Dr. Arnold Washton of New York City, a leading U.S. authority on cocaine said, "It is shocking to realize that cocaine is now the 'drug of choice' for middle-class America. It has escalated to epidemic proportions, afflicting famous athletes, doctors, lawyers, professional leaders, blue-collar workers, and one in five high school students. Millions of Americans aged 24 to 40 who smoked marijauna during their younger years in the '60s and '70s now use cocaine.'

In truth, cocaine can be a killer. Emergencyroom admissions associated with cocaine tripled between 1981 and 1984 and the number of deaths

associated with cocaine also tripled.

So cumpulsive is the cocaine addiction that if often becomes the most important and, indeed, the all-consuming influence in the lives of its victims. Because drug addicts can become so desperate to feed their habits that they will commit almost any crime, spreading drug abuse begets spreading crimes.

This explained the purpose of the White Ribbon Recruit Dedication Service. Visitors were Mrs. Chuck Erickson of Mandan, her daughter Krisha (5 year old) and foster baby, Hope Marie. Then Krisha Erickson was our White Ribbon Recruit; Edna Jenson and Verna Ellsworth were in charge of the service. Elizabeth Lind sang "Precious Jewels". Krisha staved during the rest of the meeting, but Mrs. Erickson had to meet the plane of the adoptive mother, take her to the adoption center, and turn Hope over to her new mother; that's why Hope was included in our prayer. During the fellowship at the meal the WCTU members learned how foster parents learn to love these little babies, give them a special name to use themselves for the baby (adoptive parents choose the name they want), and the Erickson family continues to pray for the babies after they go to their new homes. Because of so many abortions in North Dakota many people wanting to adopt babies cannot do so.

Mrs. Esther Rieker gave the devotions reading I John 1 and emphasizing Strength in Fellowship with God and others. She read a poem "No Time"; if we have no time to pray, help others, talk to them about Jesus, why would we expect God to have time

to write our names in the Book of Life?

Mrs. James Lunday as program leader read the poem from White Ribbon Bulletin about the raindrops working together. Whereas: We affirm the ethics and theology of the statement on gambling in the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church.

Whereas: Economic gains promised from a state lottery have not materialized in a net gain in funds in other states with lotteries.

Whereas: The institution of a state lottery has not proven to be a substitute for taxes in other states,

Whereas: It is not a proper function of state government to promote activities counter to the social well being of its residents,

Whereas: The economic gain in a state lottery resides in those who operate and supply the games rather than in the institutions which sponsor them....

Therefore be it resolved that the North Dakota Conference of the United Methodist Church meeting in Minot, No. Dak., May 28 - June 1, 1986 be on record as opposed to the institution of a state lottery in North Dakota,

AND THAT EACH United Methodist, each United Methodist Church and the program agencies of the North Dakota Conference of the United Methodist Church take an active role in opposition to the institution of a state lottery in North Dakota.

## SOUTHWEST DISTRICT CONVENTION

The Southwest District Convention of the W.C.T.U. was held at the Hettinger Assembly of God Church on Tuesday, May 27th with 20 attending from Prairie City, Bison, South Dakota, Hettinger, New England, Dickinson and Belfield. Vice President Mrs. Theophil Auch of Dickinson was in charge. Devotions were given by Pastor Gerry Bass of the Hettinger Assembly of God church. He spoke on I Cor. 6:19 the body as the temple of the Holy Spirit. It is terrible when vandals destroy a church building. But it is much more serious to commit "Spiritual Vandalism" and destroy our bodies, the temple of the Holy Spirit, with sin and bad habits like alcohol, tobacco, drugs and gluttony, that harms and kills so many people in illness, accidents, crimes so needlessly. People need to tell others the dangers and importance of not starting to use them.

A song "Work for the Cause" was sung with Mary Trunkhill as pianist. The pledges to the American, Christian and Temperance flags were recited. Gladys Grey of Hettinger gave the welcome with Marvel Molm of Belfield giving the response. The Memorial Hour, "Down Memory Lane", was

conducted by Marvel Molm.

Hebrews 11 tells of the faith, lives and importance of leaders like Able, Noah, Moses, David, Samuel and Daniel. Leaders of faith were in the W.C.T.U. for over 100 years, praying, teaching and helping with alcohol, tobacco and drug problems and preventing problems by never starting. all the people in the area who served and are still serving in the lives of those people they helped, even though they've gone to glory. We remembered them. Memorial service for Pearl McFarland and honorary member Herbert Kvanvig both of Hettinger. Mrs. Fred Kulish and Mrs. Theophil Auch of Dickinson sang Precious Memories. There were reports of the State Convention, of the Unions and the Youth Temperance Council Camp. Mary Trunkhill of Hettinger and Mrs. Fred Kulish of Dickinson will help with Y.T.C. Camp near Cooperstown June 12-15, 1986. Carma Kulish who often helped at camp is a missionary in Brazil now.

An interesting film "Soft is the Heart of a Child" was shown of a home with drinking problems that harmed the whole family and the importance of

seeking help early.

A Fruesta of fruit punch, coffee and lunch were

served by the Hettinger Union.

A business meeting was held. Mrs. Theophil Auch of Dickinson was elected as President, Mrs. Chest Molm as Secretary and Treasurer. Collection was \$124.45. Gave \$50.00 to Y.T.C. Camp, \$50.00 to Teachers Booth.

A challenge by Mrs. Fred Kulish:

The challenge, primarily centers on the thought that Christ, through His Gospel, wants to change society through Christians, throughout the Christian Community, that is labelled the church.

Church in recent years has become a comfortable setting for that message, with expressions of admiration for certain celebrations, where it is fashionable to proclaim the death of Jesus, rather than a life of service and surrender, as outlined in the Word of God. Christians in such settings have become immune to aiding the derelict, immune to speak out on moral issues, that are a part of our society. The church instead deals with issues of minor concern as mergers, should women be ordained as ministers of the Gospel, should priests be allowed to marry. Emphasis is placed on the equation - if it is bigger - it is better - if there is motion, there is growth and success. The American church should become the means by which an alternative life style can be offered to society, that for the most part, defines life as living in the fast lane. The church needs to demonstrate a life of sacrifice, rather than indulgence to a culture taken up with commercialism. The spirit of our age is not effectively challenged. Instead it has been hopelessly confused with main street 'good life'. Our churches are too often content to pamper themselves and merely hold services. Christians have forgotten their calling. Lives are showing untruths against the Divine Model they claim to love and follow. The 'mind of Christ' which Christian are to imitate, demands that we roll up our sleeves of our faith and get dirty in the work of redeeming men. Another part of the mind of Christ is to be courageous and confront the evil and the injustice of a philosophy perpetuated in our ethical standard that would say - there are no moral absolutes and who in our day makes Godly choices anymore. This courage is from a Vision, that we can attain, from the treasures of the Word of God.

Beverage Industry figures bear out what these restauranteurs have found in their own houses: As American continue to pay unprecedented attention to nutrition, diet and health-and enact more stringent drunk-driving laws, they are moderating their drinking and turning to non-alcoholic beverages, especially soft drinks, but also bottled waters.

For the first time in a generation Americans last year consumed less wine, beer and spirits than the year before. Distilled spirits experienced their third straight year of declining consumption, slipping 1.4 percent.

The concerted efforts (Of advertisers) to reach even the most particular smoker has grown more intense as cigarette sales have declined at a rate averaging 1.5 percent a year since 1981. Advertising and promotion budgets have soared: In a report issued last July, the Federal Trade Commission estimated that the nation's six major companies spent \$2.7 billion marketing cigarettes in 1983.

# **BISMARCK DISTRICT CONVENTION**

President Olga Huhncke presided at the 87th annual Bismarck District Convention held at United Methodist Church in Steele, May 16, 1986. Nineteen were registered. Following a delicious lunch Rev. Don Klingensmith gave the morning devotions. He read Matthew 5:1-20 and Matthew 7:15-29. While in college in 1927, he chose Matthew 6:33 as his guide in life. He stressed the importance of witnessing for the Lord.

Special greetings from WCTU President Marion Bartle were read. Elizabeth Lind sang "Precious Memories". Edna Jenson reported on the Mid-year meeting at Jamestown; State WCTU Convention to be in Minot September 25, 26, 1986; \$10.00 from each union for Centennial Convention in 1989; appointment of Centennial Committee of Mr. and Mrs. Don Klingensmith, Edna Jenson, and Verna Ellsworth. (Suggestions from all of you are welcome.)

Steele Union reported using YTE bulletin inserts in several area churches, providing treats for Vacation Bible School, using Bible verses for roll call, Bible quiz at meeting, sending gift to Jamestown State Hospital, prayer partners, and paying local paper to print Bible verse in each issue.

Bismarck Union held institute at October meeting that included visual aid of leaflet "Fruits of Alcohol Habit Tree", 965 pieces of temperance literature given out at Christmas Craft Sale at Bismarck Civic Center; packets of WCTU literature given to 4 schools for Temperance Friday; use of Hooty the Owl in Shiloh Christian School; 390 bulletin inserts used in 4 Mandan and Bismarck churches.

Thelma Klingensmith attended two meetings of State Legislative Committee on Law Enforcement in their study of impact of charitable gambling on the state. Recommendations of this committee are to be given to the Legislature to act on. According to Attorney-General's office, \$160 million spent in gambling in North Dakota in 1985, but less than 10 percent went to charity. That office receives no special money to enforce gambling laws, so little is done to inspect or audit those with gambling permits. Although local government-approved gambling-licensed places are restricted to \$1000 for prize 1 with total value of prizes of \$2000, those with state gambling licenses have no restrictions. This Committee approved the highest figure \$5000 for \$ prize and \$10,000 for total prizes per session for state licenses; appointment of gambling commission (its members not gamblers nor connected in any way with gambling places) to administer laws about gambling including inspection before permits are granted; also tax of 1 percent on gross intake of gambling to pay for expenses of administration. Resolutions on gambling and Sunday closing law were read; these to be acted on at United Methodist conference in Minot the last of May. An editorial in an Idaho

paper accused Scientific Games of Georgia of dishonest lottery ad by listing lottery intake for large-populated states like California when really it is much less for state with low population. EVERY-ONE IS URGED TO VOTE AND CONTACT OTHERS TO VOTE YES ON MEASURE 4 ON JUNE 10. This would put the Sunday-closing back to where it was before last Legislature changed it from 3 to 6 employees working in Sunday businesses. A Yes vote puts it back to 3 employees. Read Exodus 34:21 IF this measure is defeated, soon every business including liquor stores will be open on Sunday in North Dakota.

Steele Union served a delicious and bountiful noon meal. Elizabeth Lind in the afternoon devotions read Proverbs 3:6-7 and Psalm 100. If we trust in ourselves, we will lose the blessings promised to

those trusting in the Lord.

Thelma Klingensmith gave a phrase by phrase commentary on II Chronicles 7:14, God's answer to King Solomon's prayer after the dedication of the temple. If we call ourselves Christians, we should live like Christians; very important, but difficult to humble self; do we spend as much time daily in prayer as reading the paper or watching TV; our greatest weapon against the devil is prayer, but that weapon needs more use: God hears, answers, forgives, and forgets; God is working in ways we do not see: "So seek the face of God each morning" One lady said she looked into the mirror & prayed-"Lord I am Yours today, what do you want me to do to serve you today?" Turn from Evil ways, greatest evil of christians is our apathy and indifference - we are so wrapped up in our own things that we will not take a stand to fight against social evils such as liquor, pornography, etc. The Federal Commission on Pornography (includes Dr. James Dobson) has completed a 22 page report on hearings held recently. It emphasized destructive effect of pornography- very degrading to women, harmful to children, and addictive to those filling their minds with it; urged strong action by Congress and U.S. Government to stop onscene dial-a-porn messages and prosecution of those in porn business.

Thelma Klingensmith installed the following elected officers: president, Edna Jenson, vice president, Olga Huhncke; secretary, Verna Ells-

worth; treasurer, Marian Brusven.

The district voted to send \$25 to State Fund; \$20 to YTC Camp, and \$10 for Thelma's legislative

expense.

Winnie DeKrey and Verna Ellsworth were in charge of the White Ribbon Recruit Service for 2 very precious children, Naomi Shipley and Jamyson Fischer.

The closing prayer by Don Klingensmith was followed by a time of fellowship as lunch was

served.
