WHAT IS THE VALUE YOU PLACE ON A CHILD'S LIFE?

The lives of our youth are being ravaged by Marijuana these days. Their personalities are

being devasted as well.

As early as 1976 Dr. Akira Morishimo of Colombia University looked at the white blood cells of 25 apparently healthy young males who had smoked Marijuana at least twice a week for 4 years and found that one-third of their cells contained only 5 to 30 of the normal complement of 46 chromosones. These are the particles in every cell's nucleus that pass on genetic instructions to the next generation. "In my 20 years of research on

human cells," said Marishimo, "I have never found any other drug that came close to the D.N.A.

damage done by Marijuana.

Since 1975 some 300 studies of Cannabis's harmful effects on animal and human cells have appeared in scientific journals. Pioneer Marijuana researcher Dr. Gabriel Nahas sums up the central role of Marijuana's effects on human cells. "The many findings of cell damage caused by cannabis explain all the other damaging effects of the drug on the lungs, sex organs, brain, immune system. I call the slow cell damage done by regular pot smoking over the years a SLOW EROSION OF LIFE".

According to latest (1979) U.S. National Survey on Drug Abuse, one out of 6 youngsters in the 12-17 age group was a current (within the past month of survey) pot smoker. In the 18-25 age group, one out of every 3 Americans was a current pot smoker.

Unlike the heavy drinker who generally "becomes himself again" when sober, the underlying personality structure of the chronic pot smoker seems to change. Dr. John Meeks, medical director of the Psychiatric Institute of Montgomery County, Maryland, says "If someone smokes twice a week or more, sobering up - in any total sense - never occurs. Even when not "high", he or she remains in a state of subacute intoxication: in most cases, without recognizing this 'holdover' effect."

According to Dr. Carlton Turner, Senior Policy Advisor on Drug Policy for the White House, most Americans do not realize the pandemic proportions of Marijuana use among our youngsters. Turner warns: "The inescapable fact is that unless our current pot-smoking habits are reversed sharply, Marijuana will have a drastic long-term physical and psychological health effects on our young people and, therefore, on the future of our families.

and our nation."

Last August, the surgeon general of the United States warned that chronic Marijuana leads to "A broad range of psychological and biological effects, many of which are dangerous and harmful to health." Those effects range from memory and learning impairment to decreased sperm count and interference with ovulation and prenatal development of fetuses. The warning was issued after a 15 month review of existing scientific evidence, much of which resulted from studies funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, which effectively controls Marijuana research in the U.S.

MADD TARGETS WRONG CULPRIT

The organization calling itself MADD. Mothers Against Drunk Driving, has won a lot of favorable publicity because of its highly publicized campaign against drunk drivers. Every thinking person applauds any effort to reduce alcohol's carnage on

our highways.

I have been distressed, however, to see that MADD uses every TV appearance to stress that it has no quarrel with the liquor traffic or its products only with its victims who also drive cars. Now, National Committeeman H.A. Miley from Georgia informs me that MADD is accepting money from the liquor traffic. A MADD Winter 1983 issue of its MADD Newsletter lists Anheuser Busch, America's largest brewing firm as a major financial supporter.

Doubtless, many in the MADD movement are sincere people who are disturbed by the loss of life from drinking drivers. Until they learn that the problem is alcohol, not merely its unfortunate victims, more liquor firms will gladly give money in order to buy a measure of respectability from association with this well-meaning but misguided

movement.

Mr. Miley informed MADD he could not contribute to such a movement. We urge our readers to take the same stance. A dollar given to the WCTU or the Prohibition Party will do more good than a large sum given to any group which trys to deal with liquor's victims but not with alcohol itself.
