THE TAX CODE FOR MORALITY

We can well understand why the distiller's lobby would be opposed to any additional taxes on alcoholic beverages. That's their job and more taxes would cut into their profits. Perhaps the liquor lobby has been very effective because we did not have an excise tax placed on the so-called "sin" items named by the press such as "alcoholic beverages". However, we think he is wearing dark glasses so that he cannot really see the facts when he questions whether high taxes on liquor would reduce consumption of alcoholic beverages and perform a social good.

Making alcoholic beverages expensive, inaccessible, and scarce would certainly reduce to some degree the flow of liquor. To reduce the flow and raise the price could make some dent on the

ravages of liquor.

Alcoholic beverages are not necessary like food, fuel, and the staples that support human life. The nation could go on living, and living well without alcoholic beverages. They do not deserve any

preferred treatment.

If the government is still troubled about its deficit it should not put on the back burner the \$25 billion dollar suggestion of Michael F. Jacobson, the executive director of the Center for Science in the Public Interest. Think of it - just raise the federal excise tax on wine and beer. What an excellent way to make the nation more sober and at the same time reduce the deficit which costs the taxpayers for interest must be paid on deficits.

# LIQUOR INDUSTRY BRISTLES

Thomas Lowe writing for The Washington Report, said that the liquor industry had launched a "pre-emptive strike" to win the battle against additional excise taxes before it really started.

For several months some members of the Congress and others have been proposing additional "sim taxes" on liquor, beer, and tobacco to

help balance the federal budget.

Lowe said, "F. A. Meister, president of the Distillers Council of the United States, Inc., which represents distillers and importers in spearheading the battle against any new taxes for his industry."

"We've already done substantial congressional contact work," he said. Meister said, "We think there has been so much talk (about higher taxes)

that we are already facing a problem."

In Meisters opinion, any increase in taxes on what he calls "the nation's most highly taxed product" is inherently unfair to the industry and consumers of liquor.

Meister claims that the liquor industry has been taxed twice as heavily as any other industry. He claims that when a bottle leaves a distillery, 89 percent of its price comes from federal taxes that

average \$15 a gallon.

The Distillery spokesman says that proponents of increased excise taxes argue that such levies are relatively painless for the public because they tend to become less noticeable than income taxes.

Meister calls excise taxés regressive, claiming that they fall "most heavily on the poor." The Distillery spokesman contends that because taxes are levied at the point of manufacture, no other taxes contribute so to the acceleration of inflation.

Commenting on the idea that high taxes on such goods as alcohol - which might tend to reduce consumption - perform a social good. Meister said "It is not sound tax policy to penalize the majority of alcohol consumers for the excesses of a few." He added, "The tax code is hardly a place to dictate morality or personal tastes for the American public."
