The funeral for Mrs. Everett (Leona Delores) Johnson, 66, of rural Max and Phoenix was held Tuesday at Faith United Methodist Church in Minot. Burial was in the Benedict Methodist Cemetery. She died Friday in a Phoenix Hospital.

On Tuesday evening, March 12, about 150 people gathered at the Royal Fork Buffet Restaurant, Bismarck, to honor Thelma Klingensmith for her years of faithful dedication to the preservation of America's finest values. Rose Christensen (Cooperstown), Barbara Schulz of Studio A, (Bismarck), and Georgia Keller (Bismarck), of Eagles Forum

planned the event.

Among the legislators giving tributes to Thelma Klingensmith were Senators Hal Christensen (Minot) and Hershel Lashkowitz (Fargo) and Representatives Ralph Dotzenrod (Wyndmere), Ardella Williams (Lidgerwood), Arthur Melby (Harvey) and Arvid Hedstrom (Tolna). Other speakers listed on the program were Eleanor Ripple, Morton County Assistant Superintendent of Schools, Morton County Commissioner Rose Leingang for the Morton County Library, Ann Leingang for the Mandan Citizens Awareness Committee (against pronography), Jerry Knudson (N.D. Citizens for Decency) with the Lord's help and help of the people across N.D. 3 anti-pornography bills passed (HB 1615, SB2480, and SB 2390), Ethel Samuelson, Mandan World Gospel Mission Prayer Band, Rev. Clyde Graham, Almont, Heart River Gospel Association, Verna Ellsworth, Woman's Christian Temperance Union, Rose Christensen and Gloria Kramlich, Eagle Forum. Other speakers included former Lt. Governor Sands, Lupe Barbere, Pastor Zack Gill, Rev. Frank Rumer, Brent Welke, Sylvia Prezler. Pastor Gill also gave the invocation.

Former Governor Link played his violin. Rose Christensen and Mrs. Drown sang while he played "When Irish Eyes are Smiling". Rev. Lloyd Joregenson played the piano during the meal and for songs "America the Beautiful" and "Blest Be

the Tie that Binds."

The Eagle Forum presented Thelma with a plaque shaped like North Dakota; Rose Christensen gave her a cross of wheat straw weaving. A silk flower arrangement in a copper teapot was given by groups in which Thelma Klingensmith is active. Barbara Schulz taped the program for Thelma.

Barbara Schulz explained the purpose of the "money tree" was to help with some of the expense of bringing Gerry Fulcher (Delaware Council on Gambling Problems) to testify at hearing. His testimony helped defeat HCR 3038 (State Lottery).

Praise was given for her concern in moral issues, fairness, respect shown legislators, accurate research with written testimony given legislators, courage, persistence, faith, encouragement, humility, always giving the credit for victories to the LORD.
