Aleck Bauch, 88, Minot, died recently in a Minot

nursing home.

He was born July 17, 1899, in Odessa, Russia, to Christ and Kathrine Bauch. He came to the Coleharbor area of McLean County at age 5 with his parents, and was reared in Malcolm Township, McClean County. He served in the Army from 1920 to 1921.

Following his discharge, he returned to the Coleharbor area and married Mathilda Wessner. She later died, and on October 10, 1925, he married Louise Mittleider in Washburn. They farmed in the Coleharbor area until 1948 when they moved to a farm east of Max, farming there until moving to Minot in 1958.

He was employed as custodian for First Baptist Church and First American Bank of Minot. In 1977, he and his wife moved to Henry Towers, and in 1985, he became a resident of the Americana Healthcare Center. His wife preceded him in death.

He was a member of First Baptist Church and had been active in the Baptist churches in Coleharbor and Max, serving as superintendent and Sunday school teacher there. He also was active in child evangelism in those churches.
