The Fargo District WCTU meeting was held in Maple Sheyenne Lutheran Church of Rural Prosper on Friday, May 5, 1989. This was our 98th annual convention. Nineteen women registered. Our theme was Build with Prayer. Mrs. Norman Ryers, our president, presided.

Devotions on the subject of prayer were given by Rev. Ann Newgard. She closed her meditation with

prayer.

We sang "O Master Let Me Walk With You". Our business meeting opened with the reading of the minutes by Anna Duncan. The treasurer's report was given by Mrs. Melvin Gangness.

It was decided to give \$25.00 to State WCTU and \$25.00 to YTC and \$15.00 to the Centennial Fund.

The Nominating Committee presented the following slate of officers: President- Mrs. Norman Byers; Vice President- Mrs. Oscar Johnson; Secretary- Mrs. Russell Duncan; and Treasurer- Mrs. Melvin Gangness. The secretary cast a unanimous ballot for these officers.

The Fargo Union reported 22 members, with 8 meetings held during the years. 1000 leaflets and 30 posters about drugs were placed in schools and

churches. The Midyear and State Conventions were attended by some of our members. The reading program is being continued.

One member, Mrs. Myrtle Emzinger who passed away, was memorialized by Mrs. Henry Johnson.

The Prosper Union reported 11 members and 3 honorary members. They contributed to the Lillian Stevens, Francis Willard, the Centennial Fund and the Air Conditioning at National.

Radio releases were used for Roll Call. A total of 16 books from our reading list have been reviewed. 100 YTC posters were sent to classrooms. Our emphasis has been on Building with Prayer.

Offering amounted to \$30.00 with Mrs. Hazel Anderson giving offeratory prayer. Mrs. Oscar Johnson gave the State Report encouraging new members. A book review on the Life of Elizabeth Presten Andersen was given by Anna Duncan. A beautiful memorial service for Mrs. Myrtle Enzinger was given by Mrs. Harry Johnson. She read from Psalms 103, 84, 27, 46, and 23. Abide With Me was sung.

It was decided to have the meeting next year the same as this year with registration at 11:30 a.m. Following announcements and singing of "Onward Christian Women". Closing prayer, coffee and fruesta was served by the Prosper Union.
