken driver.
